NEW FIRE TRUCK ARRIVES: RATE SLASH SEEN

Prestonsburg's new fire truck arrived Thursday, a volunteer fire department was organized and held its first drill Sunday, and within a few weeks a reduction in fire insurance rates will become effective.

The truck, purchased at a cost of \$4,970.50 from the Roanoke Welding Company and the Howard Motor Company here, is equipped with 1,000 feet of 21/2-inch and 300 feet of 11/2inch hose, and a booster tank with a capacity of 150 gallons for subduing

ACCUSED NAMED AS THIRD MAN IN DEATHROOM

BULLETIN: Shortly before THE **FIMES** was published, Tommy Ratliff waived preliminary hearing, and his

Judge Stephens Thursday morning testified that while he and Cross engaged in friendly conversation in Cross' room, Ratliff stood behind him.

"Tommy Ratliff was standing at my back and, all at once, the shot. When I looked around, Tommy was gone," he stated.

Asked if Ratliff was in the room at the time the shot was fired, he replied, "Absolutely."

Judge Stephens said that, although Cross waved his revolver about, he at no time appeared angry with anybody. He added that he did not see Ratliff with a weapon.

"When Waid fell," he said, "I stood looking at him. I couldn't realize he was hurt."

Mills Co, which is building the Mayo Trail south of Louisa, alleging she sustained permanent injuries when a rock sent flying from a blast made by the defendant company crashed through the window of her home and struck, her in the face. Farmers in 105 counties in Kentucky co-operated with county agents and the state College of Agriculture in 798 demonstrations in growing hybrid corn last year. Yields averaged 9.3 over common kinds. The top yield was 64.7 bushels, made by a yellow hybrid called Ky. Y102.

Demonstrations also were begun last year in co-operation with commercial hybrid corn seed producers in 33 counties. "The dry season was more unfavorable for large, later white hybrids than for small, earlier yellow hybrids," comments W. C. Johnstone, of the College of Agriculture. "The yellow hybrids were particularly high in tests where the drouth was severe, but in the high yielding plots, particularly those little affected by drouth, the better white hybrids consistently outyielded the yellows, with the possible exception of Ky. Y102."

END OF THE TRAIL . . .

66T WAS looking for parkers," Deputy Constable Jimmy Hatfield of Pike county, who shot to death a young Williamson, W. Va., auto mechanic, at a Pike county roadside last week, is quoted as saying in explanation of the tragedy.

And he found his quarry. Parkers. Young William Stock and his wife.

Parked at the roadside—what a ghastly crime!

He wasn't looking for bootleggers, moonshiners, thieves or any of those more serious law violators, if we are to believe Hatfield was correctly quoted in the newspapers. He was looking for parkers.

And so a man was killed-in the name of the law, in the name of a law whose representative was concerning himself with a minor offense that often pays off well.

One wonders why County Judges do not exercise better, saner judgment in approving the appointment of such officers. Pertinent questions a Judge might ask himself are: Is this man a good citizen himself? Or is he the "coffee money" type? Is he to be trusted with a deadly weapon in the pursuit of his duties? Or is he the type that considers his weapon not a means of defense or law enforcement but an engine of destruction and one to be used?

And, seeing a grim sort of mockery made of law enforcement as a result of such dereliction of official duty on the part of County Judges, one also wonders why the State Legislature does not eliminate the office of deputy constable or restrict its duties to that of executing the processes of Magistrates' courts.

Not all such officers are bad, but the bad so overshadow the good that elimination of the office would relieve the body politic of something it would fare

RE-DISTRICTING, IN FLOYD COUNTY UNNECESSARY

THE RUMOR persists that Floyd county will be redistricted so as to give the county eight instead of four Magisterial divisions.

But THE TIMES confidently expects no such thing to happen

It believes that County Judge Hill will agree that four more Magistrates will serve no good purpose; that the county's fiscal affairs can be administered by four men as well as eight—that, in fact, there is less chance for error, unintentional or otherwise, by the lesser number of men doing the spending for the

It is quite possible that some changes in the boundaries of certain districts could be made so as to make the Magistrates more easily accessible to certain sections but that can be done without splitting the county four more ways.

With improved roads, the resident of a section ten miles removed from the Magistrate's headquarters is as near now as his father would have been, two miles from the Magistrate, fifteen years ago.

