> The slayer, Joe Hall, 20, ex-sweetfrom a .32-calibre revolver at close range as he accosted the couple en route home from church. Hale fell dead with two bullets in his head. One of Hall's bullets struck the girl at the corner of her right eye, emerging at her right temple. As she ran, another bullet passed through her thigh.

The wounded girl said at the Martin General hospital that jealousy prompted Hall to fire. She had not been told Thursday morning that her fiance was dead. Miss Porter said Hall had told her brother that her proposed marriage to Hale would be broken up, regardless of what means would be necessary to be taken. She was quoted as saying that her courtship with Hall ended, about two years ago.
