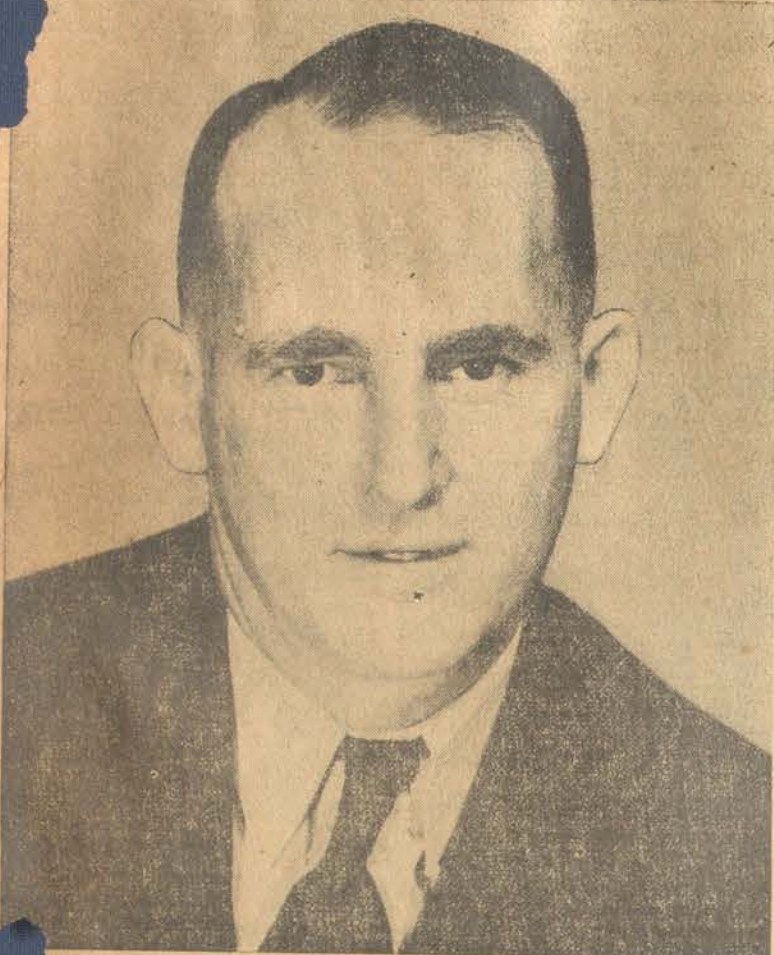

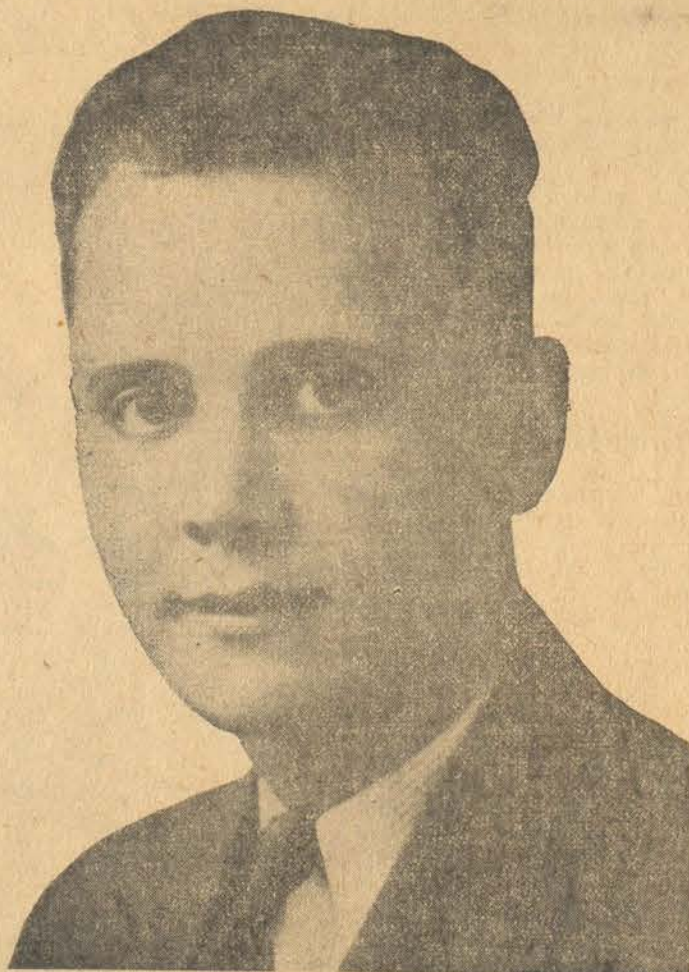
VICTORY in November is my main goal and I now pledge all of my opponents that if either of them should win the nomination over me that I will be in the campaign for that one this fall.

