Bankers To Convene Here Saturday

OSCAR P. BOND FOUND DEAD MONDAY

ATTORNEY IS HELD VICTIM OF BULLET SELF-INFLICTED

Oscar P. Bond, 34 years old, well-known Prestonsburg attorney, was found dead in his office here Monday morning, a bullet wound in his head.

Coroner Bill Prater held that the wound had been self-inflicted. Physicians expressed the belief that he had died Saturday night or early Sunday.

News of the tragedy came as a shock to relatives and friends throughout this section.

A son of Dr. and Mrs. Charles F. Bond, Prestonsburg, he was born at Irgle, Pike county, Jan. 30, 1907. After his graduation from his school at Catlettsburg, he attended Cumberland College, Williamsburg, Ky., Georgetown College, where he was prominent in athletics, the University of Kentucky and Cumberland University, Lebanon, Tenn., where he graduated in law.

Mr. Bond came to Prestonsburg in 1928 when he began the practice of his profession. On Nov. 14 of the following year he was married to Miss Mary Katherine Baugh, of London, Ky., to which union were born three children, Mary Sue, Charles Stephen and Dorothy Ellen.

A brilliant student, he was one of the section's ablest young attorneys, and during the term of office of the late Circuit Judge John W. Caudill he was Master Commissioner of the Floyd circuit court.

Besides his widow, children and parents, he is survived by one brother, J. D. Bond, Prestonsburg attorney, two sisters, Mrs. Carden Meers, Erlanger, Ky., and Miss Dixie Bond, Washington, D. C., and one foster sister, Mrs. Leo Bevers, Ashland.

The funeral was conducted from Irene Cole Memorial Baptist Church Tuesday afternoon, the pastor, the Rev. Campbell Jeffries, officiating, assisted by the Rev. W. B. Garrigott, pastor of the Prestonsburg Methodist Church. Many and beautiful floral offerings attested to the esteem in which the victim was held.

Interment was made in the family mausoleum in the Porter cemetery here, under the direction of the Arnold Funeral Home.

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Open-Air Service Plan Submitted To Kiwanians

He also leaves four brothers: John and Charles Branham, of Emma, Robert Branham, of Martin, and Burns Branham, of Ohio. Funeral services were conducted from the Emma Methodist Church, the Rev. A. C. Watkins officiating, and burial was made in the family cemetery at Emma.

'BIGGEST 4TH YET' PLANNED \$400 CASH PRIZES TO BE AWARDED DURING DAY

In addition to a program designed to provide varied entertainment for all ages, \$400 in prizes and premiums will be awarded during the day July 4. Bill Biggers, chairman of the Fourth of July committee, announced this week in predicting that the celebration will be the greatest ever held in Prestonsburg.

The Prestonsburg Co-Operative Business Men's Association's special finance committee, named recently when the celebration was planned, this week was at work soliciting contributions from local business firms and citizens to raise funds necessary to carry out the program on this huge scale.

Although the program has not been prepared in detail, Mr. Biggers said it would include a giant fireworks display in the patriotic motif; a tug-o-war contest between Right Beaver and Left Beaver, the upper river and lower river sections of the county, a baseball game, bathing beauty contest, band concert, patriotic address, boxing bouts; egg races, blindfold boxing, potato and sack races, prizes for the ugliest man, the largest family, healthiest baby, prettiest girl, best hoe-down and jitterbug dancers.

For the occasion the town will be more elaborately decorated than for any preceding Independence Day celebration, it was said.

P'BURG BANKS TO BE HOSTS AT MEETING

Prestonsburg's banks — The First National and The Bank Josephine — will be hosts Saturday to the annual meeting of Group Seven, Kentucky Bankers Association, which includes banking institutions of 13 Eastern Kentucky counties.

Approximately 250 bankers and guests are expected to attend the meeting over which Joseph D. Harkins, chairman of the board of directors, Bank Josephine, will preside as president of Group Seven.

Included in Group Seven are banks from Boyd, Floyd, Casser, Lawrence, Magoffin, Martin, Knott, Morgan, Perry, Letcher, Breathitt, Johnson and Pike counties.

From the time of registration at the law offices of Harkins & Harkins, at 1 p. m., the program provides for an afternoon and evening solidly filled with business and entertainment.

The afternoon session will convene in the auditorium of the new graded school building, with G. C. Spradlin, executive vice-president of The First National Bank, and secretary of Group Seven, and Jo M. Davidson, assistant cashier of The Bank Josephine, delivering addresses of welcome. The response will be given by Paul C. Snyder, cashier of the Second National Bank, Ashland.

