WHY NOT HELP THE FARMERS?

It is already well-known that The TIMES has never been critical of the WPA. This newspaper has always taken the position that, faced with a relief and unemployment problem nationwide, the WPA cannot but fail to do justice in some individual cases.

Yet we cannot but wonder why Floyd county farmers are not given at least an iota of consideration for WPA employment. The TIMES is told by the Certifying Agent that Floyd county is classed as an industrial county and that, as a consequence, only those previously engaged in labor on "public works"-mining, railroading, such like-may be placed at work by the WPA in Floyd county.

This is a rank injustice, but The TIMES does not point the accusing finger at any particular person or department. It does say most emphatically, however, that this status must be changed if all those in need of work, those direly in need of help in affording themselves and their families a subsistence, are to be given the service to which the WPA is dedicated, theoretically or otherwise.

The hillside farmers dot Floyd county. Most of them are good citizens, handicapped by environment and the resources of their land. Most of them have large families, and the income from their farms, is insufficient to support them. They cannot clothe and feed themselves and their wives and children during the spring and summer while their crops are being tilled and are growing. They, at the same time, must pay taxes on their farms-taxes which go, in part, toward making this WPA program possible.

There also is no argument against the unemployed miner, or any other man deprived of work, being given employment. It all swings back to who needs work-and any man to whom private employment has been denied, who cannot afford to remain idle, needs this sort of help which enables him to help himself.

In short, there is no argument against the farmer receiving WPA employment.

What must be made evident to the "powers that be" are the cold facts.
The TIMES believes all this can be adjusted to the end that justice will be done. Floyd county is not merely an industrial county; it is both industrial and agricultural -- a fact which

CUTTING DOWN CLOTHES

f you have worn made-over clothing of your parents or of older brothers or sisters, you will understand the title of this article. If you were an older child or else lived in more modern times, you may not know enough to sympathize with us younger brothers and sisters. We youngsters of a generation ago felt, quite often, our greatest humiliation when we appeared in public clad entirely in well-recognizable garments, in spite of their having been cut down to fit us. Worse still, we often had to wear cast-off cloth-ing just as it was, regardless of our size or shape. As I am very short of legs, I have had to suffer agonies by wearing pants that had to be rolled up, and the bag at the knee made the lower part of my leg look like Alley Oop's ample ankles. Why, if I had got lost, up until I was, say, 15 years old, there would have been

no difficulty in finding me, for my three older brothers' garments were three older brothers' garments were known far and wide, by size and NEWS OF BIG SANDY cut and color.

When there were so many children to be clad, and so little to clothe them with, it took magic to provide enough clothing. Fortunately cottonade and jeans are pretty tough and can stand several seasons, making due allowance for tears and scratches such as any boy's garments are subject to. Hickory shirts never wear out and can help raise a whole family of boys. All of these things shrink, though, and help in the natural process of growth to make clothes too small for the big boy. Now, I know that some defining is necessary at this point. "Hickory" is strong shirt material, thick and tough; "jeans" is heavy woolen cloth to make pants (and warm quilts from the scraps); "cottonade" is heavy cotton pants cloth (denim is it or something like it).

The small brother is waiting in suspense for the garments to become too small for the one up the line, waiting with wicked desires in his heart that earthquakes or floods or death may remove the cause of his humiliation. If there is still a younger brother, though, he can have his reward by feeling superior when the much-worn garment passes on down to the unfortunate little rascal. It is hard on a boy that does not grow rather fast, for then cast-off garments pile up on him. I was slow of growth and had my humiliation increased year by year. I had my share of garments, so far as numbers were concerned, but such numbers!

If a boy lives long enough, however, he comes to the day when he can have a suit or an overcoat or a pair of pants all his own. Never again can I feel as big as I did in my first overcoat, one bought just for me and not already a family relic. Some of us may have forgotten how deep was our sense of disgrace when we had to wear out a pair of Sister's shoes, but I suspect that we have never forgotten the sense of triumph when we could sail under our own colors, without being twitted by the big boys because of our museum of inherited clothing.

The special session Chandler-Wal- 4 for a capital offense or habitual lis bill to revolutionize care of the mentally ill is being debated in the battle halls at Frankfort. The bill provides modern methods of treating mental diseases and initiates a system of mental hygiene, as a public health service. One of the most important features provides that the council of the Kenutcky State Medical Association can protect the personnel and administrative officials from political interference. The outstanding features of the bill provides securing of qualified specialists in mantal diseases for the state hospital staffs. The establishment of a system of mental hygiene, in cooperation with the public health service, making possible early treatment and cure of mental disaeses. Professional qualifications are required for technical members of the staffs of the state hospitals. The director of the division of hospitals and mental hygiene is to be appointed by the Commissioner of Welfare, from a list recommended by the Council of the State Medical Association. The director is to be in complete charge of the division and cannot be removed, except upon written charges sustained by a committee composed of the Governor, the Commissioner of Welfare, and a member named by the Council of the Medical Asso-

Under the bill, the staff of each state hospital must include besides the superintendents, a business manager, clinical director, occupational theaphy director, supervisor of nurses, field liaison officer, dentist, senior and junior physicians. The authorized personnel is one physician to every 150 patients with a minimum of one to every 300, and one attendant to every eight patients with a minimum of one to every 12. The ratio of personnel to inmates in the Institution for Feeble-Minded Children is optional; but a director of education is provided.

The director of the division will have supervision of other institutions receiving aid from the state and give service to the prisons. He may utilize public health and welfare department social workers in the general field of mental hygiene. The bill requires psychiatric ex-

amination of all persons indicted

criminals.

An individual is permitted to have his mental illness treated without being convicted of insanity, as if it were a crime; but must bear the cost of this treatment except in the case of pauper patients.

An important feature of this bill takes the personnel of the institution out of the political patronage class and will allow a permanent staff of experienced and qualified field specialists to treat and care for the mentally ill.

The bill contains humanitarian features that provide for systematic treatment and attempted cure of all mentally ill patients, in state institutions, not merely for confinement in state asylums. The division in cooperation with the state department of health will develop a statewide mental hygiene program looking toward the prevention of mental