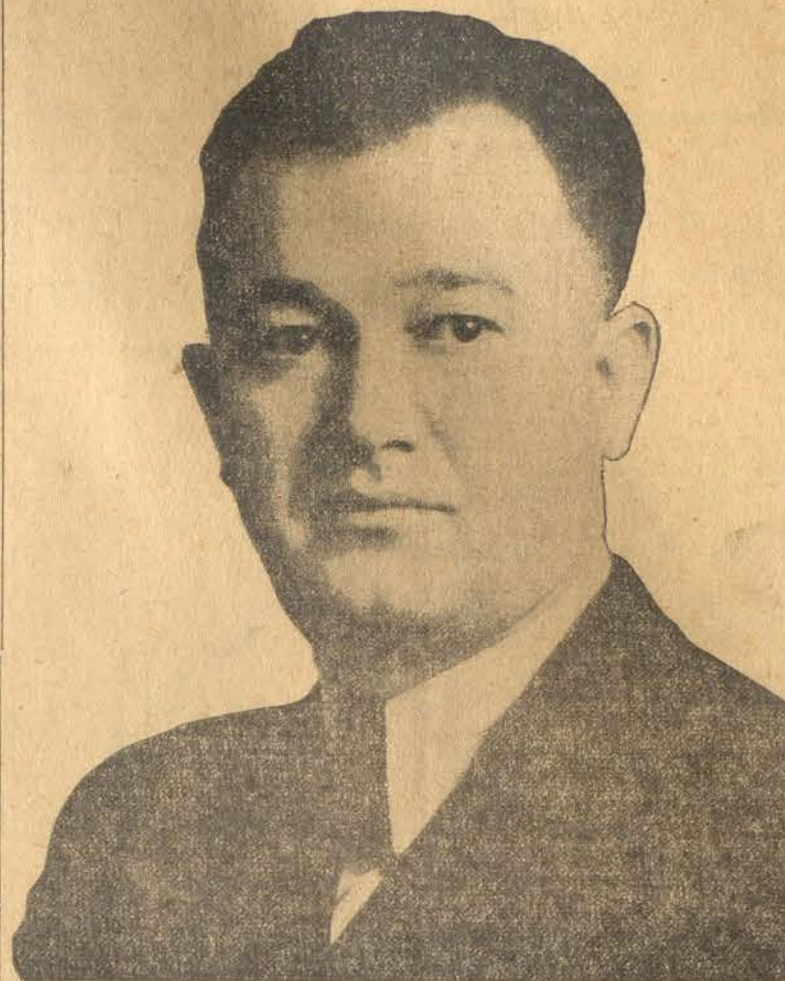

Interest in Education Over State Increases

Public interest in education is shown by the increased activities of various civic, professional and industrial organizations throughout the state.

Meeting recently in Louisville, a group of lay people representing many interests discussed the problems of education. The group effected a voluntary organization which will be known as the Continuing Council on Public Education. The chief function of this organization will be to assist school leaders in the matter of imparting to the parents and the public information about the schools and their needs in this serious time and to formulate plans to counteract the teacher-and-shortage crisis.

Under direction of county and city superintendents, a series of public conferences are to be held throughout the state. These conferences will be purely local center around the individual school. Persons who are informed on the problems of the schools will talk to the people in every school community about the need for greater support of the schools. Literature which has been specially prepared will be distributed, and with the co-operation of the press, social, civic and industrial organizations of all localities, it is hoped that greater progress will be made toward the problems of salaries and closed schools.

Organized groups participating in the program of publicizing the critical plight of the schools are: American Association of University Women (Kentucky Branch), American Legion, Department of Superintendents, Farm Bureau, Independent League of Women Voters, Kentucky Education Association, K. E. A. Planning Board, Kentucky Federation of Women's Clubs, Kentucky Negro Organizations, Kentucky School Board Members Association, Kentucky State Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Lions Clubs, Kiwanis Clubs, Parent-Teacher Associations, Rotary Clubs, Sportsmen's Clubs, State Department of Education, and the State Federation of Labor.

The Hall of Fame

Baseball's Hall of Fame has come to a rather abrupt pause lately. But as long as this institution looks back to the past, minus any use of oil or rubber, apart from any priorities, there is no reason now why it shouldn't be brought back to life.

My friend Bob Stedler, a veteran from the Buffalo Evening News, a sporting writer who knows what it is all about, has brought out the best new nomination in sight.

The name is Jimmy Collins, in my mind the greatest artist that ever played third base, one of the top in-field artists of all time. Jimmy Collins, starting for 19 years, was in many ways the greatest ballplayer Boston ever knew.

