Dr. D. H. Daniel Wednesday opened the Prestonsburg General hospital at West Prestonsburg at a total cost of \$25,000, but the opening was quiet, without fanfare.

"We are merely beginning work," said Dr. Daniel. "I have brought two patients here from Paintsville, the others have been discharged and I am now ready to serve Floyd and surrounding counties with a modern hospital."

As quietly as that Prestonsburg's first hospital had its opening.
