

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

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

### UNPOLITICAL ADVICE

THE TIMES would give some unpolitical advice to politicians,

This advice is offered as the Kentucky General Assembly this week begins the study, the hemming-and-hawing and voting on, of and about legislation appurtenate only to Kentucky of all the forty-eight states of the Union.

It is probable that a majority of those Senators and Representatives who met at Frankfort this week were determined that Governor Simeon S. Willis keep his campaign pledge to dispense with the income tax. As "regular" Democrats, many resent the shouldering aside by Governor Willis of his Democratic opponent, J. Lyter Donaldson. These "strong" party men feel that Willis should be obliged to "make good" the promises he used as a wedge to pry loose the Democratic defenses in Kentucky. Deprived of Democratic leadership from the Governor's mansion, many Democratic members of the General Assembly may be determined that they have no duty except to practice the doctrine of "Survival of

But those who serve best will serve longest—in this state, as in the nation.

THE TIMES admits, here at the outset of this argument, that it is poor "practical" politics to let Governor Willis "get by" without making good these campaign promises.

That done, THE TIMES asks our Democratic Senators and Representatives, yet in the majority at Frankfort, what they plan for Kentucky.

Can these who hold the balance of power in their hands afford to force an issue to the detriment of Kentucky as a whole, simply because a gubernatorial candidate, in the heat of a campaign, laid the foundation for such an issue?

If Governor Willis' campaign promises were not to the tota carried out, would they be the first in the history of Kentucky unfulfilled?

This year of 1944, there is a war going on. Kentucky has its part to play as one of the integral parts of the Union which must share the load of the United States in an international role.

This year 1944 additional hospitals for those who suffer from tuberculosis in Kentucky are urgently needed. A conservative medical profession has called on Kentucky to supply these hospitals. One is not enough; promises are not enough for men and women afflicted by the disease and facing a battle for life itself.

The teachers of this state, for long years underpaid, deserve a higher rate of pay. Thousands of them have withstood the temptation of war-job salaries, have stuck to their posts. They must be

paid more. Economists who are, theoretically at least, uninterested in the fortunes of Governor Willis or any of his successors, but concerned only wth the plain figures at hand, tell us the repeal of the state income tax will make the building of more tuberculosis hospitals, greater pay to

teachers, impossible. If this is true, the duty of Democrats and Republicans alike is clear. We should forget politics. We who are Democrats are entitled to the privilege of pointing out the fact that the newlyelected Republican Governor of Kentucky has erred in his sanguine calculations; we are entitled to tell the people of Kentucky he failed to achieve what he promised. We may, indeed, take pains to let the people know that neither he nor any other member of the Republican party which prates on economy and efficiency can achieve the miracles they promise.

Yet there remains one plain, solemn duty for Democrats and Republicans alike to perform.

And that is-do their duty to Kentucky and the people of Kentucky.

It may be poor "practical" politics to protect the "Opposition" from its own vain promises. But Democrats cannot go wrong in voting the greatest service possible to Kentuckians of whatever political faith.

There most certainly is no need for any legislator, Democrat or Republican, to dedicate his high office to the chastisement of a successful candidate or the rebuke of a member of the opposition party at the expense of the diseased and the helpless of this state and to the disregard of the state's school-children.

Kentucky still looks to the Democratic party for leadership.





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
