POST TO MEET HERE TO PLAN METAL DRIVE

AS ALUMINUM WEEK STARTS MONDAY FOR DEFENSE

Floyd Post, American Legion, will meet Saturday night at the courthouse here in a special session to formulate plans for the observance in Floyd county of National Aluminum Week, July 21-26, W. I. Myers, post commander, announced Wednesday.

Means of collecting the old aluminum which will be contributed by citizens during the week to the cause of National Defense will be arranged, as also will central points of accumulation, the designation of workers, and other arrangements necessary to place Floyd county among the section's leaders in this patriotic endeavor.

Working with the Legion, with his efforts directed mainly to the farming sections of the county, County Agent S. L. Isbell has given Floyd Post assurance of his full co-operation.

James T. Norris, state Legion Commander, Wednesday stressed the fact that only old aluminum is sought at this time. Old aluminum is of the same value in the construction of airplane parts as new, it was stated.

Floyd county miners last week shipped two truckloads of aluminum for this same purpose, and other citizens of the county are thus set an example that they should equal if not surpass, Legion officials said.

Martin Man Dies July 9 at 75; Was Long Ill

William Smith, well-known Martin citizen died at his home July 9 following a protracted illness. He was 75 years old.

A native of Knott county, Mr. Smith had resided at Martin for a number of years and was known as one of his community's best men. Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Mary Smith, two sons and three daughters: Sample Smith, Bypro; Mrs. Ethel Prasure, Bypro; Mrs. G. H. Dings and Casper Smith, of Martin, and Mrs. Perry Stumbo, of Betsy Layne.

The funeral was conducted from the home Thursday, last week, the Rev. C. C. Newsome, of Maytown, officiating. Burial was made at Martin under the direction of the Ryan Funeral Home.

YOUTH FOUND FATALLY SHOT

MOTHER OF VICTIM IS WEST P'BURG WOMAN

Norvel "Nig" Patrick, 25-year-old son of Mrs. John Joseph, of West Prestonsburg and the late Kern Patrick, was found fatally wounded Sunday in an outbuilding at the home of Grady Salyer, Paintsville. He died three hours later at the Paintsville hospital without regaining consciousness. The bullet had entered high in his forehead, emerging at the other side of his head.

Relatives had not learned full details of the circumstances surrounding the shooting.

The body was brought to the Arnold Funeral Home here, where burial preparations were made. Rites were conducted Tuesday at the graveside in the Patrick cemetery on Burning Fork, Magoffin county, the Rev. G. R. Fannin, West Prestonsburg, officiating.

Besides his mother, the victim is survived by six sisters and one brother: Mrs. M. F. Patton, McGuffey, O.; Mrs. Luna Marshall, Chelisey, Mich.; Mrs. Don W. 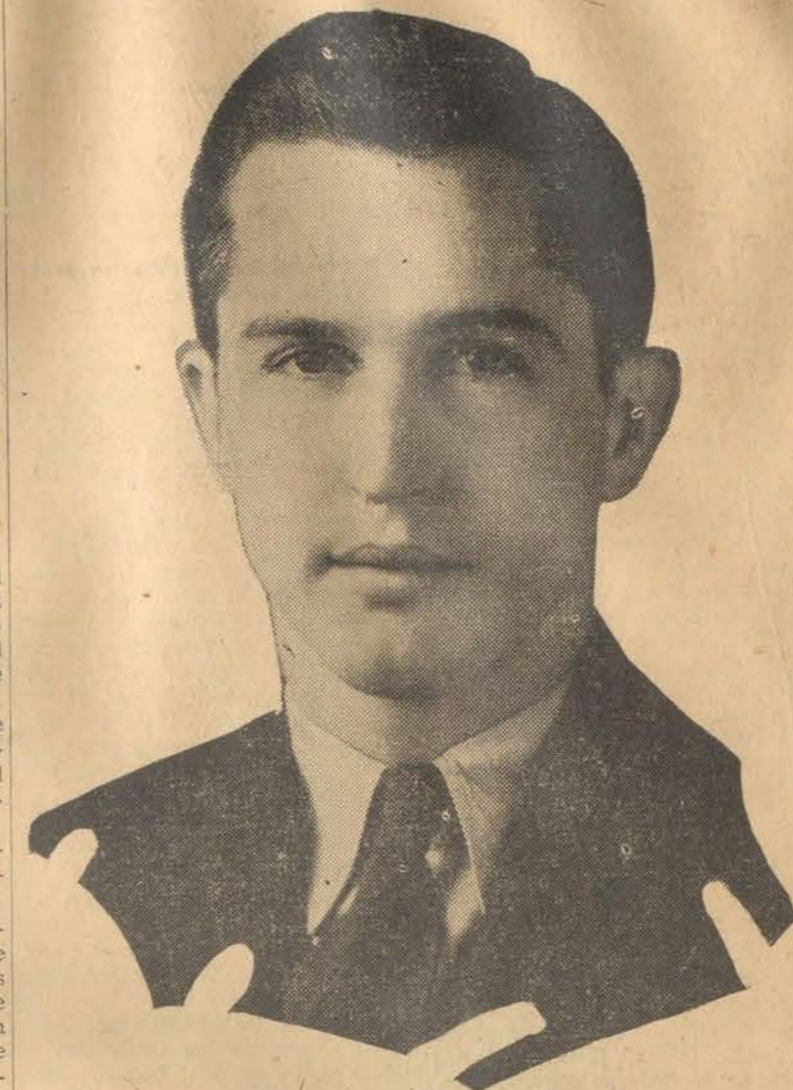

