The elder Hale was named as the man who fired the shot which killed Harrison. His son and Porter were accused of having entered into a criminal conspiracy with him to effect the officer's slaying. Newsome and Brown also were accused of having plotted Collins' death.

First day of the term saw seven defendants convicted and fined. Five of the seven were charged with drunkenness and drew fines ranging from \$10 to \$50. Basil Coburn, convicted of having operated an automobile while intoxicated, was fined \$300 and his driver's license was revoked for the period of one year. George Bradley was fined \$50 for assault and battery.

READ THE SORDID DETAILS...

66 RIAR BUCK," in other columns of this week's D TIMES, tells a heartrending story of privation, suffering and death, here in Prestonsburg. (For details, see his column).

Read the story, and if your shame and indignation is not deep and bitter-get down on your knees and ask God to give you a heart.

There is no need, now, for censuring others. Selfrecrimination will not help, neither will pity for the woman who suffered. The only good, if any, this pitiful case may do is to make the stricken ones martyrs in the great, losing cause of the poor and to make some of us who could, do better toward suffering, deserving humanity.

We passed them by-most of us did not see them. Then let us take steps NOW to see that this shall not happen again among us.

Prestonsburg annually gives, along with other communities of the county, to good causes-the Red Cross, the Christmas Seal drive, to other funds for the general good. But it can, without reducing its contributions to these causes, set up its own Community Chest, or some similar fund, organize with all its officials as volunteers, unpaid, and thus reach out a helping hand in certain emergencies where other organizations do not enter.

As THE TIMES, impelled by this instance of stark tragedy, at this moment views the matter, such an organization could and should work unostensibly, attracting little attention to those whom it helps. There are those, you know, who still have the grit to try to "make it, somehow," and who shrink from public relief from their troubles.

Then this organization-call it what you willshould be formed with the express purpose of helping only those whom the WPA and its several branches, the Red Cross and other benevolent agencies do not help.

Yes, there are many of them. It may be a widow "outside the pale" with the WPA (as was that widow and her children near Maytown); it may be some person of whom the Red Cross has not heard or whom it cannot help; it may be some child at Christmastime who will find Christmas morn just another day.

The opportunity to be of service is here-if we but take the opportunity to serve.

Uncertainty of that future fills some with foreboding, leaves others pleasurably expectant. None of us knows, and it is well that it is so, what the morrow holds.

But, on the whole, Floyd county surely is justified in looking forward toward brighter days for business.

Its principal industries, in the mines and on the farm, may reasonably expect busier, more profitable times. The country's vast re-armament program requires steel, and steel requires coal. Those on the farm who raise livestock may expect better prices for their hogs and cattle and sheep. As for our products of the soil, they supply few markets.

Aside from all this is the construction now under way of a 10-mile stretch of railroad from West Prestonsburg to the site on Middle Creek of what will be a new coal mining town. This work, it has been estimated, will cost \$780,000. Add to that the work to be done at the proposed mining center in tipple and home construction, and you have thousands of dollars more spent in new work in this county. And, after the mine is operating, a production of a million tons of coal a year is anticipated from the Middle Creek field.

The next twelve months holds unknown grief for many of us. But, on the whole, Floyd county cannot but look upward as she, for the present at least, occupies the center of the stage in the industrial comeback of Eastern Kentucky.

Points By Other Editors

EXPANSION FOR INDUSTRY

CERTAIN industries have been reluctant to exb pand. They have felt, and with reason, that the collapse of the defense emergency might well catch them with plant facilities which were not then necessary. Loss might be caused, which industrial proprietors naturally would like to avoid if possible.

The President's talk of December 29 makes it plain that he considers the emergency so urgent that this is no longer a primary consideration. "The possible consequences of failure of our defense efforts now are much more to be feared," the President said, than the chance that some excess plant capacity may be built.

This situation deserves great consideration by all industries whose productive capacity proves unable to supply what is needed for defense as well as at the same time providing for the normal needs of civilian life.

We have tried, at the outset of the defense effort, to set on top of normal production of our industries the extra load of war production. As the effort swings into full stride, it becomes clear that industry will not always bear both.

Then two things become necessary: Until additional facilities are built which will provide both at once, civil consumption must be cut down while the military bill is filled. In other words if auto plants can't build both pleasure cars and tanks, the tanks must be built, and you wait for your new car. Then, if a new tank plant or a new auto plant can be built. maybe you can have both.

Our whole life today has become simply a balancing of risks, a choice between two evils. To build excess capacity and find it unused when the emergency has passed is bad. But to attempt to build defense and find it inadequate because of reluctance to build sufficient capacity is worse.

There is much also in what the President said about greater needs after the emergency has passed. The Muscle Shoals nitrate plant, for instance, built for war uses in 1917-18, passed out of use after the war emergency, yet it became valuable again as the keystone of the TVA regional development, which in turn has become a great national asset in prepared-

We do not know precisely what productive facilities we may need after the emergency has passed. We only know that it certainly is better, from the national point of view, to have too much rather than too little, hard though it may occasionally be on individual proprietors and stockholders. Today only the national interest can be paramount .- Ashland Daily Independent.