The 1941 Kentucky bankers' conference will be led by Wm. F. "Billy" Miller, vice-president, Citizens Union National Bank, Louisville, and vice-president, Kentucky Bankers Association. 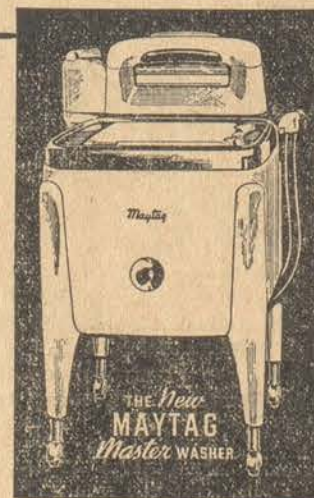

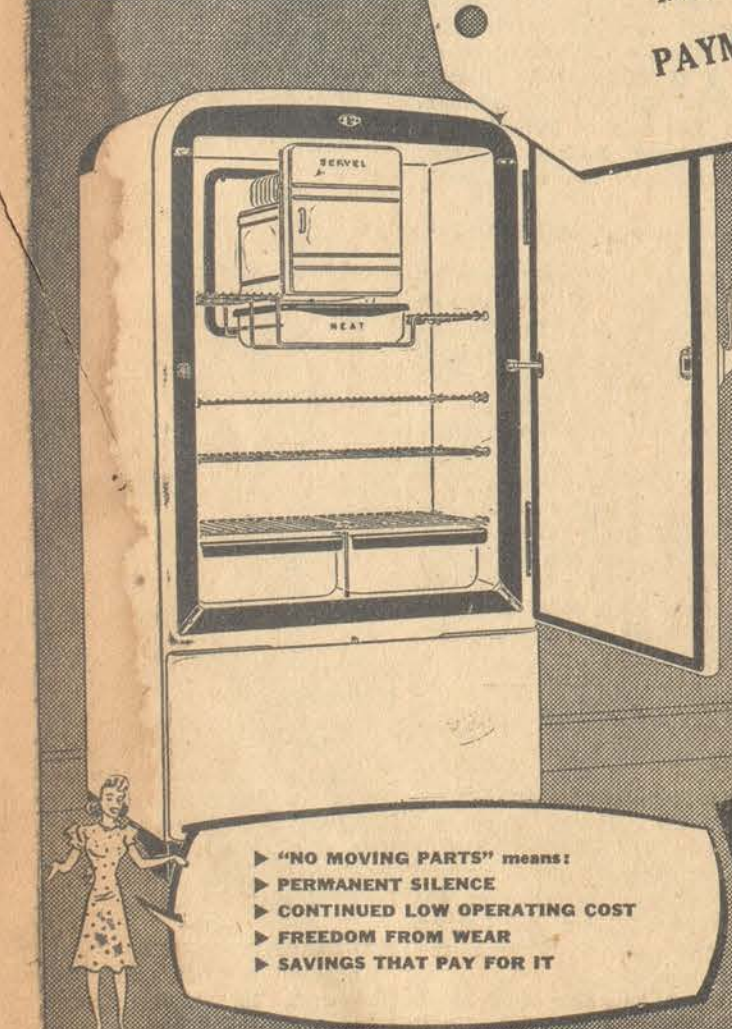

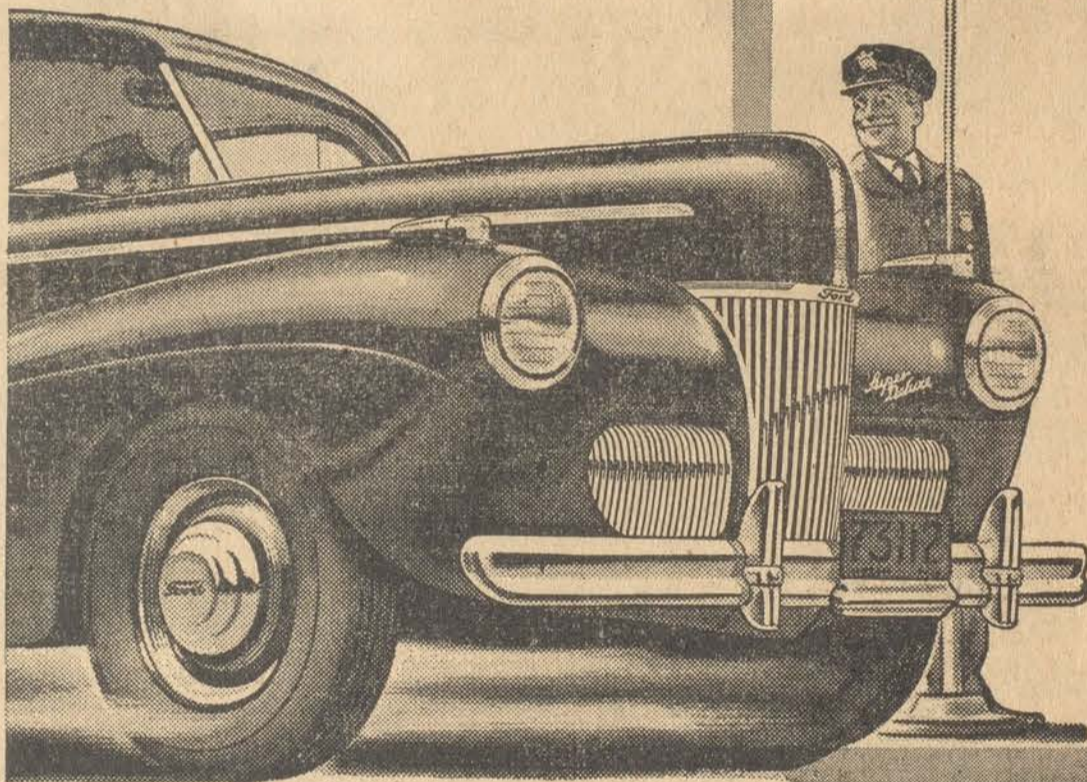

So why should not Floyd county buy the right-of-way and get the road built? As the route now stands, built, or a-building, to the county line at the head of Middle Creek, but with a "missing link" of two miles in Magoffin separating the two county-seats, all the work done by the WPA and county and state fails to accomplish its purpose.

If, as admitted, this road is worth all the money already spent on it, then it is worth a thousand dollars of Floyd county—or anybody's—money to have it finished.

Floyd County Soldiers In Tank Battalions Entrain for Service

Fort Knox, Ky., May 29 (Spl.)—Seven hundred and eighty-three specialists in mechanized warfare, drawn from the hard-hitting First Armored Division, entrained today for four strategically-located military camps and forts—among them three Floyd countians recently promoted.

The 783 men, veterans of months of intensive training with the First Division, commanded by Major General Bruce Magruder, were released from that division to form the cadre, the skeleton of non-commissioned officers and specialists, for General Headquarters Tank Battalions at Fort Lewis, Wash., Camp Ord, Calif., Ft. Bliss, Texas, and Pine Camp, N. Y.

The cadremen were accompanied by nearly 1,300 selectees taken from the Armored Force Replacement Center, where they received nine weeks of schooling in basic mechanized skill's. Twenty-two officers were assigned to the newly-activated battalions.

