P'burg, Garrett In Regional Tourney Starting Here Thursday Night

BLACKCATS WIN DISTRICT MEET AT McDOWELL

Prestonsburg's Blackcats achieved something Saturday night at McDowell they hadn't been able to do, all season; defeated Garrett's Black Devils—and so won the basketball championship of Floyd county in the 58th district tournament.

Prestonsburg as champion and Garrett as runner-up in the district meet will represent Floyd county in the regional tourney starting here tonight (Thursday).

Both the winner and runner-up were extended, en route to the finals—Prestonsburg, by McDowell Saturday afternoon; Garrett, by Auxier, at the same session. Garrett was forced to call on all reserves on the preceding night to defeat Wayland, 30-22.

The tournament, which drew hundreds of fans from all parts of the county, began Thursday night with the Maytown-Betsy Layne encounter, with the Bobcats taking an easy 47-22 decision. The Turner-Elkhorn Independents of Drift downed the Mayo College team, 32-23, in an "added attraction" tilt.

Friday afternoon, Prestonsburg easily got by Martin, 32-17, and McDowell was having an easy time of it with Wheelwright, 46-26. The night session Friday drew one of the largest crowds ever to attend a tournament in this county and was marked by two interesting games. Auxier eliminated Betsy

Prestonsburg is host, this week-end, to the ranking eight basketball teams of the 15th Region embracing Floyd, Pike, Johnson, Martin, Magoffin, Lawrence, Morgan and Menifee counties.

FORMER COAL MAN DIES MONDAY; BURIAL HERE

James Caddo Smith, for 30 years a resident of Prestonsburg, died Monday at the home of his son, Todd Smith, Dakota, W. Va.

A former superintendent of the old Mary Luck and Beaver Pond mines in this county, Mr. Smith resided here until last year when his wife died. He was affectionately known by a host of friends in this section as "Uncle Cad."

Surviving him are his son, two daughters, Mrs. Ida Elizabeth Legg, Quinwood, W. Va., and Mrs. Sadie Goble, Matewan, W. Va., 16 grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

The body arrived here by train Wednesday and was taken to the Arnold Funeral Home. Funeral arrangements had not been completed when this was written. Burial will be made in the Richmond cemetery beside his wife.

As horse and wagon and youngster swung into the heavy traffic of the Mayo Trail, Hale overtook the runaway, then began edging the horse toward the sidewalk. Finally, at the Broadway Theater door the child's rescue was made as effectively, if not as dramatically, as in any film ever shown on the screen inside.

LEFT BEAVER CONTRACT ASSURED

CUTLER SAYS ROAD TO BE FINISHED THIS YEAR

Surfacing of the entire Left Beaver highway will be done this year, County Attorney Forrest D. Short was assured a few days ago by Thomas H. Cutler, chief engineer of the State Highway Commission.

Contract on surfacing from the junction of the highway with Route 80, near Martin, to a point near Hunter, a distance of approximately six miles, was awarded last summer to the Gorman Construction Company and part of the work was done after a belated start. This work is expected to be resumed this spring.

Mr. Cutler told County Attorney Short that plans had already been approved and funds appropriated for completion of the highway. He added that bids will be asked on completion of the route for the awarding of a contract at the April meeting of the Highway Commission.

Other Floyd county road work embraced in the state's 1941 program are grade-and-drain of the Melvin-Weeksbury road and the Right Fork of Middle Creek road in conjunction with the Works Progress Administration.

It is held certain that the Middle Creek road, a part of the Prestonsburg-Salyersville route, will be completed this year. But prospects for completion of the Magoffin end of the highway are not so bright. Already far behind this county on its part of the route, Magoffin was recently reported as claiming right-of-way troubles were retarding progress.

100 FAMILIES BEING EVICTED

DEPUTIES EXECUTE WRITS EXPELLING MINE FAMILIES

Steps were being taken this week by receivers of the Elk Horn Coal Corporation to evict, if necessary, 100 former coal miners and their families from the company's property at Wayland.

Writs of forcible entry and detainer were being executed by sheriff's deputies during the week.

In most cases, the officers said, the former employees of the company indicated they would move without further litigation. A few told the deputies they would move only when dispossessed.

Future of a large percentage of the families is uncertain. "We don't know what we'll do," some were quoted as saying.