Newsome Is Jailed, Faces 3 Charges

Caleb Newsome, ex-convict who terrorized roadhouses in this section of the county before engaging in a running gunfight with officers on Abbott mountain, near here, was arrested Sunday at his home by Wheelwright police and jailed there. He was brought to the county jail here Monday by Coroner Elliott Prater.

Newsome faces trial on warrants issued by three of the county's four Magistrates. Offenses alleged to him include reckless use of a deadly weapon, and shooting at with intent to kill. A peace warrant was also sworn out against him.

He was arrested, officers said, after heaving a rock through the window of a car when its driver failed to stop at his hall.

RURAL POWER WITHIN WEEK

IS SEEN BY CO-OP AS SUB-STATION PARTS ARRIVE

With the arrival Wednesday of a transformer for the sub-station located on the Branham farm, near here, electrification of not less than 150 homes located on the first power line constructed in this section by the Rural Electrification Administration will be effected not later than next week, Lawrence Hubbard, superintendent of the Big Sandy REA co-operative, said Wednesday.

First homes to receive REA current will be those on Abbott Creek, Right Fork of Middle Creek, the Auxier-Cliff section of this county, Bull Creek and the Jenny's Creek section of Johnson county. The number of homes energized will be increased from day to day as meters are installed and other arrangements are made.

Contract for construction of additional mileage in the territory to be served by the "B" allotment has been let and work will be begun not later than Monday, Mr. Hubbard said. Terms of the contract specify that the work must be completed within a period of 100 days. G. L. Collins has been appointed lineman and maintenance man for the co-operative.

The Big Sandy co-op's office was moved, a few days ago, from the Layne building, near the First National Bank, to more spacious quarters in the old Marris home, First avenue. The four front rooms of the residence will be used as offices, the two rooms at the rear for storage space.

NEGRO SLAYS WHITE MAN AT W'WRIGHT

POKER GAME DISPUTE ENDS SUNDAY IN GUNFIGHT

A poker game dispute over \$1.70 was said to have resulted in an early Sunday morning gunfight at Wheelwright in which a white man was fatally wounded and two negroes were shot.

Marion Hall, a native of the Left Beaver Creek section, died instantly with four revolver bullets in his body. His slayer, Joe Nelson, negro, was shot through his wrist and thigh and a third bullet grazed his head. A second negro, Robert "Pump" Finley, was shot in his arm and twice in his leg as he fled the room in which the battle was staged at close range.

Nelson fled to the hills but surrendered to Wheelwright police Tuesday night and was jailed here after midnight Tuesday.

