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## PROMINENT KNOTT MAN KILLED LAST WEEK BY OWN GUN

**Is Decision Reached Following Investigation Into Death of Wiley Conley**

### DEATH HELD ACCIDENTAL

The bullet which killed Wiley Conley, 70-year-old man on Rock Fork Creek, five miles from Garrett, last Tuesday was accidentally fired from his own revolver as he was holstering the weapon under his arm, it was held following an investigation made by Commonwealth's Attorney O. C. Hall and relatives of the victim.

Mr. Conley, a well-known Knott county man, died two hours after being wounded. The bullet entered the left side of his chest and ranged downward, emerging from his leg.

The shooting took place at the home of Brice Green, about two miles up Rock Fork Creek from the home of Conley, where the aged man had spent the night. While dressing, or when preparing to leave, Thursday morning about 8 o'clock, he was wounded.

Surviving him are his widow and the following sons and daughters: Mrs. Della Collins, of Ohio; Kendall Conley, Pedro, O.; Mrs. Dollie Chaffins, Garrett; Mrs. Maudie Sloane, Wayland; Claude, Crit, Bowser and Rebel Conley, of Garrett. Five brothers and two sisters also survive. Epperson, Morgan, R. L., Elige and Reuben Conley, Mrs. Josie Carpenter, Leander, Ky., and Mrs. Amanda Shepherd, of Royalton.

Funeral rites were conducted Friday by ministers of the Baptist Church, and burial was made in the family cemetery.

## RAIN OBLITERATES ASSASSIN'S TRAIL

**Bloodhounds Here Following Futile Effort To Track Down Pike Slayer**

Mullikin's bloodhounds were taken through Prestonsburg Tuesday morning, returning to Lexington from Elkhorn City where they had been called to attempt to track down the slayer of Palmer Ratliff, 19-year-old miner, who was shot from ambush Monday morning while on his way to work in the mines of the Berryman Coal Company.

A. J. Caywood, who was in charge of the dogs, told The Times that rain during Monday obliterated the scent of Ratliff's slayer. A spot on the hillside where the ground was trodden hard by the unknown assassin's feet and where twigs had been broken to clear his vision of his intended victim was found, but the trail could not be followed, he said.

A fusillade of shots was fired from the mountainside at Ratliff and several co-workers were en route to the mines. Minor trouble was reported at the mines a few days ago.

## FALLING TREE KILLS WELL-KNOWN MAN

**Andrew J. Spears Fatally Injured Last Wednesday; Was Known in Floyd**

Struck by a falling tree on Harmon's Branch, Pike county, where he was cutting timber for the Pike-Floyd Coal Company, Betsy Layne, Andrew J. Spears, 48 years old, prominent Boldman citizen, was fatally injured last Wednesday morning and died at the Methodist hospital, Pikeville, on the following day as the result of a skull fracture.

A church member for several years and formerly a teacher, Mr. Spears was one of this section's best men. He was born on Johns Creek at McCombs, Pike county, January 4, 1887, and had hundreds of relatives and friends in Floyd and Pike counties.

Surviving him are his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Taylor Spears; four daughters and one son, Mrs. Angeline George, of Betsy Layne; Charles, Lenore, Betty and Madge Spears, all of Boldman. He also leaves five brothers and one sister: R. B. Spears, Coal Run; Lafe, Jeff, Ballard and Roland Spears and Mrs. Zettie Blackburn, all of McCombs.

Funeral services were conducted from the old Spears home at McCombs, Revs. Isaac Stratton, of Banner, and G. W. Roark, of Prestonsburg, officiating. Burial was made in the Berryman Coal Company cemetery.

## TRAIL COMPLETION HERE IS PROMISED

**Route Through Upper Prestonsburg To Be Changed, Officials Say**

Re-routing of a part of the unpaved sector of the highway at the upper end of Prestonsburg and paving of this strip of road is seen as a federal project which may be undertaken within a short time, it was said this week following a visit of Highway Commissioner Turner, of Jackson, here a few days ago.

In letters to County Attorney Forrest D. Short and Mayor A. C. Carter last week, District Engineer E. P. Moynihan indicated that this work will be done as a federal project, if necessary right-of-way is procured. The project will be completed at a cost of \$20,000, it is estimated.