Collins had speed, smartness, grace. He revolutionized the art of playing third base.

As Bob Stedler writes—"He was the first third baseman to break up the deadly bunting attack of McGraw, Keeler and Jennings from the old Baltimore Orioles."

I happen to know what McGraw, Keeler and Jennings thought of Collins. In their minds there was no one else even close.

Great Third Basemen

In the last 40 or more years, I've seen many great third basemen come and go.

In this list I can give you Jimmy Collins, Art Devlin, Buck Weaver, Bill Bradley, Frank Baker, Pie Traynor and a few others.

Pie Traynor was one of the greatest. Pie was the leading offensive star. And Pie, with Bradley, Devlin and others, could play third base. But Collins was the fastest and most graceful of them all. Jimmy Collins was to third base what Hal Chase was to first—and Larry Lajoie to second.

Jimmy made all the hard plays look easy and simple. On the offensive side, Collins batted well over .300 with the dead ball for six years. On the defensive side, he was the fielding champion of both the National and American leagues. As the late Jack Doyle told me shortly before his death—"I have seen them all for nearly 50 years. There was only one Jimmy Collins. He was the top and the true artist."

All-Graceful

If I had to pick an all-graceful team it would be along these lines— Catcher—Johnny Kling of the Cubs.

Pitcher—Walter Johnson of Washington.

First base—Hal Chase of the Yankees.

Second base—Napoleon Lajoie of Cleveland.

Shortstop—Herman Long of Boston.

Third base—Jimmy Collins of Boston.

Outfield—Speaker, DiMaggio and Terry Moore. These were artists. But outside of Lajoie and Speaker, no one in this list belongs above Jimmy Collins, the Boston manager who led his team in a winning assault in the first of all-world series games back in 1903 when Boston beat Pittsburgh, headed by Hans Wagner, Tommy Leach, Deacon Phillippe, Sam Leever, Jesse Tannehill, Lefty Davis and one of the best ball clubs of all time.

Ask Hans Wagner or Big Bill Dineen. Ask anyone who ever played with or against Jimmy Collins.

Belated Tribute

In the first vote for the Hall of Fame, Collins polled one of the highest votes and just fell short of the nomination. Then the old guard began to fade as younger fellows came along with only a faint memory of the past.

They began to forget about Jimmy Collins, only remembering the stars they had seen.

In my opinion, it would be a crime to leave Jimmy Collins off the roster that belongs to baseball's Hall of Fame.

Tom, I came down to Prestonsburg to argue with you. Now you come up here in any of our mining camps and argue with me—anywhere—any place—any time.

It's always news when a fellow gets married. But—we've got a bunch of fellows who were re-married last week.

Big Howdy sez we're about to have a time over the pony swap. He sez some fellow is about to law Frank C. and that Mack's watch has stopped. Frank has been off for two days. Maybe he's on his way back with the pony.

1. For canning, select only sound garden fresh fruits and vegetables.
2. Make sure that all jars and caps are in perfect condition—free from cracks, chips, or dents.
3. Wash all container lids and jar rubbers and place in hot water until ready to use.
4. Pack material loosely in containers to allow proper heat circulation and leave sufficient space to allow for expansion without overflow.
5. Do not subject jars to sudden temperature changes—never lift jars from canner by jar lids—do not open jars after processing (cooking in jars) starts.
6. Use utmost care in sealing jars to avoid spoilage and breakage of containers. Follow jar manufacturer's instructions exactly for sealing the particular style of jar top that you use.
7. Be sure to boil all home-canned meats and non-acid vegetables 10 to 15 minutes before eating or even tasting.

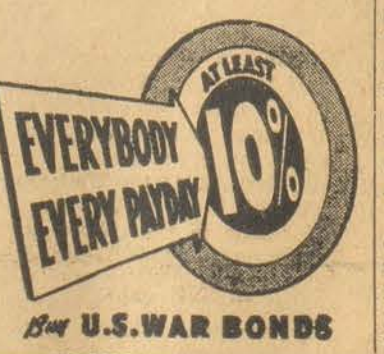

'Wings at Seventeen,' Nation's New Slogan

"There's a new slogan that you'll be hearing more and more among the young men of America," Pfc. Harry E. Greer said this week at his office, Pikeville. It is—"The wings you want are yours to wear at seventeen."

"That slogan is an answer to thousands of Americans who have dreamed of flying with the U. S. Army Air Forces," Pfc. Greer explained. "Instead of waiting until they are 18 to start their training as aviation cadets, they can now enlist in the Air Corps Enlisted Reserve at 17, with their parents' consent, and wear the silver wings with the 'AC' on a blue center which identifies them as members of the U. S. Army Air Forces."

