MOTION FOR BIDS, OFFERED BY HILL, VETOED BY COURT

Court Turns Down Low-Bid Plan By Vote of 3 to 1

SPAN CONSTRUCTION IN COUNTY FORESEEN

Court Approval Voted Necessary Before County Can Make Purchases

County Judge E. P. Hill's move in fiscal court to provide for letting of contracts for hauling of WPA commodities only to the lowest bidders was defeated by a 3-1 vote of the county's four magistrates.

Judge Hill's motion, which was seconded by Magistrate Daniel Akers, would have provided for newspaper advertising for commodity-hauling contracts for two weeks prior to the awarding of contracts. Magistrates Omeroy Joe Prater and W. A. Wills voted against the measure.

County Judge Hill proposed the plan for sealed bids after it had become apparent that commodity-hauling under the present system had cost the county during the last fiscal year approximately \$4,600.

"That would buy a lot of grapefruit and beans," Judge Hill commented. Magistrate Wills' motion providing that no purchase be made by Floyd county except by authorization of the fiscal court was passed by unanimous vote.

Work on bridges spanning Left Beaver Creek at Drift and McDowell bridges with the passage of a fiscal resolution promising the WPA release by the county of all right-of-way and contributing 25 per cent of the cost of materials for the two spans. County Judge Hill said he had been assured by officials of the Paintsville WPA district office that work will be begun at once. The two bridges will cost approximately \$21,000 and will be constructed of concrete, eye-beam (flat) style.

Fiscal court co-operation was also promised the WPA on construction of a bridge across the Big Sandy river at the mouth of Bull Creek. This span is included in the WPA road project down Bull Creek and will be built, it was said, when work reaches the point that the bridge is needed.

STRIKE OF PUPILS SETTLED TUESDAY

Gearheart School Begins After Pupils Object to Board's Action

A two-day "strike" by pupils and their parents in the Gearheart school district, in objection to the county board of education's failure to re-hire one of the teachers who taught last year in the two-room school, was terminated Tuesday. Attendance Officer Leonard Martin said Wednesday.

The incident, brought about by the board's hiring of Willie Hall, of McDowell, in the stead of Ruby Stumbo, also of McDowell, also was settled peaceably, it was said, and the school will be taught by Mr. Hall.

The district has an enrollment of approximately 80, and about half of this number were affected by the strike. The other teacher in the two-room building is Mrs. Artie Sizemore Moore, of Orkney, who taught there last year. Her room was unaffected.

The strike had its inception Monday, when all rural schools in the county were scheduled to open, and was continued Tuesday. The pupils refused to enter Mr. Hall's room, and many parents were on the school ground, according to reports. Attendance officer Martin went to Gearheart Tuesday and was successful in getting the pupils to attend school, under the teacher originally hired by the board.

Miss Stumbo is still unemployed in the county as a teacher.

1,500 WILL SEE FORESTRY FILMS

According to Estimate of County Ag. Agent S. L. Isbell

Attendance at the first two showings early this week of the moving picture depicting the destruction of animal and plant life by fire and other preventable agencies indicated that more than 1,500 Floyd countians will witness the next 10 days, witness this graphic film intended at once to entertain and educate citizens in the soil, game and fish conservation movement, County Agent S. L. Isbell said Wednesday morning.

First showing of the film, exhibited by Paul Cooper and C. C. Ward, of the state forestry department, was made at the Sowers Creek school on Johns Creek Monday night when a crowd of 200 taxed the building beyond its seating capacity and forced exhibitors to tack the screen onto the outside wall of the school so that interested farmers and their families could occupy favorite coigns of vantage to witness its showing.

At the Cow Creek school, where 150 persons or more saw the film Tuesday night, the same procedure was followed.

Nine other schools will be visited, this week and next, for exhibition of the film which graphically portrays conservation needs.

The "movie" is being sponsored by the Floyd County Conservation Association and the Floyd County Fish and Game Club.