The shooting took place at the slayer's home after an all-night session of poker. According to testimony gained by Commonwealth's Attorney John Allen and Coroner Elliott Prater, who investigated the

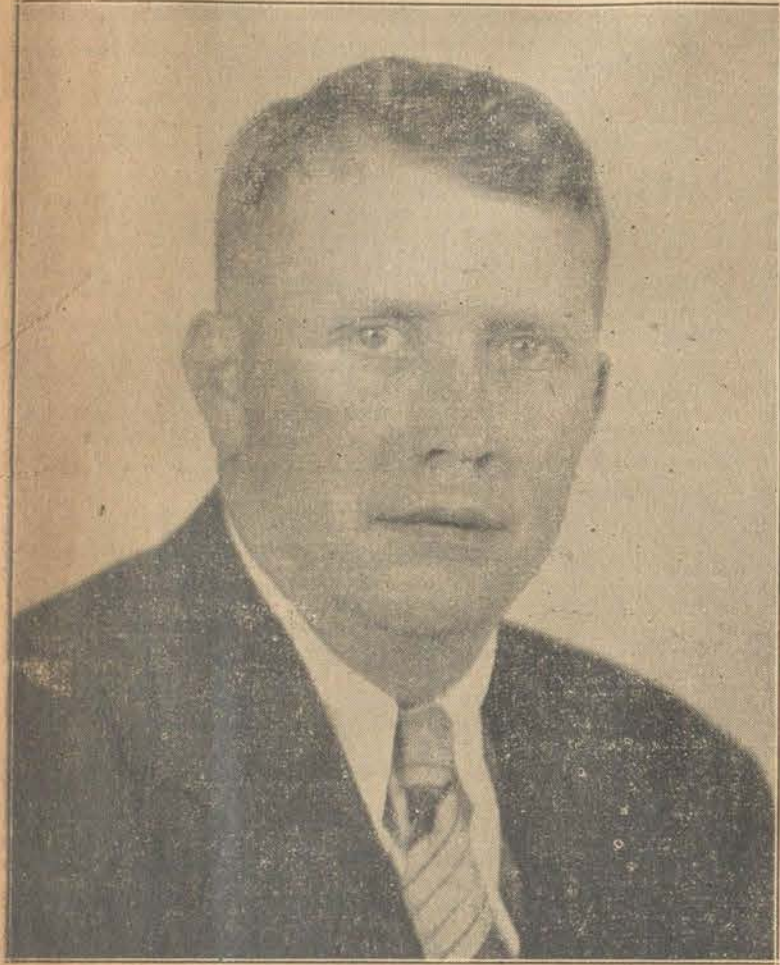

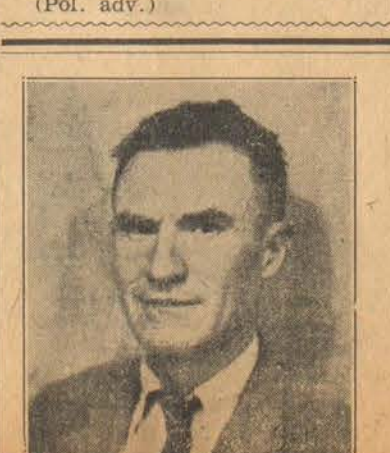

The procedure, of a revolutionary nature in Floyd county education, was directed by Palmer L. Hall, rural school supervisor.

"We feel," Mr. Hall said, "that this first day spent in meeting the parents and children in their homes will be worth more than a day at the schoolhouse. It is, of course, somewhat experimental, but we hope that it will make the school more of a community institution and that the teacher thus will gain a better knowledge of her pupils and their environment."

Teachers were asked to continue these home visits, so that every home in the several districts would be visited during the first few days of school. The plan is expected to be particularly beneficial in instances where the teacher is new to the profession or her district.

