

## To Require Registrants To Name Permanent Place of Residence

A Selective Service registrant who spends part of his time in one p'ace and part in another will have the right to decide for himself which place he wants recorded as his residence when he registers July 1, state selective service headquarters announced last week. The place he chooses will determine the local board that will always have jurisdiction over him.

On the first registration day, October 16, last, registrants were somewhat confused, national headquarters pointed out, and some of them thereafter wanted to change the address they had given for the place of their residence after registration day. In other instances, the addresses given were incomplete or ambiguous and the cards reached the wrong local boards.