TRANSCRIPT COST IS ORDERED PAID

Appellate Court Dissolves Stumbos' Injunction In Hospital Case

Dissolved by the Court of Appeals Friday was the temporary injunction procured by Dr. and Mrs. W. L. Stumbo seeking to avoid payment of \$1,493.50 to a stenographer for the transcript of evidence in their litigation with the Beaver Valley hospital, Martin.

The order dissolving the injunction was signed by Judge Gus Thomas, with Justices J. W. Cammack and Will H. Fulton concurring. The opinion stated that Dr. and Mrs. Stumbo, instead of bringing independent action, should have asked the Knott circuit court for a rehearing of the case.

The action out of which the injunction grew was that in which the Beaver Valley hospital claimed that Dr. and Mrs. Stumbo were bound by their contract, signed when they sold the Martin hospital in January, 1935, which specified that they were not to operate a hospital in Floyd county for the period of 10 years from that date.

The Beaver Valley hospital company claimed in court that the Stumbo Memorial hospital was erected in Knott county, a short distance from the Floyd-Knott line near Lackey, in order to avoid the contract by "subterfuge." The plaintiffs were upheld by both the lower court and the Court of Appeals. The Stumbos contend that the Beaver Valley hospital first violated terms of the contract when it made unavailable to Dr. Stumbo its operating room and other hospital services.

Funeral services were conducted from the home Tuesday morning by the Revs. Hayes Maynard and F. A. Hopkins, and burial was made in the family cemetery.

Dr. M. D. Garred, Ashland, will be in charge of the clinic, which will be conducted under the auspices of the Kentucky Crippled Children's Commission. Several days before the clinic date, Miss Vera P. Pool, field representative of the Commission, will come here to contact all known crippled children.

WPA POSTS COST \$600,000 YEARLY

In Kentucky Alone, Report To House Committee Discloses

Administrative payroll of the WPA in Kentucky annually aggregates \$600,000, payroll figures submitted to a House committee investigating relief last week.

Kentucky administrative employes receiving \$2,000 or more a year totaled 145, while 174 others, not including all project supervisors, were being paid salaries between \$1,000 and \$2,000, according to figures procured by individual members of the committee.

Salary of George H. Goodman, state administrator, is \$6,500 a year; that of Arthur Gamble, Paintsville, district director, \$3,600.

Candidates for the offices of circuit court clerk, representative and magistrate of district 3 in the coming August primary drew for ballot positions here Tuesday morning, at the office of County Clerk A. B. Meade.

Drawings for the positions of the candidates for state senator, commonwealth's attorney and circuit judge were not held, since these are district offices and the ballot positions are determined at the office of the secretary of state by the order in which the candidates registered.

Bill Cooley, Wayland, drew the No. 1 spot on the ballot of the Democratic candidates for circuit court clerk. 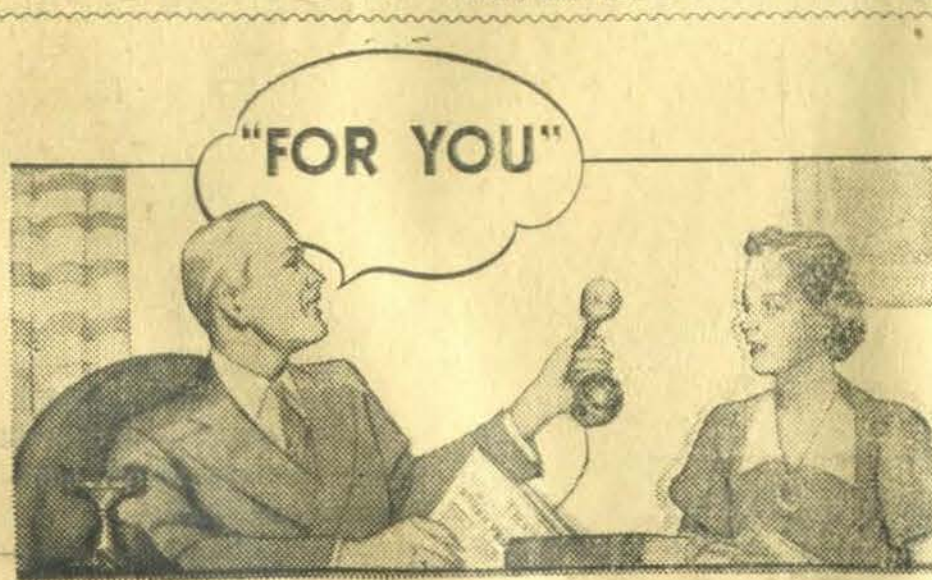

