Infant mortality, I read, is much less than formerly. I wonder whether red flannel as a passing institution may not have had something to do with this condition.

### **WAGE PARLEY DISPUTANTS** IN TRUCE

#### LEWIS ADAMANT IN WAGE RAISE DEMANDS

An agreement to continue production of soft coal during further negotiations between Southern Appalachian operators and the United Mine Workers of America (CIO) was announced Saturday night in-New York City, by William H. Davis, vice-chairman of the National Defense Mediation Board.

Davis said conferences between operators and the union would continue in New York, and if no agreement was reached by 10 a. m. Friday, both sides would report at that time before the Mediation Board in Washington.

Negotiators had indicated previous to Saturday night's meeting with Davis that they were unable to reach agreement. John L. Lewis, union chieftain, had said a work stoppage might begin Wednesday of this week among the 330,000 miners in the east state Appalachian area.

After his conference with the soft coal miners and operators Saturday night, Davis announced that should it be necessary for negotiations to be resumed before the Mediation Board, it was understood that the present retroactive agreement would be in effect, that the status quo would be maintained and the mines kept in full opera-

"We are aware," he said, "of the meeting scheduled for Monday of the National Policy Committee of the United Mine Workers to receive a report from the union's negotiating committee. We have been given assurance that our request will be granted.

"The mines will be kept in operation se that we can meet with production of coal going on and can continue our discussions in Washington for a reasonable time while production still continues."

Negotiations were resumed Mon-

Davis had called Saturday night's meeting for "the purpose of stabilizing the situation." He said the soft coal situation had aroused

"some uneasiness." His announcement marked the second time the Mediation Board has intervened in the soft coal dispute. When the Southern operators bolted the joint Appalachian conference last month and established a separate bargaining group in Washington, the board brought to effect an agreement.

After a personal appeal by Secretary of Commerce Jesse Jones, the Southern operators resumed negotiations and the mines, closed a month, were re-opened under a tentative agreement.

Wage demands stood in the way of settlement in both branches of the industry

The average wage rate in the Southern Appalachian soft coal fields is \$5.60 a day. The union is seeking an increase of \$1.40, to match the \$7-a-day wage agreed to by the Northern operators, who previously had paid \$6 a day. The Southern group has offered an increase of \$1, but balked at the added 40 cents.

S. T. Putnam, of Beckley, W. Va., spokesman for the Southern soft coal operators, asserted in a statement Saturday that "the real issue is the continuance of the right to own and manage private property or surrender to the un-

ion's nationalization program." John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, has contended that the operators have already raised coal prices sufficiently to cover a daily wage increase from \$5.60 to \$7.

At Gilbertsville on the Tennessee river 22½ miles upstream from Pa-ducah, the Tennessee Valley Authority is in the third year of the construction of its Kentucky Dam, which with its reservoir development will have cost about \$105,000, 000 when completed in 1945.

Kentucky Dam, largest of TVA's system of nine dams, will be a combined flood control and power project. Its reservoir will extend 184 miles to Pickwick Dam in Tennessee, and will have a shore line of approximately 1,800 miles, pro-viding one of the finest fishing and water recreation grounds in the country. Provision is being made for the installation of generators which will provide 128,000 KW of

The dam is drawing hundreds of tourists daily to watch the construction operations, on which 2,000 workers are engaged The public has not been barred from the site "m other big construction proj-

Paved roads lead to the dam site. It is easily accessible from Federal Highways 60, 62, 68, 45 struction work from the bridge which spans the stream. Because of its large storage capacity and its strategic location near the confluence of the Tennessee and Ohio rivers, the dam will be important for flood control in the Mississippi as well as the Tennessee and lower Ohio Valleys.

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

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

#### County Board Asks Bids for Dwale School Work

The Floyd County Board of Education this week asked for bids on construction of a two-room brick school at Dwale, prices on two new school buses and bids on dismantling and removal of the five-room Stamper Branch school, near Wayland, to the Lick Fork of Middle Creek and its re-construction there.

The Stamper Branch building is a frame structure, built in 1935, and is not needed, County Superintendent Hall said, since the Wayland school plant is being enlarged.

One of the new school buses ordered will replace the old '36 bus in operation in the Mud Creek section: the other will be an addition to the present fleet of buses bearing students to and from school daily, bringing the number of such conveyances owned by the board of education to 10 for the next school

Washington-The army, ordering an intensive campus recruiting campaign for air corps pilots, announced a decision to train flying cadets from each college as an individual unit.

The decision was admittedly intended as an incentive to qualifying youths to become army pilots. The army did not say so, but it appeared it might also mean carrying college athletic rivalries into flight train-

Cadets fom the same city also will be trained together.

Instructions went to corps area commanders to concentrate recruiting efforts on students in the few remaining weeks of the college year as the air corps accellerates the training of pilots from 12,000 to 30 000 a vear

Outstanding athletes and campus leaders, officials said, will be sought as organizers of units of 20 flying cadets, each of which the War Department promised to keep intact during the training period of

There was no promise, however, to keep units together indefinitely in the manner of the Eagle squadron of Americans in Britain's Royal Force of existing National Guard organizations.

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





"If your child is going to have scarlet fever, the first signs you may notice are that he sems tired, restless, and out of sorts. Usually iting, or convulsion. The child has fever. His skin is dry and hot. His tongue is furred, and under this white covering it is red and swol-

"In ordinary cases these early signs are followed in a day or two by a rash. Little flat red points, close together, appear first on the neck and chest. Soon the rash is over most of the body and is brilliant in color.

#### WHAT TO DO IF YOUR CHILD HAS SCARLET FEVER

Put him in a room by himself at once and do not allow others to come near him.

Call the doctor. Follow his instructions as to food, clothing, and general care. The doctor may wish to use

scarlet fever antitoxin if the case is serious Do not let the child get up and

be active until the doctor says he is able. This is very important, because the heart and kidneys are often affected by scarlet fever.

Careful nursing may be necessary after the skin has peeled and the child is apparently well.
