JURY ACQUITS RICE IN DEATH OF DR. MARTIN

Three Witnesses Face Possible Grand Jury Action, Officials Say

A jury of the Floyd circuit court Saturday acquitted Levy Rice of the murder charge filed against him in the death of Dr. Ernest E. Martin, well-known physician. The defense contended that Dr. Martin's death was accidental, that he tripped as he left the whiskey store of Gus Carlos and that his head struck the concrete sidewalk outside. The defendant and Carlos claimed that Rice's only part in the tragedy was a vain attempt to catch the physician and prevent the fall. Testimony of Willard Kinzer, Trent Woods and Clifford Branham to the effect that Rice seized Martin by the coat and hurled him onto the sidewalk was countered by statements at least two of the boys are alleged to have made in which they denied seeing such action and in which they claimed their original statements before the grand jury were gained through promise of a bribe. The three youths were held under bond to answer to action of the September grand jury which, officials said, may be asked to return perjury indictments against them. Kinzer, Woods and Branham were held in jail here for several days as material witnesses after they had disappeared during an earlier trial of the case. They also were fined for contempt of court. Gus Carlos, who also was named in a murder indictment in the death of Dr. Martin, was not on trial last week and his case was continued without process. The trial of Rice was the last of the April criminal term. An equity term of court began Monday.

Martin Woman Dies Thursday of Diabetes

Mrs. Shirley Spears, 26 years old, wife of Walker Spears, of Martin, died Thursday morning at the Beaver Valley hospital, victim of a two-year illness of diabetes. Mrs. Spears, a native of Lawrence county, was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Rickman. Besides her husband and parents, she is survived by two children, John L. and Lloyd. Funeral and burial will be made at 11 a. m. Friday under direction of the Ryan Funeral Home.

FBI Conference Slated May 10; W. W. Burchett To Address Meeting

M. W. McFarlin, special agent-in-charge, Louisville Field division, Federal Bureau of Investigation, this week announced that arrangements have been made to hold an FBI Enforcement Conference at Pikeville the afternoon of May 10. The conference will be sponsored by the Pike county Sheriff's office as well as the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Law enforcement officers and public officials whose work is closely related to law enforcement from Floyd, Morgan, Magoffin, Johnson, Martin, and Pike counties have been invited to attend. County Attorney W. W. Burchett, of this county, will speak on the subject, "Laws of Arrests, Searches and Seizures." Robert B. Doak, deputy sheriff, Pike county, will talk on "My Most Interesting Case." FBI representatives will discuss methods and means by which the FBI laboratory can aid local police agencies in solving murder cases and the handling of prisoners of war. During the course of the conference, the March of Time film, "Youth in Crisis," which has for its theme juvenile delinquency, will be shown. This will be the first of a series of three such conferences to be held during 1944 for law enforcement officers in this section of the state. During the month of May, similar conferences will be held in 11 other cities in the state of Kentucky.

He was born and reared at Beaver and had resided on Abbott Creek for the last few years. Two brothers and one sister also survive: Robert Elliott, Pikeville; John Elliott, of Martin, and Mrs. Joe Hall, of Beaver. Rice, of Cincinnati. Included in the trade are Mr. Spurlin's interest in 18 gas wells and in acreage yet to be drilled. Other real estate deals here this week were the sale by Rev. A. C. Harlowe of his friend street residential property to Henry and Essie Stephens, and the purchase by Paul Francis of the Frank Price property on College Lane.

FLOYD SOLDIER IS WAR VICTIM

One Missing, 3 Wounded, Reports Received Here Say; Moore Is Prisoner

Richmond Bradford, of Blue River, is reported as having been killed in an undisclosed theater of war, and Sgt. Edsel R. Barker, of Lackey, waist gunner on a Flying Fortress operating from Italy, is reported as missing. Wounded for the second time is a son of Pharaoh Deal, of Grethel, the American Red Cross chapter here was recently notified. Pfc. James Collinsworth, Prestonsburg, son of Tom Collinsworth, and Pvt. Warren G. Music, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wes Music, of Bonanza, are reported as having been wounded in the Mediterranean war theater. A son of Mrs. Flossie Moore, of the Left Beaver section, who first was reported as missing, is a German prisoner, relatives have been notified. Sgt. Barker has been missing since April 9 when his plane was shot down over Austria.