Classwork began Tuesday morning. Approximately 160 teachers of the rural schools met here Friday morning in the first teacher-meeting of the school year. The meeting program follows:

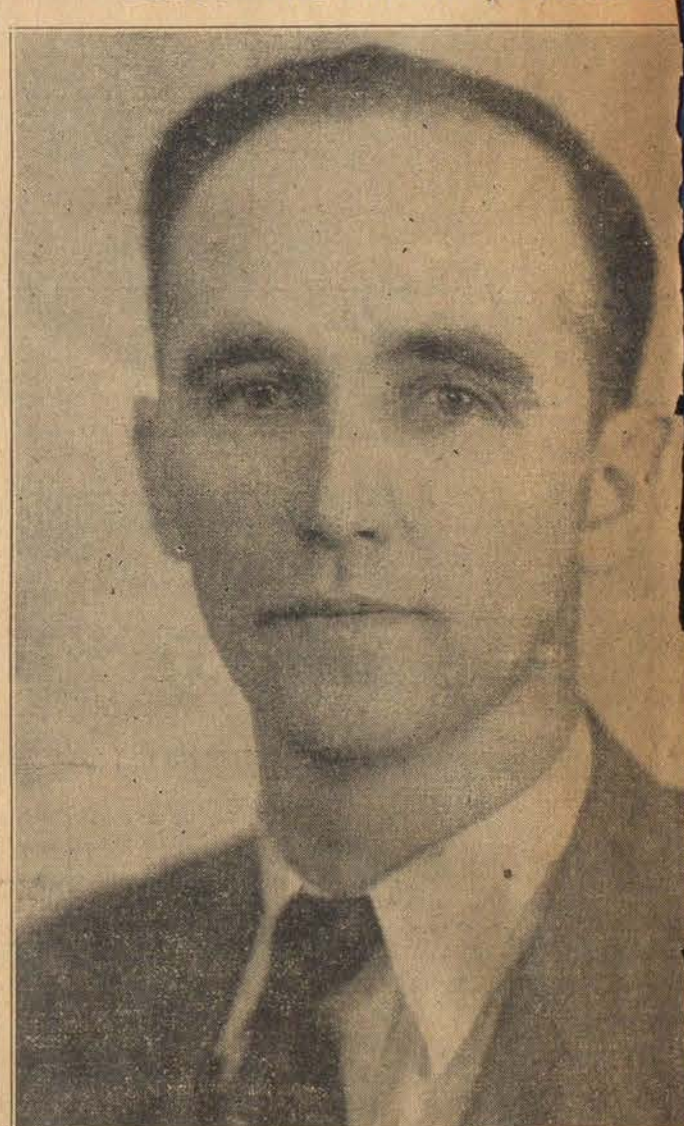

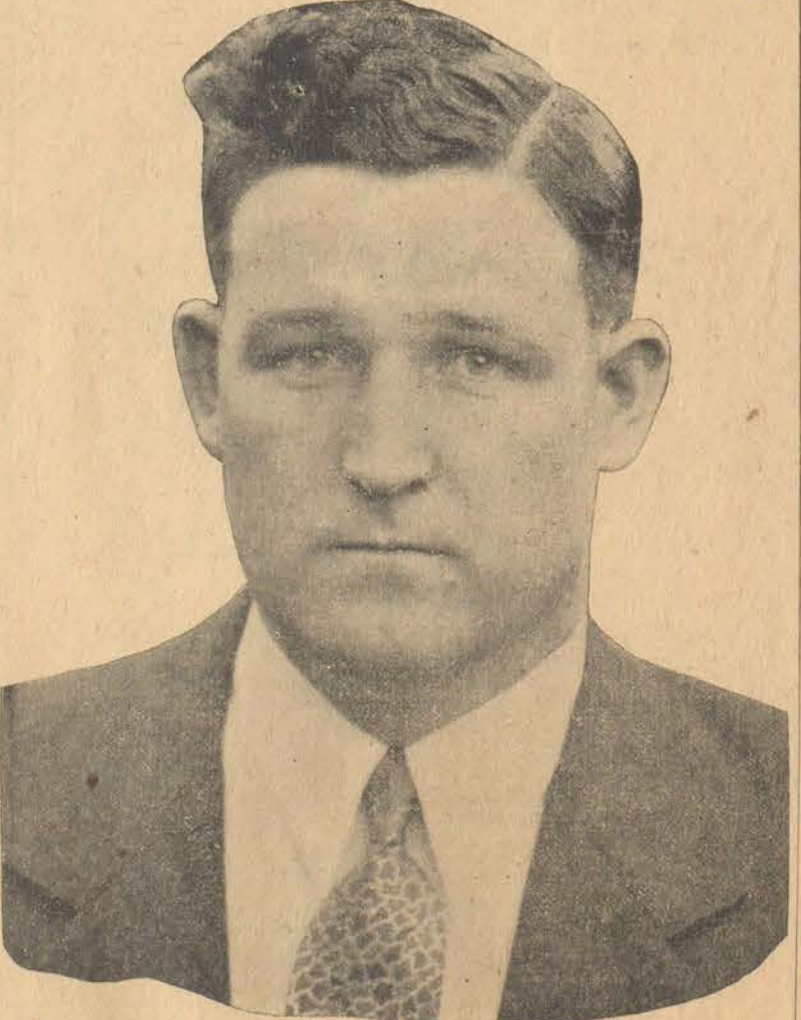

Cadet's Letter Tells Of Army Activities

(In a letter to his mother, Mrs. Byrd C. May, Cadet David D. May, West Point, N. Y., interestingly describes army activities at Fort Benning, Ga., as seen through the eyes of a young man being trained in military technique at the nation's famed school for future army officers. The letter follows:)

West Point, N. Y., June 22, 1941
"We arrived here about 7:30 this morning, having left Fort Benning at 9:30 p. m. Friday. We were not off the train en route.
"The stay at Benning was very interesting and profitable. We really saw how an army works from the fighting angle through health to the administration of supply and sanitation.

"We were out seeing demonstrations and sometimes actually firing from about 7 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. Everything was spectacular. We saw a pontoon bridge built across a 260-foot river in 50 minutes and over this bridge went 5½-ton tanks, heavy trucks, and a regiment of infantrymen. From all I saw I am now more confident of our powers as a fighting force. In fact, the army at Benning is one to be proud of.

"We saw mass parachute jumps from planes and studied phases of administration and technique of the army. I flew in one of the two motor bombers out over Hampton Roads and saw my first view of the Atlantic. Also at Benning I descended from the 200-foot tower by means of a parachute. The jump was quite a thrill. The tower is used for training of the parachute troops.

"We also studied the armored force and rode in the 'Bantam' car which can do things a mountain goat wouldn't think of doing. Also took a ride in one of the tanks.

"It is now afternoon and quite warm. We had an excellent dinner today—duck, peas, potatoes, milk, tea, coffee and ice cream.

"I will be away from West Point four more weeks in all this summer. I will let you know later just when I will be away."