## RELIEF ALLOTMENT FOR FLOYD COUNTY IS ABOVE \$36,000

**Floyd Direct Relief Case Percentage Lower Than in Pike, Figures Show**

### 27 PROJECTS WORKING

Floyd county's work allotment from the Kentucky Emergency Relief Administration for the five weeks from Friday, April 26, to Thursday, May 30, amounts to \$38,072, it was announced Saturday by J. S. Murphrey, area administrator, Pikeville.

The direct relief allotment for this county for the same period has not been learned, but it is believed that the appropriation for Floyd county will approximate \$5,000.

The \$32,072 allotted this county for work relief will be spent on the 27 projects on which work is now being done, unless new projects are approved during the month. A total of 2,656 families are on relief in this county at this time, all of whom are working with the exception of 645 on direct relief.

In March, George H. Goodman, state relief administrator said last week, \$1,470,683 was spent for general relief, while for which a \$31,059 work relief allotment has been made for these five weeks, there are 2,782 families on relief, with 1,080 of these on direct relief. Pike county has 38 work projects going, it was announced.

In March, George H. Goodman, state relief administrator said last week, \$1,470,683 was spent for general relief, while the overhead expense was 17 per cent of this amount. In addition \$227,909 was expended in earmarked funds for special purposes for which the overhead was charged against the general relief.

Work relief in March increased by \$144,851 while direct relief decreased \$55,497. This proportion, Mr. Goodman pointed out, is a direct effort on the part of the Kentucky Emergency Relief Administration to immediately fall in line with President Roosevelt's new works program, which is intended to reduce to a minimum direct relief.

## WHOSE FAULT IS THIS?

The relief, in attempting to furnish labor for the unemployed and needy, makes what occurs to The Times as a rather ludicrous mistake in taking men miles from their own communities to work rather than taking the work to within a reasonable distance of them.

In one community of this county—on Salt Lick Creek, to be exact—men have been placed at work at Garrett. Some of these men walked or rode horses or mules from near the Knott county line over a road that has been a veritable river of mud to Garrett, a distance of approximately six miles, before the job presented itself. Twelve miles of travel a day, six or eight hours of work.

They were glad to get this work, of course; but it strikes us as the height of something-or-other to have men struggle through mud six miles to reach a job when there was work badly needed just outside their own homes.

This is not to criticise the relief administration. It may be the fault of county officials who should have made a more determined effort to procure projects for such up-the-creek roads. Wherever the fault lies, it should be corrected if possible.





### NEW HIGH IN BUYING FORD MATERIALS SET

Dearborn, Mich., April 27—A new high record of purchases of materials and supplies for use in the manufacture of Ford V-8 cars and trucks was set by the Ford Motor Com-

This compared with total sales of 328,607 cars and trucks in all of the year 1932.

## THE GARDEN

### CULTIVATION

By JOHN S. Gardner,  
 College of Agriculture

Second only to its fertility, in importance, is the manner in which a garden is cultivated. Many gardens are worked too much, worked to death, in fact. A far more general misconception of a cultivated garden is that it must show that it has been "gone thru," its surface scarred with deep wounds, and these, the closer to the plants, the better that deep working is harmful, the droopy appearance of the vegetables attest. Besides, labor is wasted.

All that cultivation can do, and does do, is to remove weed competition. Weeds compete with vegetables in the matter of plant food and moisture. The larger they are permitted to become, the more serious is this competition; obviously, then, the time to remove them is while they are still small, while their roots are simple and lie shallow that is to say, while only a shallow stirring of the soil succeeds, or in fact a mere shaving of the surface.

Cultivation should leave the soil surface selevl. Although it is admitted that one way to discourage small weeds is to draw a ridge or a hill of earth over them to smother them, a better way is to uproot them or to remove them and maintain the surace level. "Hills" or ridges expose extra surface to sun-evaporation and lower the water table, perhaps beyond root-reach. Inasmuch as most vegetables are prized for their high moisture content, the harm that may come to

them through hillling is obvious.

The tools to use properly to cultivate a garden are few in number. In fact, there is only one—a hoe. If the time-honored hand-hoe is the tool its blade should be so adjusted that when the handle is held in the most comfortable position, its blade lies flat or tipped slightly downward. If a garden plow is to be used the attachments should be the "beet-knives" adged steels lying flat with the surface with the surface of the soil when the plow handles are held as the user finds the least tiring. If a horse-drawn cultivator is to be the means, it should be one fitted with "sweeps," large sized "beet-knives." With any of these, scraping the soil becomes almost automatic, the weeds are uprooted, the surface is left level, the vegetable roots are left undisturbed, an ideal situation all 'round.