Addition of four more Magistrates will mean an additional \$24 for the taxpayers to pay, each time the fiscal court meets. A costly luxury, that, to satisfy the ambitions of a few individuals and politicians.

The people of Floyd county, in the months to come, should not concern themselves with re-districting. What they should begin to think more about is the serious job of electing FOUR good and capable men to represent them.

Points By Other Editors

LET'S CLEAN UP OUR COUNTY, TOO

DURING the recent term of circuit court just closed, Police Judge James Bailey was convicted of the offense of misfeasance in office and assessed a fine of \$200. We have no comment to make upon the justice of the conviction, but, according to the evidence brought out on the trial, he is not the only city official guilty of neglect of his official duties. Kentucky Statutes require that "every official of a county,

. . or incorporated town, whose duty it is, by reason of his office, to receive and disburse funds shall, within thirty days after the close of the fiscal year, CAUSE TO BE PUBLISHED IN A NEWSPAPER a statement showing the amounts received," and the dates, to whom paid and the amounts disbursed, and for what purpose, and shall pay for such publication from funds in his hands. Every official guilty of failure or refusal to have such a statement published shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon indictment and conviction shall be fined not less than \$50"

We do not know that there is anything crooked in the conduct of the city or county offices, but WE DO KNOW that, during the past two years, there has been NO FINANCIAL STATEMENT published by either the City Treasurer or the County Treasurer. It was said, in the trial of the Bailey case, that the Mayor had received and disbursed certain funds without allowing those funds to go through the hands of the City Treasurer. If this is true, the Mayor is required by law to publish a statement of the funds so received and disbursed, and failure or refusal to do so will subject him to indictment. The City Treasurer must also publish such a statement.

The County Treasurer has expressed himself as willing to publish a financial statement, but unwilling or unable to provide for any payment for such publication. The statute provides for payment "from funds in hand," and the payment is as much a part of his obligation as the statement itself.

Another statute, which has not been repealed, provides for publication BY THE FISCAL COURT, of a full list of all claims allowed by that court in each fiscal year. This has NEVER been published.

There must be some reason for the reluctance of these officials to allow their acts to be exposed to the light of publicity. It may be that "there is something rotten in Denmark"-or at least in Magoffin county. The taxpayers of Salyersville and of Magoffin county are awaking to the fact that this money which goes through the hands of the city and county officials is their money, and that they are entitled to know just what has been done with it.

Before the next grand jury, in April, let's get back of these officials and see that these statements are published. If they continue their refusal or failure to have this publication made, then our only recourse is to go before the grand jury and indict each responsible official-the Mayor, the City Treasurer, the County Treasurer and each member of the Fiscal Court.—Salyersville Independent.

THE "PISTOL DEPUTY"

THE INCIDENT on Pond Creek last week-end was a bloody example of a disgraceful error in Kentucky's law enforcement system—a system which permits the indiscriminate appointment of deputy constables.

To begin with, there should be absolutely no need in this state for a deputy constable. To the sheriff of the county, the state police and the elected constables should go the entire responsibility for law enforce-

The fee system of remuneration for constables and their deputies is the real menace of the whole set-up. State police, county sheriffs and their deputies are on a salary basis. In most cases, these officers make arrests on truly responsible charges.

Not so with many constables and their deputies over the state. They have made nuisances of themselves by making arrests for profit. If constables are to be employed as law enforcement officers, the state system should provide them with a salary.

The Pond Creek incident is only one of scores and hundreds of episodes throughout the state resulting from the indiscriminate appointment of deputy con-

These fellows are called "pistol deputies." They get an appointment from a constable so that they can carry a gun. They have been known to settle personal grievances with the guns the state permits them to carry. These cases are varied, and familiar

The News does not imply that all deputy constables are killers. Many, many of them are upright citizens, doing great service in their counties. Pike county is fortunate in having only a few of the "pistol deputy"

But The News reiterates an opinion often voiced before-that the fee system of pay, and the indiscriminate appointment of deputy constables is a disgrace to the Commonwealth.

Incidentally, much of the wrongs wrought by this disgraceful system could be righted if the county judge, who must approve all appointments, would exercise discretion -Pike County News.




