garden fresh fruits and vege-tables. 2. Make sure that all jars and caps

are in perfect condition—free from cracks, chips, or dents. 3. Wash all container lids and jar rubbers and place in hot water until ready to use.

4. Pack material loosely in containers to allow proper heat circulation and leave sufficient space to allow for expansion without overflow.

5. Do not subject jars to sudden temperature changes—never lift jars from canner by jar lids do not open jars after processing (cooking in jars) starts.

6. Use utmost care in sealing jars to avoid spoilage and breakage of containers. Follow jar manufacturer's instructions exactly for sealing the particular style of jar top that you use.

Be sure to boil all home-canned neats and non-acid vegetables 10 to 15 minutes before eating or even tasting.