At high schools all over the country, silver wings are being worn on the coat lapels of thousands of students. When they are called up as Aviation Cadets, they continue their education, first with pre-flight training at selected colleges, then at one of the more advanced air bases like Randolph Field, known as "The West Point of the Air."

"The opportunity to become aviation cadets," Pfc. Greer emphasized, "is still open to men who have reached their 18th birthday but have not reached their 26th. They can volunteer for induction, or if they are already in the army, they can apply through their nearest Aviation Cadet Examining Board."

The mental examination to become an aviation cadet is given at the U. S. army recruiting office, Pikeville, thereby saving the expense of going to Dayton or Louisville to take the examination.

## NON-PARTISAN BALLOT VOTED

### By City Council Here Monday; Act Of 1942 Is Cited

Prestonsburg's City Council Monday night enacted legislation designed, one member said, "to eliminate partisan politics from the city election in November."

The ordinance enacted would void the filing on the Democratic ticket of a group of candidates as an anti-administration faction, although this ticket has been awarded certificates of Democratic nomination.

Council's action was unanimous, it was said.

The ordinance is based on Kentucky Revised Statute 118.175, which reads in part: "When any city so provides by ordinance, the ballots used at any election in which city officers are to be elected shall contain, in a single vertical column, the names of candidates for such city offices grouped according to the offices they seek, and such candidates shall be immediately arranged under and beneath the title of office such candidates seek. The names of the candidates . . . shall be listed in rotating order—each candidate to have his name first in order on an equal number of ballots . . ."

## Home After Months of Fighting In Pacific, Sanders Preaches From Pulpit of Floyd Church

A navy veteran of eight major engagements in the Pacific told his story in a Floyd county church Sunday.

But it wasn't a story of dive bombers and torpedoes. The veteran's story was the "old, old story" from the Bible he has carried with him on every cruise in peacetime and every wartime mission since he entered the navy more than three years ago.

The speaker was 20-year-old Robert L. Sanders, son of Mrs. Bert Hall, of Banner, who is an ordained minister besides being a radioman first class on an aircraft carrier.

A large congregation at the Cow Creek Free Will Baptist Church Sunday evening heard the young minister, back from rendezvous with death in the Solomons and other sectors of the Pacific, speak of the greater battle between the forces of good and evil.

Young Sanders could have told—but didn't—of the commendation he received from his commanding officer following a mission in the Solomons. He was commended for gallantry and was promoted in rating for the part he played in the Solomons action, Aug. 7-9, 1942.

The commendation reads, in part: "The ingenuity, resourcefulness and excellent performance of duty of members of the party . . . in installing and operating hastily improvised equipment and thereby maintaining satisfactory communications throughout the battle is highly commendable."

These, however, are matters of which Sanders speaks only with reticence. His ambition is to see the war out victoriously, then enter college to study for the ministry.

His brother, Maryland Sanders, is on the same carrier with him and has also been in the navy since 1940.

## What Floyd Could Do In Waste Fat Program Told by Big Collector

One tablespoonful of waste household fats saved every day by each of Floyd county's 12,923 families during the second year of the WPE fat salvage campaign would provide enough glycerin to make 620,304 anti-aircraft shells, it was estimated this week by the largest single collector of this vitally-needed war material.

Indications are that nationwide results of the campaign's initial year, ending the first week in July, totaled more than 65,000,000 pounds of household fats, based on OWI reports for the first eleven months. This is one-third of the annual quota for the nation of 200,000,000 pounds.

Kentucky is asked by the government to salvage 202,000 pounds of fats each month.

Where Floyd Countians in Armed Forces Are, What They're Doing

A petty officer rating as an airplane mechanic is the goal of Gomer Rardin Martin, Jr., 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gomer Rardin Martin, of Drift, who has enrolled in the Service School at the Naval Air Technical Training Center, Navy Pier, Chicago, Ill. He will receive several months of training upon the completion of which he will be graduated as an aviation machinist's mate or aviation metalmith. He will be eligible for promotion to petty officer at the time and may be assigned to duty aboard an aircraft carrier or at an aviation base.

Selected for training as a specialist in the U.S. navy on the basis of a series of aptitude examinations given every Bluejacket during his "boot" training, Clyde B. Burchett, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom W. Burchett, Prestonsburg, is now undergoing an intensive 16-week course in the school for electrician's mates in the service school of the Naval Training Station, Great Lakes, Ill.

Upon successfully completing this course, he will be eligible for advancement to a petty officer's rating and then will be sent either to the fleet or to an advanced service school for additional instruction. There he will serve under veteran petty officers in his specialized field, receiving more practical instruction and experience.