For those unemployed at Garrett and Wayland the Floyd fiscal court recently asked the Works Progress Administration to render immediate assistance. The court advised WPA officials that the men had exhausted their Unemployment Compensation pay and had no prospects of immediate employment.

BUDGET SLASH MAY DELAY DAM WORK

MAY SAYS PROJECT HAS CERTAINTY, HOWEVER

Queried by THE TIMES as to prospects of immediate work on the Johns Creek dam, Congressman A. J. May of Washington said that this depends on final action of the Army chief of engineers who will be obliged to work with funds less than half asked of Congress, a few days ago.

Major General Schley, chief of engineers, advised Congress that \$366,25 could be profitably spent on locks and harbors and flood control projects, but only \$164,213,000 has been allocated for such work. Of the 619 projects recommended, Johns Creek's was one, Major General Schley asking \$2,000,000 for the beginning of there.

There may be no more than \$20,000 available for new projects, and whether Johns Creek can be kept out of the "new" classification is not yet known.

The budget slash for such improvements is a result of President Roosevelt's policy of cutting down on all expenditures except those of a strictly defense nature.

"At any rate," Congressman May concluded, "if the people will just be patient, this work will come along after a while."

Campbell Jeffries, pastor of Irene Cole Memorial Baptist Church, officiating. The funeral here was under the direction of the Arnold Funeral Home. 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TEACHING VET TAKES LESSONS IN DRIVING, THEN SELLS 3 CARS IN WEEK

"You don't have to be an author to sell books," argues R. C. Barnett, of Martin—and proves it by selling automobiles.

Until a month ago when he became a salesman for Howard Brothers, Ford dealers here, he had never owned an automobile or driven one.

After "selling himself" as a car salesman in two days, he sold three cars in a week—and thus was well on his way to proving that you can sell drugs without being a pharmacist.

Mr. Barnett, after completing his 25th year as a teacher, last month came from his Buck's Branch home, near Martin, to the automobile agency here and applied for a job. "My school is out and I need a job," he told Nelson Howard, member of the firm.

But when he admitted that he had never owned an auto, never driven one, his intended employers were skeptical of his future as a salesman of that particular kind of product.

First of all, they didn't think he would be a good risk out on the highway in an automobile.

But Barnett had a solution to that. "You don't have to turn me loose with one of your cars. I'll buy one myself, this fellow here can drive me home and I'll learn to drive it up there in my meadow."

Such tenacity of purpose would not be denied. He bought a 1935 model car. Went home. Next morning, he was back for a better car.

And so he convinced Howard Brothers that they needed him in their organization.

As a result of all which, the firm had, the first week of his connection with it, three cars sold without a trade-in. The guy who wouldn't listen to "No" when he applied for the job about which, as a teacher, he knew next to nothing—he went out and sold cars to folks who, like him, had never owned an automobile.

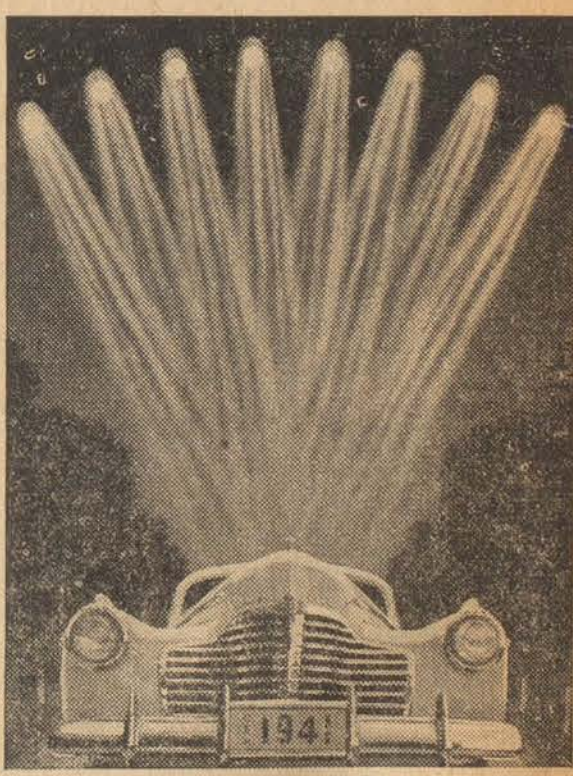
