Contract on surfacing from the the direction of the Ryan Funeral junction of the highway with Route 80, near Martin, to a point near Hunter, a distance of approximately six miles, was awarded last summer to the Gorman Construction Company and part of the work was done after a belated start. This work is expected to be resumed this spring.

Mr. Cutler told County Attorney Short that plans had already been approved and funds appropriated for completion of the highway. He added that bids will be asked on completion of the route for the awarding of a contract at the April meeting of the Highway Commission.

Other Floyd county road work embraced in the state's 1941 program are grade-and-drain of the Melvin-Weeksbury road and the Right Fork of Middle Creek highway in conjunction with the Works Progress Administra-

It is held certain that the Middle Creek road, a part of the Prestonsburg-Salyersville route, will be completed this year. But prospects for completion of the Magoffin end of the highway are not so bright. Already far behind this county on its part of the route, Magoffin was recently reported as claiming right-of-way troubles were retarding progress.




