\$100,000 in Awards Offered to 4-H'ers

Merit awards worth \$100,000 are offered this year as incentive to rural youth throughout America to achieve outstanding records in 4-H agricultural and home economics activities to help speed victory, it is announced by the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work. "These awards for outstanding achievements, which are provided by public spirited citizens and industrial organizations desirous of supporting 4-H club work, include the president of the United States National Achievement Award, National Leadership trophy, medals and plaques of honor, trips to the National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago, U. S. War Savings Bonds, and college, scholarships," the announcement states. "The 4-H club activities in which the awards are offered, are: national achievement, national leadership, victory garden, meat animal production, milk production and dairy foods demonstrations, canning, food preparation, girls' record, soil conservation, farm safety, rural electrification, food for victory, clothing achievement, dress revue and home grounds beautification. All these activities are conducted by the Extension Service of the state Agricultural Colleges and the U. S. Department of Agriculture co-operating. Full information concerning the activities may be obtained from county extension agents.

Officially defining a term that has often become a matter of debate in Floyd county, well represented in the past with a full quota of roadhouses and honky-tonks, Charles F. Brown, Jr., commissioner of alcoholic beverage control, in a circular letter from Fankfort addressed to "all retail beer licensees," warned them that the ban on beer sales at dancehalls, roadhouses and other places outside corporate limits would be rigidly enforced. "Any place of business commonly known as a roadhouse (as used in statutes) is hereby defined," Brown wrote, "as being any public place outside an incorporated city or town patronized by the public for purposes of amusement such as dancing and playing of music, juke boxes, pinball machines, slot machines or games of any kind; but does not include bona fide restaurants, groceries, general stores, filling stations, or other establishments where no form of amusement is permitted." The 1944 act forbade the sale of beer on premises used as a retail package liquor store, dancehall or roadhouse outside incorporated cities or towns except in counties which contain a city of the first, second or third class and which maintains a county police force.
