

BURKE NAMED SUCCESSOR TO SHORT

LATE CO. ATTORNEY'S BROTHER-IN-LAW APPOINTED

Harry R. Burke, Prestonsburg, was named Monday by County Judge E. P. Hill, Jr., to serve as County Attorney during the remaining seven months of the term of his late brother-in-law, Forrest D. Short.

In making the appointment, which followed Mr. Short's death by a week, Judge Hill issued the following statement:

"I have this date appointed Harry R. Burke as County Attorney of Floyd county, to fill out the seven months remaining of the unexpired term, caused by the recent death of Hon. Forrest D. Short. I have done this upon the suggestion of the widow of Forrest Short, and of his mother, Mrs. Mollie Short.

"Harry R. Burke has agreed to pay to the widow and child the substantial part of the income from the remaining portion of the term, and has assured me he is not a candidate for any office, and that he will not become a candidate later."

Burke, a Republican, is 37 years old and is the son of the late Dr. I. M. Burke and of Mrs. Loula A. Burke, of Bonanza. He received his legal education at the Louisville School of Law after having attended Berea College and the Louisiana Normal. He began the practice of law here in October, 1926.

Mr. Burke's statement in part, issued following his appointment, follows:

"The untimely death of our brother, your friend and servant, Forrest D. Short, has not only brought sorrow and sadness to all of us, but the people lost a faithful, courageous and fearless servant.

"I am extremely mindful of this fact and enter into the discharge of the duties of the office of County Attorney to the best of my ability. I fondly hope that the trust reposed in me by the Honorable E. P. Hill, County Judge, and numerous others will never abate.

"To Goldia Short, the widow, and Larry Douglas Short, the son of the late Forrest D. Short, I say to you that the office of County Attorney was entrusted to him and the emoluments therefrom (always well earned) were his. I have signed giving you half of this office, and I publicly declare you entitled to that much and, if necessity demand—then, more.

BOND DENIED SLONE AFTER HEARING IN SLAYING OF LACKEY OFFICER

TRIPLETT'S SLAYER, FORMER POLICEMAN AT LACKEY—18 SHOTS FIRED IN GUNFIGHT FRIDAY EVENING—EXAMINING TRIAL CONDUCTED WEDNESDAY

One of 18 bullets fired in a revolver duel late Friday afternoon at Lackey between a policeman and his predecessor in office took effect, and Lackey's 20-year-old Town Marshal, Marvin (Jack) Triplett, fell dying.

His adversary, Allen Slone, former marshal at Lackey, was untripped.

Triplett survived less than half an hour after Slone's bullet had struck him below the heart and passed through his liver.

Slone surrendered to Deputy Sheriff G. D. Ryan and was brought to jail here, a few hours following the shooting. He was quoted by officers as saying that Triplett emptied two revolvers at him and that he fired only in self-defense.

'CASELOAD' LIGHTEST IN GENERATION, ALLEN SAYS

When the Knott circuit court convenes July 14, the smallest docket in a generation will be ready for trial, Commonwealth's Attorney John Allen said here this week.

The court docket contains, in all, only 82 cases, of which 31 are officially "before the court," defendants in 51 not having been arrested up till Monday of this week.

Two murder cases are on the docket—that in which Melvin Bolen is accused of killing Jake Lester and the murder charge against Leonard Bolen in the ambush slaying of Floyd Wallen.

Three other murders will be investigated by the grand jury, Mr. Allen said.

16,817 LISTED FOR SCHOOLS

PER CAPITA RATE MAY NET FLOYD \$213,575

A school population of 16,817—and girls aged six to 17, inclusive—will net Floyd county, on the basis of the proposed school per capita of \$12.70, a total of \$213,575.90.

School census figures were released this week by County Attendance Officer Leonard Martin, who said that the total was approximately 500 short of last year's census. This shortage is accounted for by the removal of mine families from Wayland, Garrett, Lackey and other communities and by duplication of names in the taking of district census by teachers.

The census, as it now stands, is correct, Mr. Martin said, since he and his assistants have visited several districts in person to correct existing mistakes.

Of the 16,817 schoolchildren listed, 8,546 are white boys, 8,033 are white girls. The remaining 238 are colored students.

DWALE SLAYER IS CAPTURED

HALL JAILED HERE; TAKEN AFTER FIGHT WITH VA. DEPUTIES

Joe Hall's itching trigger finger last week ended his flight from capture for the slaying at Dwale on the night of April 2 of Henry Hale and the shooting and wounding of his former sweetheart, Miss Minnie Marie Porter.

When Deputy Sheriffs undertook to arrest him near Grundy, Va., on a charge of drunkenness, May 25, Hall engaged them in a gun battle, shooting one of the officers through the arm. His ammunition supply exhausted, he was arrested.

