WILL LINDBERGH SAVE HAUPTMANN?

Edward J. Reilly, chief of the defense staff for Bruno Richard Hauptmann during his trial for the murder of the Lindbergh baby, this week declared that the German carpenter's friends damaged his case by bringing the German-Jewish racial issue into the spotlight.

"The conviction of Hauptmann and his approaching execution in the electric chair at Trenton, N. J., brings this factor to the forefront of public discussion, since many are still debating his innocence or his guilt," Leilly states in an article in the current issue of Liberty Magazine.

"Expressly against my or-ders," he says, "friends of Mr. Hauptmann tried to make it seem that a Jew, Attorney General Wilentz, was persecuting a Christian. They maligned Wilentz at every opportunity from the platforms where they were trying to raise funds for the defense and by issuing inflammatory printed leaflets which set forth that the whole case was a racial conflict."