The 783 cadremen, many of whom received promotions before leaving, are veterans of months of intensive training as tank commanders, gunners, drivers, radio operators, armorers, mechanics, and in mess, supply and clerical duties relating to armored force units.

Each represents the new type of non-commissioned officer to be found in the Armored Force Units, skilled technicians, highly trained to fight in rolling forts.

Their training included months in various armored force schools as well as strenuous maneuvers, simulating combat conditions, in the field. They represent the "blitz" warriors of the U. S. Army of today, trained to take apart and operate tanks and guns, to crash thru and encircle enemy positions, to smash the mora's of the enemy with fire power adroitly maneuvered in steel forts and cars.

General Headquarters Tank Battalions, to which these men have been transferred, are designed, organized and equipped for attachment, singly or in groupments, to infantry, cavalry or armored divisions. GHQ battalions remain, regardless of where they are stationed, under the direct command of Major General Adna E. Chaffee, commander of the armored force of the U. S. Army.

Five GHQ battalions are now in being, and 10 more, including the five which entrained today, were officially activated June 1.

To Fort Lewis today went the 752nd GHQ Tank Battalion, commanded by Lieut. Col. Glenn H. Bliss and the 754th GHQ Tank Battalion, commanded by Lieut. Col. Severnes MacLaughlin.

The 759th GHQ Tank Battalion, commanded by Lieut. Col. Kenneth G. Althaus, went to Camp Bliss and the 754th GHQ Tank Battalion, commanded by Lieut. Col. William M. Tow, to Fort Ord.