Hall was identified through records furnished the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Washington by Special C. & O. Agent G. L. Gray, of Allen. Mr. Gray had forwarded fingerprints and photographs of Hall to the F.B.I., and these were checked against prints taken by Virginia authorities. He had been registered at the Grundy jail as James Joseph Hall.

The slayer was jailed here, shortly before midnight Wednesday, by Special Officer Gray who will collect the reward offered for Hall's arrest.

The slayer waived extradition and entered the jail in high spirits, Jailer Will Halbert said. Special Agent Gray said he did not appear downcast upon his return to the county.

The youthful Hall, who had but recently been freed on parole from the state reformatory for shooting and wounding Paul Wallen and child at Dwale, killed Hale as the latter and his fiancée, Miss Porter, were walking home from church at Dwale. He shot Miss Porter as she ran, witnesses said.

Floyd county officers searched in Dwale and vicinity for several days and nights for the slayer, but finally gave up their quest in the face of repeated failures to locate their quarry.

Hall was indicted at the last grand jury session here for wilful murder and for shooting and wounding with intent to kill. Mother of his victim had placed a reward of \$50 for his arrest, and the county has been asked to add \$100 to this amount.

The prisoner told Special Agent Gray that he spent the night of the killing in a barn, across the river from Dwale and the following night in a Pikeville hotel, later going to Kansas and back to Virginia where he remained with relatives until captured.

HANDICAPPED TO RECEIVE EDUCATION

TEACHER PAYROLL TO APPROXIMATE \$300,000

Three hundred ninety teachers and 23 substitute teachers were hired Tuesday by the Floyd County Board of Education for service during the coming school year in county grade and high schools.

Their employment, County Superintendent Town Hall said, will entail during the coming school year a payroll outlay of approximately \$300,000.

Also provided by the Board at the meeting was, for the first time in the county's educational history, tutelage of handicapped children. There are, Superintendent Hall said, approximately 300 crippled and otherwise handicapped children of school age in the county who are unable to attend school. Since the per capita tax is paid on handicapped children as well as those able to attend school, the Board held that their per capita aggregate should be spent for their education. Mrs. Goldia Short, widow of Forrest D. Short, was employed as supervisor of this work, and she will be required to see that teachers of the various schools give the handicapped children adequate and regular attention.

Two school buses were purchased by the Board at the meeting—a Ford from the Howard Motor Company here for approximately \$2,500 and a Chevrolet from the Valley Chevrolet Sales, Prestonsburg, for approximately \$2,300. Each bus will have a passenger capacity of 56.

Contract for construction of a two-room brick school at Dwale was awarded to Reynolds and Gunnels on their low bid of \$8,300. Three other bids ranged above the low bid to a high bid of \$9,400. The structure will be built so that rooms may be added as needed and will include a basement for the housing of a central hot-air heating system.

Bonds of the Dwale district for school construction were sold to the First National Bank at an interest rate of 4 1/2 per cent.

For the removal of the five-room frame Stamper Branch school to Lick Fork at the new mine site, and re-construction of the building, Bennie Caudill, Garrett, was awarded contract on his low bid of \$2,900. Highest bid on the job was \$4,400.

JR. SPORTSMEN WORK TOLD

During the latter part of the school year V. A. Hayes, vice-president of the Floyd County Fish and Game Club, organized Junior Sportsmen's clubs in the consolidated schools of Maytown, Wayland, Prestonsburg and Martin, with a total membership of 554 boys.

The Fish and Game Division of Kentucky furnished Mr. Hayes with valuable literature for the boys, such as the Fish and Game laws, wildlife posters, trapping regulations, forest fire prevention posters, information for hunters and fishermen, Kentucky road maps and stream maps. The Federal Cartridge Company, Western Cartridge Company and the Winchester Repeating Arms Company sent each of the members a copy of "Upland Game Restoration" and the Federal Cartridge Company sent each of the boys a complete set of conservation advertisements, posters on how to handle a gun and information on winter feeding of quail; the Sporting Arms and Ammunition Manufacturers Institute sent each a handbook on small-bore rifle shooting, and "The 10 Commandments of Safety" in the handling of fire-arms.

Congressman A. J. May had the U.S. Department of Agriculture send to each boy a copy of Terracing for Soil and Water Conservation, Cover Crops for Soil Conservation, Propagation of Aquatic Game Birds, and Improving the Farm Environment for Wildlife. Mr. Hayes gave the boys interesting lectures on conservation and care in handling of firearms; E. R. Burke, conservation officer, gave instructions in bait-casting in each of the schools. Mr. Hayes, assisted by Mr. Burke, staged a rifle match in each school and the two winners in each school were to compete for a first and second prize in the finals.

