Charges of voluntary manslaughter and of failing to stop and render aid, both growing out of the death of Bob Hale, on the Mayo Trail, near Emma, were dismissed against Gene Harris, Prestonsburg man who was accused of driving a truck which was alleged to have struck Hale. Evidence heard failed to establish the fact that Harris was driver of the truck. A FBI agent who examined hairs from Hale's horse and from the truck stated that the samples submitted to him were from a reddish-colored horse but refused to state that they were from the same animal

Installation of a laboratory in each of his two hospitals-the Beaver Valley at Martin and the Stumbo Memorial at Lackey-were announced this week by Dr. W. L. Stumbo as completed in conformance with specifications of the State Board of Health,

At the same time Dr. Stumbo announced the connection with the two hospitals of Pedro Bernaido Bunoan, M.T., of New York, who installed the laboratories and will be technician in charge. Final inspection of the laboratories will be made by the State Board of Health.

Pre-marital blood tests may be quickly procured through the facilities of the two laboratories, it was stated. Among various other laboratory tests now available to the section served by the two hospitals, Dr. Stumbo said, are tissue, basal metabolism, Freedman, blood count and hemoglobin. 

Hayes, Floyd Student, Morehead Delegate To National Meet

Paul E. Hayes, 18-year-old senior from Fed, this county, was the official delegate of the Morehead State Teachers' College at the four-day convention of the Grand National Student Legislative Assembly held in the Phoenix hotel, Lexington, recently.

Although the membership in the assembly was limited to 150, college students from all parts of the nation were in attendance at this annual meeting. The assembly, sponsored by Winthrop College, was planned to give to civic-minded college students an apportunity to actively participate in the enactment of public legislation. The entire assembly was carried on by the students, free from faculty coaching; students were free to form parties, to elect college student officers, to introduce bills, and to do all other functions which are performed by the Congress of the United States

Hayes, who is a son of W. P. Hayes, of Fed, was selected to represent Mo ehead by a committee of faculty members because of his scholarship, his participation in extra-curricular activities, and because of his interest in this type of activity. While at the convention he was elected chairman of the Democratic party caucus; was appointed chairman of the Committee on Taxation, one of the 16 committees in the House of Representatives; and a number of bills were introduced by him, two of which were passed.

Hayes spoke last Thursday before the convocation of the entire college concerning his activities at the convention.

Besides being an honor student at the college, Hayes is president of the college Debate Club, vice-president of the Mathematics and Physics Club, and is an active member of the Future Teachers of America. He will graduate from Morehead in August with a Bachelor of Science degree and with majors in Mathematics and Physics.

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

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


