### **MARTIN JURY** IN DEADLOCK IS DISMISSED

APRIL 27, 1944

Deputy Sheriff Cook Wins Acquittal; Cross' Slaver Gets 5 Years

Long drawn-out in the empaneling of a jury and hard-fought through the entire courtroom hearing, the trial of Wesley N. Martin, of Allen, charged with the slaying of Billy Martin, Jr., came to an end late Friday afternoon with startling

The trial, as once before, ended in the jury being unable to reach a verdict. It was dismissed after deliberating only four hours and after members of the pury had told Special Judge Clyde Miller, Louisa, that there was no possibility of an agre ment.

Wednesday, while the tria Deputy Sheriff Ray Cook, chs with the pistol-slaying of Joe at Drift, was under way, a com mise verdict of five years in the itentiary was reached for Hamilton, charged with the mur on Mud Creek of Aggis Cri Mack Hamilton, Mud Creek merch ant, had been jointly indicted wit his son, Alvin, in the killing, but h case was dismissed. The young Hamilton was recently fined \$100 for shooting and wounding Frank Adams at the time of the Cross slay-

Later Wednesday, the Cook jury acquitted the officer.

Trial of Bailey Mosely, charged with murder in the death of his cousin, Frank Howell, was continued till the September term of court.

Evidence in the Martin case was much the same as that in two previous trials - the Commonwealth contending that the youth was shot while chasing his dog and offering no offense; defense testimony claiming the youth had threatened Martin and had struck him with a rock dazing him, shortly before the fat shot was fired.

Deputy Sheriff Cook claimed the shot which killed Hall was accidental, that Hall jerked the muzzle of his revolver, causing him to pull the trigger. Commonwealth testimony contended Cook had beaten Hall, that Hall pleaded to others not "to let him kill me," but it was



Frankfort, Ky., April 25-County Judge Boone Hamilton stated late today that on advice of United States District Attorney Claude P. Stephens he had placed the re-employment claim of ex-soldier R. C. Cook before Colonel Frank D. Rash, of Louisville, state Selective Service

Cook, discharged from the army for medical reasons April 16 after serving since last October 4, asked Judge Hamilton, re-employment committeeman for the local draft force. board, to help him get back his job as a window washer at the new state office building here. He said he applied last Friday but could get no definite information.

Judge Hamilton, who had planned to send Cook to Lexington to see the district attorney, said he telephoned Stephens again today and was advised that Colonel Rash should attempt to adjust the case before further steps were taken.

State officials expressed doubt that federal law could require a state to rehire a worker, though both Governor Willis and State Highway Commissioner J. Stephen Watkins said that where possible they would take back into their former jobs was being investigated.







#### LEARNING TO PLOW

AST NIGHT I dreamed with all the vividness of actual sight that I was looking at one of Williams' cartoons on the subject of this ar- Water Gap, visited his parents, Mr. ticle. The only thing wrong with the dream-picture was that the days ago. boy used a left-handed plow, a kind I had never seen when I did my first

Though every little farm boy loved to follow his father or the hired hand to the field and hold on to the plow handles as if he were actually doing a man's work, the day he really plowed first was a different thing. Learning to plow, all by one's self, was to be classed with having one's first date or making the first effort to shave with Father's old heavy Wade & Butcher razor. Never after that first experience as a plowman sett, at Prestonsburg this week. could a boy be called a baby; it just grew him up as if by magic.

Since I was the least boy of the family, it did not become my bounden duty to start plowing before I could walk very well, as many an old-timer pretends about himself. I must have been all of twelve when it all happened. My father, like many another person I knew, mixed his garden and his orchard pretty thoroughly. Consequently we had some of our earliest garden-potatoes, onions, beets, radishes and lettuce-right among urday night guest of her cousin, the apple trees. Part of this area had not been plowed in years, as if Miss Alta B. Stephens. waiting for me. One afternoon I was instructed to hitch the old family nag to a one-horse plow and start plowing the orchard. Father worked at my usual job, cleaning up the heavy weeds, briars, and small bushes. Then the show started. Ten minutes after the curtain rose I would gladly have had Mother come out and call me Sugar-lump or Baby if my pride had not been so arrogant. I struggled with those tufts of goldenrod and Mary Sue and Anna Ruth, have rebriar roots and wanted to say forbidden words to Old Mag, who raced turned home after spending a week along as if she were supposed to get through ahead of shhedule. The plow handles slapped me right and left, the big tufts tangled in my spindly legs and nearly threw me, and the sun "got hung on a limb," as an older poem has it. Father paid no more attention to me than if I had been an old hand. He picked up the trash and burned it with all the ease in the world. That was something, not to be noticed or to be cautioned again and again as to how to plow. By and by the small space was plowed, after a fashion that I would not recommend to any farmer. I then hitched Mrs. Dolly Reynolds Newsome, is Old Mag to the one-horse harrow and, by contrast, rested after my strenuous plowing. Again I took up the plow to lay off the potato rows, but the soil was already loose now, and no goldenrod or briar roots threw me down. And the sun was stil up pretty far when we dropped our last cutting of potatoes and covered it up with the same plow that had already done such good service. When it was all over and I was still able to walk to the barn with the old nag, I could have shouted for joy at being a big boy, no longer a pet or darling or sugar-lump or whatever Mother loved to call me as her baby. I was no longer to be scorned by the bad boys who were at Wheelwright Junction on folks this week. delighted in martyring little shavers. Old Mag and I had achieved a lasting glory in the orchard potato patch.

approximately 9 per cent above 1941 list prices on natural rubber tires of the same grade sold as original equipment for new cars, commonly known as manufacturers' 100 level Ceilings for the few natural rub-

ber tires and tubes still being sold are continued by freezing the February 1, 1944, levels.

New tires are sold only when the purchaser obtains a certificate from a rationing board.

To encourage a better supply of butter during the spring and summer months and as a reserve against possible shortage later on, the OPA has announced that wholesalers having available storage facilities

will be loaned points for storage. A wholesaler who wishes more butter, OPA said, may apply to his local War Price and Rationing Board for a point loan providing he has no excess points and he can obtain adequate storage facilities.

Application for butter point loan will be accepted up to July 10, 1944. Points obtained through loan may be used to acquire butter through July 1, 1944. Points borrowed and must be returned to OPA National Office by August 10. All loans must be repaid in full by September 10, 1944.

In re-payment of point loans, the number of points will be determined on the basis of the point value for butter at the time of his withdrawal from storage.