Included among the cadremen given promotions before entraining are:

Private First Class Willis Sturgill, of Wayland, to be tank commander sergeant at Ft. Lewis, Wash.; Private First Class William K. Osborne, Prestonsburg, to be radio operator at Camp Ord, Calif.; Pvt. Hobart Montgomery, to be tank commander corporal at Ft. Bliss, Texas.

WPA Area Supervisor Says 10,186 Meals Served in Schools

A total of 10,186 meals have been served within the past two months by WPA lunchroom units in four Floyd county schools, Sue Wade, area supervisor, wrote County Judge E. P. Hill recently.

Wayland operated 33 days, served 2,568 meals and the greatest number served in any one day was 99.

Betsy Layne operated 29 days, served 2,776 meals, the largest number being 121.

Harold operated 47 days, served 2,432, and the largest number served was 62.

Garrett operated 35 days, served 2,410 meals and the largest number was 99.

All these units, except Wayland, are continuing with a garden, and Martin is sponsoring a garden for a lunchroom next fall.

"The number of meals served does not give the complete story of the good done by serving a well-balanced meal to school children," Miss Wade's letter to Judge Hill states "I am sure that by getting the food raised, canned and stored for next year our lunch program will be much more successful. Without your co-operation and the help of the Magistrates I doubt seriously if any of the lunchrooms could have operated at all because although all of the communities and school officials were anxious to have lunchrooms none of them could have raised the funds to buy equipment to get the units started."

THE GARDEN

DRY LAND FARMING

By JOHN S. GARDNER
Kentucky College of Agriculture
There is no telling, but it does begin to appear that our customarily dry season may have started. If this is so, it behooves gardeners to change their technique to suit.

In the early spring, when there may be more rain than the vegetables can comfortably use, there is some virtue in sowing seed on ridges. Under such conditions, too, deep stirring of the soil is indicated, even perhaps at the expense of a bit of root ventilation, though this is moot. Anyhow, there is at that time opportunity for recovery. However, when rain moisture becomes scarce, methods must change, to make use of the showers that may come, and to conserve what soil moisture there may be.

The cultivating method must be adopted, stirring the soil only shallowly, never reaching the roots, or, better, merely scraping the surface to cut off what weeds may sprout, penetrating the soil no deeper than one-half inch. A hand hoe, its blade almost flat with the soil surface, is a good tool to use, but a garden plow, fitted with the scuffle-hoe attachment is better and much faster. The soil surface should be kept level; no ridges and no hills.

How much or how often to cultivate is decided by the weeds and by the "crust" that follows beating showers. There is decided virtue in keeping the garden surface pulverized.

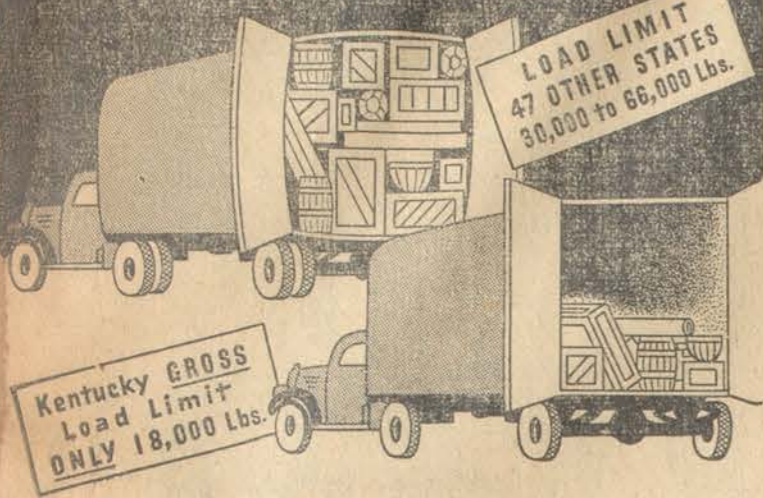

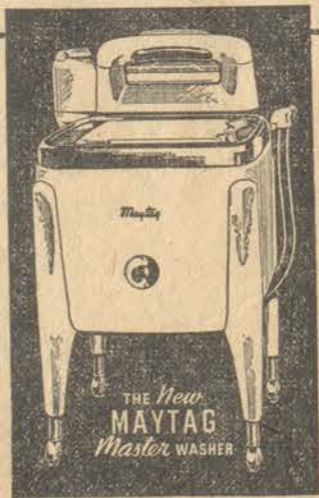
