YOU: But, sir, the boys feel that they can't afford to die right now. Life is all they have over there, that and the hope of coming back home to the old life and happy days. You surely can afford—(You old soak, you can afford a quart of liquor a week, you can waste your money on chasing around, you... you).

P.: To tell you the truth, I haven't the time to discuss Bonds with you today.

YOU: I know, sir, you are a busy man. It is nice to have a nice business at home where enemy bombs will not get at it or you or your family. But don't you think there is a bigger business for us to help the boys attend to, just now. Come, Mr.—(Haven't the time!)—the good Lord would be doing the world a favor if He would cut your time demented short, you old skinflint!

P.: Give me time to think it over. I'd like to wait and make sure.

YOU: There is no time like the present, if I may remind you, sir. We're in this thing up to our necks. The boys are not being given time to think things over and to make sure. They're going out and doing them. They're told. We're asked. They need our support. Don't you think they deserve it? (Bless his heart—give him time! He wants to make sure! What has he been thinking of since Pearl Harbor? I know—of his own miserable, little self.)

P.: But the war will soon be over; the boys won't need our money.

YOU: I sincerely trust you are right. That is what millions of fighting men and their mothers and fathers are praying for—peace. But a victorious peace. General Kenney Tells Mother of Stephens Of Service Record

Word that her son, S/Sgt. Floyd G. Stephens, 26, veteran of more than 50 bombing missions in the southwest Pacific, has been awarded the Air Medal reached Mrs. Virgia R. Stephens, of Allen, in a personal letter from Lt. Gen. George C. Kenney, chief of air forces in that theater of action.

The award, Lt. Gen. Kenney's letter to Mrs. Stephens stated, was "in recognition of courageous service to his combat organization, his fellow American airmen, his country, his home and you." He was cited while participating on aerial flights, bombing enemy installations, shipping and supply bases, from July 21 to Dec. 22, 1943.

When relatives last were told of S/Sgt. Stephens' bombing record, some time ago, he had been on 51 missions.

"I would like to tell you," Lt. Gen. Kenney wrote Mrs. Stephens, "how genuinely proud I am to have such men as your son in my command... You have every reason to share that pride and gratification."

"I strolled with your mountain boys at Argonne and I know that they can once again stand on their own feet longest. I learned there why the sweetest apples grow on the side of a poor hill and why our finest people come from these mountains. So don't accept any quick makeshift in planning your hospital. The best and most enduring is yours for the making. Your own people will be its guiding influence."