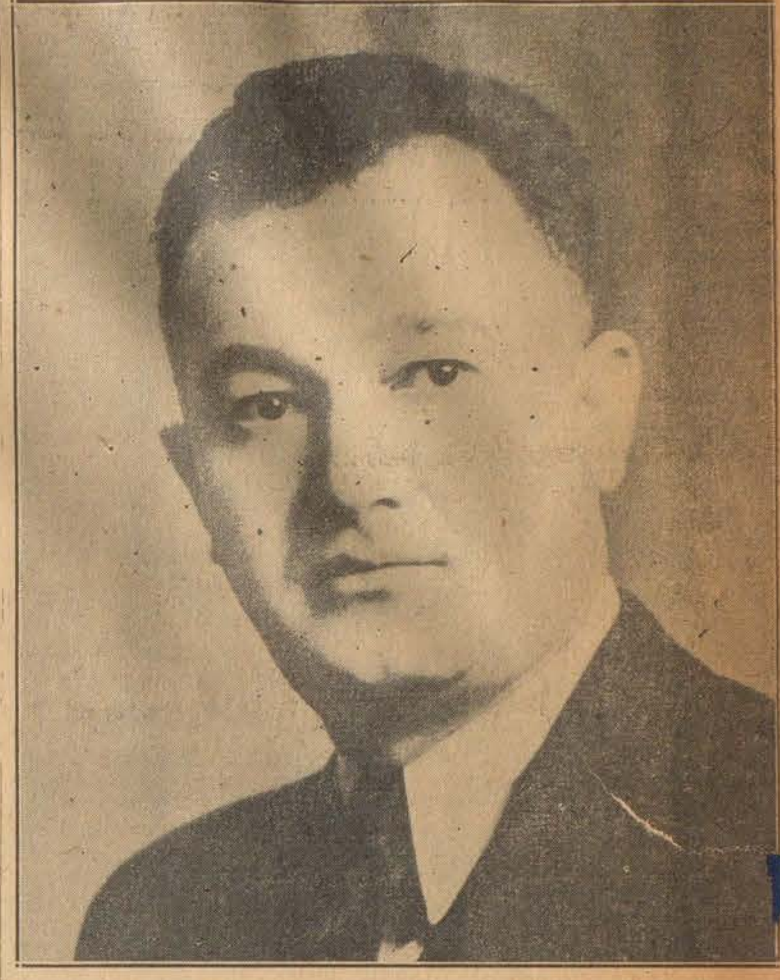

Dr. Stumbo, as you know, has two hospitals to look after and it looks like he has enough to do to keep them going and he does not need the Sheriff's office as he would not have time to give it the attention that it needs. Why not give it to some one that would give it his time and attention?

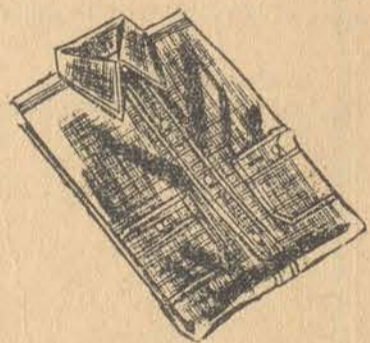

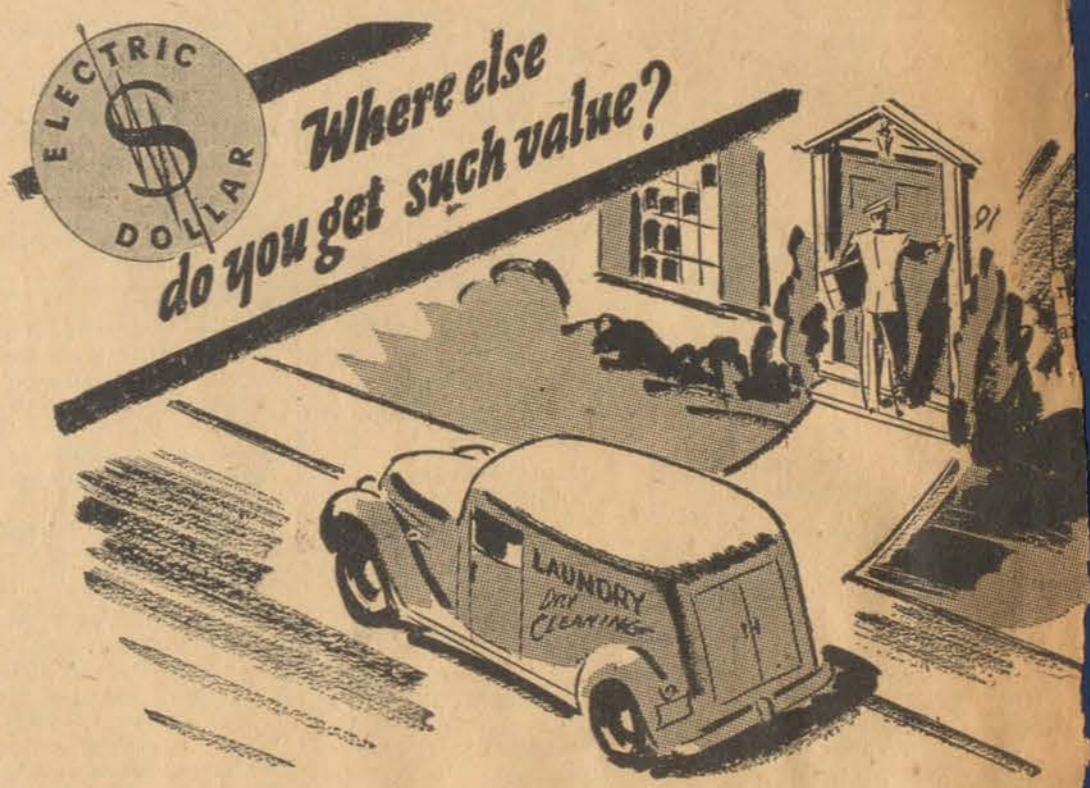