believe that the town of Prestonsburg cannot go wrong in buying the Prestonsburg Water Company's plant—if the deal can be consummated at a reasonable price and if the business then can be conducted without political strings hampering its progress.

But, even if these matters are assured, those closely connected with negotiations for the company's purchase have other things of which to be wary. For instance, we folks don't want to get ourselves in the predicament Salyersville citizens will find themselves in after September 1. The loan agency of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, which made Salyersville's municipal ownership of waterworks possible, has asked that the "tapping-charge"—that is, charges for installation of a meter and running of pipe from the main distribution line to that of the property-owner—be placed at \$20 on and after September 1.

Fewin's sake, let's not make the thing costlier to the poor consumer than it already is!

THE WPA STRIKES

Of interest is the fact that while thousands of WPA workers are striking in the cities because Congress has decreed that they must work 130 hours a month for the same pay they formerly received for around 107 hours, no such strike has developed in Floyd county and few have oc-

curred in any rural section of the county.

The fact that agitators are more active in the urban centers than in the more sparsely settled sections may account for all this.

Whatever the cause, WPAsters would do better to heed their own counsels instead of those of others. For a beneficent government can, upon occasion, crack down. And those needing this work, with women and children dependent upon their wages for the very necessities of life, should not permit themselves to be led into biting the feeding hand.

The WPA might improve its standing over the country by "cutting off" those less needy and those of the "political darling" class—a class which always kicks up its heels when its full demands are not met—and by supplanting them with poor men who for long months have sought and hoped for employment in vain through no fault of their own.

Some day, comparative figures may be available to the people of this and other counties, so that they may know the actual circumstances of certain persons WPA-employed, and also those of folks who have been denied work on the WPA. Then it will be found that the WPA, through no fault of the system as originally conceived but through the fallacies of politics, went "on strike" against some of the people before anybody ever went "on strike" against the WPA itself.

**GOODMAN WARNS
STATE STRIKERS**

**Ky. WPA Administrator Says
Strikes Will Not Be
Tolerated**

Louisville, Ky., July 8—George H. Goodman, Works Projects Administrator, has instructed all administrative personnel under him to warn WPA workers that they will lose their jobs if they strike and remain away from their jobs five days.

The recent act of Congress extending WPA for another year carries a clause extending working hours to 130 per month. Mr. Goodman has a telegram from Col. F. C. Harrington, commissioner, at Washington, which reads in part, as follows:

"In cases where groups of workers stop work in protest against requirement that they work 130 hours per month to earn security wage, it should be explained to them or their representatives that this is a requirement provided by law and that no official of the Works Progress Administration has any authority to depart from it."

"Workers should be informed that decision rests entirely in their hands as to whether they desire to accept employment under the conditions under which the Works Progress Administration can offer such employment."

"Those who do not desire to accept employment under these conditions and who absent themselves from work for five consecutive working days or longer, shall have their employment terminated."

Mr. Goodman said there had been no protest strikes in Kentucky and that he had ordered copies of Col. Harrington's wire posted on all projects that there might be no misunderstandings and that everyone might know the course to be followed by him has no alternative.


