A patient of the Martin General hospital is suffering acutely from endamoeba histolytica, common to the tropics but seldom seen in this section. The species, belonging to the protozoan family, is contracted through polluted water or raw vegetables from infected areas, and is very harmful, often remaining unsuspected for life.

The patient had undergone several lengthy periods of ill health without learning the cause. Various physicians had from time to time pronounced the trouble functional rather than organic, but Dr. C. L. Allen, of the Martin General staff, maintained that the symptoms were definitely pathogenic and equally serious. 


