





# TO THE CITIZENS OF FLOYD COUNTY:

While it is true that Floyd county is normally Democratic, yet be it said to the honor, intelligence and integrity of our people that they have shown in the past that they are not slaves to any selfish, arrogant, and corrupt political machine.

They told us how this Frankfort chine had mistreated and abused the old people of the state and that thousands of applications for Old-Ag ensions now lie covered by dust at Frankfort and unattended to; that soap to be used to wash the bodies and cloth ng of the thousands of unfortunate inmates of our state reformatories, feeble-minded institutions, asylums, and Ken ucky Children's Home, and selling on the open market for seven cents per pound, was purchased by the machine rowd for fifty cents per pound; that the thousands of blind people of our state and thousands of indigent children vere compelled to go into court to put into effect a law for their aid that had been on the statute books over three ears; that a slush-fund of \$300,000 was collected by Lyter Donaldson illegally from the public in continuing the collection of bridge tolls, after such tolls had paid the bridge bonds and interest (in this instance he was stopped by a judgment of a Democratic court); how that a Democratic court again prevented the machine from buying for he use of all of the above mentioned state institutions, old, second-hand, worn-out laundry equipment for hundreds of thousands of dollars when the specifications called for new equipment; how Governor Johnson dared not leave the state for fear Rodes K. Myers would call a special session of the Legislature to grant the much-needed aid to our underpaid school teachers.

These three Democrats in making these startling disclosures stated that "the half had not been told" of graft and corruption on the part of this Johnson-Donaldson machine.

Speaking as to our local situation, what has this crowd done in behalf of Floyd county roads?

The much-talked-about "Dam" should be forgotten and a state highway immediately constructed up Johns Creek to aid these much-abused people; a state highway should be built from Harold up Mud Creek and down Clear Creek to intersect with the Left Beaver highway; a state highway should be built up the left fork of Middle Creek and down Brush Creek to intersect with the Right Beaver road. The record of the machine is not only one of graft and corruption, but one of broken promises. They promised to repeal the state income tax when it should pay the state debt. This, they failed to do, and although not one penny of this tax is paid to our soldiers or their dependents, yet, this crowd is keeping it to further their own selfish aims and build up in Kentucky a Huey Long machine which, as shown by the recent primary, dictates from Frankfort what young aspiring Kentuckian should be nominated by his party for Sheriff, or even Constable.

None of the above enumerated charges, to this hour, have been denied by Lyter Donaldson and in his desperation he violates every sense of decency of all intelligent Democrats and patriotic Kentuckians, when in his opening address he stated in substance that it would be unpatriotic to vote for Judge Willis, our neighbor and friend, against him. This statement was made in the face of the fact that near to 4,000,000 young Republican boys are today facing "The Battle Care" with their "Buddies," a like number of fine, young, patriotic Democrats, They recognize no politics "Over There," and we as their fathers, mothers, brothers and sisters should recognize none "Over Here," but highly resolve that under God "They" all shall have a decent state to which to return after victory is won.
