"Attack Tuberculosis First"

Leading Health Authority Says Public Health Enemy No. 1 Can Be Wiped Out

"The greatest need for health action is where the greatest saving of life and suffering can be

made.' said Dr Thomas Parran. Jr., Surgeon General of the United States Public Health Serv ice. Dr. Parran has the reputation of being a fighter and he

has already begun his war on the ogres of disease that are in need of immediate attention.

Tuberculosis comes first for it is the greatest of the public health foes. according to Dr. Parran. When we consider that 70,000 persons die needlessly each year in this country from that communicable, preventable disease, it is hopeful news that our leading health authority has determined to attack tuberculosis first and "to finish the job of wiping it out."

The fact that in the past thirty years the death rate from tuberculosis has been cut two-thirds is encouraging until we find that it is still the leading cause of death in the productive years, 15 to 45. Heart disease, for example, the leading cause of death for all age groups, takes its greatest number of lives in the older years, beyond the age of 60. The trag-

edy of tuberculosis is that deaths from it usually mean broken homes and orphaned children. Dr. Parran further said. "Our slogan used to read: Tuberculosis is pre-

Be Held In County December 5

ARE ELIGIBLE

The Kentucky court of appeals in a ruling handed down Tuesday, November 4, held the local option election called to be held in Lawrence county on December 5 to be legal.

The section of the 1936 local option election law requiring that petitioners seeking a local option election must state their postoffice addresses and the date they signed the petition is "directory" and not "mandatory," the court of appeals held in ruling on the case.

The court's opinion, written by Commissioner Osso Stanley, affirmed judgment of Judge Watt M. Prichard in a suit against County Judge L. D. Fyffe to enjoin the holding of a local option election. Dr. C. E. Skaggs and J. B. Vaughan, plaintiffs, contended the petition calling for the election was defective because a number of the subscribers to the petitioner did not state their postoffice addresses or the date of signature. It was admitted that all petitioners were voters in Lawrence county.

"The provisions of the statute that the postoffice address and date of signature of the petitioners shall be stated are interpreted," the court held, "as being directory, although their qualification as voters, of the territory involved is, of course, mandatory because jurisdictional. The provision ought to be observed in the interest of orderly procedure and to enable the county judge or any interested citizen to identify the petitioners conveniently.'