In Maytown the winner was Austin Cassidy, with Arthur Marshall, runner-up. At Wayland J. D. Tufts was the winner with his brother, Curtis Tufts, the runner-up. At Prestonsburg Adrian Gunnels was the winner, with Warren Delong the runner-up and at Martin they did not compete in the school shoot but sent Nighbert Coleman and Milton Ryan to Wayland to shoot in the finals. Saturday, May 24, these eight boys met and shot 15 shots each at 50 yards and Austin Cassidy was the winner, and his shooting partner from Maytown, Arthur Marshall, came in second. The Floyd County Fish and Game Club sponsored this shoot, paying for the targets and ammunition and will award prizes to the two winners in the finals at a later date, and also give to each boy a membership card.

Recruiting Officer Here Friday, Saturday

A representative of the Navy Recruiting Service will be at the post-offices at Wayland, June 5, and Prestonsburg, June 6-7.

Many vacancies exist at this time for enlistment in the navy. Desirable young men between the ages of 17 and 31 who can pass the required physical and mental examination, will be enlisted as apprentice seamen and transferred to the Training Station at Great Lakes, Ill., for recruit training before being sent aboard one of the ships of the United States fleet. The pay while in the rating of apprentice seaman is \$21 a month for the first four months; after four months naval service an increase to \$26 a month is authorized. Board, room and medical attention are furnished free and an initial outfit of uniforms, worth about \$90, is given to each recruit. The present rate of enlistments permit those accepted to be called within a few days.

The navy provides an excellent opportunity to learn any standard trade such as machinist, electrician, carpenter, plumber, stenographer, boilermaker, metalsmith, and many others. Those interested in the United States navy are asked to meet the navy recruiter while he is in your section or write to the Navy Recruiting Station, Ashland, Ky., for further information.

MY FRIENDS

By this time my money and credit too were gone, and I couldn't go to the hospital myself, but thanks to three doctors, I pulled through, left, as you all have seen, in poor health, weighing about 25 pounds less than I did before that illness, and today I am still reaping in health the results of this and my hardships of World War days and nights in the rain and mud of the trenches.

That new home I built is now covered up with mortgages which, as a result of these misfortunes, I'll not be able to pay if I lose this race. What has it profited me to have gone 3,000 miles across the ocean to a cold-hearted war-mad Europe and given health, vigor, and youth, if now Providence turns me out in the world homeless and broken in health and spirit? Am I to enjoy that freedom I spilled my youthful blood to maintain, in a rented "shack" or will my friends stand by their guns in this campaign as loyally as I stood by mine in Flanders Field, and win this election for me so I can pay off these mortgages and enjoy it in this home I have built?

I'm not ashamed to unbosom the above misfortunes to you, because they were visited upon me by Providence. In fact I do so in order that you may know how anxious my wife, children and I will be waiting for the count of your votes in this primary.

stagger forward out of her range of vision. The man named "Pat" — Pat Bentley — testified that Triplett called to him, smiling, and whispered that "Allen's got a pistol on him and I'm going to take it away from him. Stand by and watch me." He added that he watched Slone, as Triplett talked, draw his revolver and point it toward Triplett. "I whirled to the left and started running, heard a shot fired and heard a bullet whiz by me." The witness testified that Triplett could not have fired the shot which passed him.

Alex (Eck) Patton told of parking his car near the Cooley restaurant, of Slone coming to him and asking him when he was going to Wayland. Patton operates a projecting machine in the theater at Wayland for M. H. Staley. Triplett came across the road, hands on his hips but not on his two pistols, a customary posture for the officer, the witness said. Slone fired without a word being spoken; whereupon Triplett jerked his two revolvers and began shooting. "Jack" Triplett marched to his death, according to testimony of Patton.

After the first shot was fired by Slone, according to this witness, the 20-year-old Triplett jerked two guns, began firing as he walked toward Patton's car behind which Slone was partially sheltered. "After he had emptied both guns," Patton said, "Jack came on snapping them, dropped one and tried to re-load the other before starting to fall." Surviving the victim are his

widow, Mrs. Alta Wicker Triplett, a daughter of Mart Wicker for whose slaying Slone and Cluett Messer were convicted in the Floyd circuit court and given two-year penitentiary terms. Their sentences were reversed, however, by the Court of Appeals, and the case has been re-docketed for trial at the September court term.

Other survivors of Triplett are his father, Press Triplett, Ray, Ohio, four brothers and four sisters: Lindsay Triplett, Morehead; Chester Triplett, Ray, Ohio; Maryland Triplett, Dayton, Ohio; Clinton Triplett, of the U.S. army, Alaska; Mrs. Pearl Collins, Lackey; Mrs. Rhoda Foudy, Ray, Ohio; Tressie and Mildred Triplett, Dayton, Ohio.