Williams Paints Realistic Picture For Grads; Scholarships Awarded

A realistic word-picture of the problems facing the high school graduate of today was painted by State Superintendent John Fred Williams in his Commencement address here Friday night to a graduating class of 170 seniors of the county's nine high schools. The scholarships will be awarded for only one year at a time. Each scholarship will be \$400 in amount. Each student's case will be considered by the Scholarship Committee at the end of every school year before the scholarship is continued for the following year. In case of accident, illness or other unusual incident, a scholarship may be continued in spite of one quarter or more of low scholastic work. All students will be required to submit a written report to the company at the end of each quarter showing their grades and a brief outline of their progress. In the summer following the freshman, sophomore and junior years, an effort will be made to obtain for the students holding the scholarships, work in or around the Wheelwright operation, but the company does not promise or guarantee employment to any of the students after graduation. At the end of each school year the County Superintendents in Floyd, Knott and Pike counties, under the conditions mentioned in this plan, will be permitted to select two outstanding high school graduates, who desire to qualify for the scholarships. The students so selected shall report to the University of Kentucky on the day designated by the Dean of the University for a competitive test. The Scholarship Committee will conduct an examination of the students which will include tests in Vocabulary, Reading, English, Arithmetic and Algebra. The committee will also arrange for a standard psychology test and weight will be given by the committee to the scholastic standing and the extra-curricular activities of each student during the last year of high school. The company will pay the actual expenses, to Lexington and return, of each student selected by the three County Superintendents to take the competitive examination. The company will also pay all proper expenses of the members of the Scholarship Committee in conducting the tests and making the awards.

Most Meats Are Ration-Free But OPA Halves Red Points

All meat except steaks and roast of beef became ration free at midnight Wednesday, but that doesn't mean all the points that formerly went into hamburger and pork and lamb can be diverted to bigger and juicier sirloins. There'll be only half as many red points as before. The Office of Price Administration figures the average consumer can have more of the items still to be rationed—steak and beef roast, butter, margarine, cheese and evaporated milk. And of course he can have all the hamburger, pork and other non-rationed meat he can find and pay for. The actual effect on each individual will vary widely according to what he has bought with red points in the past. For instance a person who has used most of his red points for steak and butter will be cut in these items. If he has been eating a 10-pound steak and a 3-point quarter-pound of butter every two weeks heretofore, he has had 17 of his bi-weekly allotment of 30 red points left for other items including the meats taken off rationing. With the red point allowance slashed to 15 every two weeks beginning next Sunday, he will have only two points every two weeks for cheese, evaporated milk and margarine unless he cuts steak and butter consumption.

BOARD HIRES 375 TEACHERS FOR 1944-45

Status of Teachers Who are Inducted Being Protected

A full staff of approximately 375 teachers for the 1944-45 school year was employed Tuesday by the Floyd County Board of Education. Rural schools will begin their terms July 17; high schools, on August 28. Several teachers who will be inducted for service in the armed forces were named to teaching positions, Superintendent Town Hall said, so that their record under the teacher-tenure act will not be affected by their absence. These teachers will be given leaves of absence, Mr. Hall said, and will be eligible to resume teaching where they left off when called up for service. 

SPORTSMEN'S CONVENTION

The League of Kentucky Sportsmen will meet in a one-day convention May 22, in the Lafayette hotel, Lexington. There was no convention in 1943 and the sportsmen feel that one is needed, since the new civil service law for the Division of Game and Fish was passed.

The new law provides that Governor Willis appoint a nine-man game and fish commission from nominations made by the sportsmen in each Congressional district. The sportsmen are to select five persons in each district at meetings which John M. Perkins, director of the Division of Game and Fish, is to call within 30 days after the law becomes effective June 13. Each club is to send two delegates who are to act in a business capacity. Each club should have two delegates present and a good delegation of club members and officers.

Following is a program of the meeting: 10 a.m.—registration of delegates; 10:30 a.m.—report of the secretary and treasurer, Dahlia Gooch; 10:45 a.m.—words from the president, Dennis Gooch; 11 a.m.—round-table discussion; 12 noon—committees announced; 12:30—luncheon; short talks to be made by some Kentucky's key men in the conservation field; 2 p.m.—business session for executive committee and delegates; election of officers.

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
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
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THE OLD JUDGE SAYS...

The boys who do the ground and maintenance work on those big bombers which carry unwelcome messages to the enemy are among the "forgotten men" of the war and deserve plenty of credit, the men who fly the planes tell us. S/Sgt. Haywood B. Steele, now at Atlantic City, N.J., after flying on 50 bombing missions as a ball-turret gunner, writes to give credit to a Prestonsburg boy. His letter follows, in part:

"I am writing you in behalf of Sgt. Bill Tom Archer who is one of your local boys. He was one of the fine men who serviced the plane which I flew the majority of my 50 missions as ball-turret gunner. Our pilot received the D.F.C. and there were also four 'Purple Hearts' awarded to members of our crew. My local paper gave me quite a write-up, but now I wish to express my gratitude for the splendid work of the ground crew that certainly helped make it possible. These men worked under most trying conditions and with the true American spirit. The plane which is theirs, is called the famous 'Yankee Doodle' which has already received publicity and certainly deserves as much if not more than the famous 'Yankee Doodle Dandy,' as it is still flying with over a hundred missions to its credit and having had numerous repairs made as well as surviving a crash landing which our crew was in and also having weathered some very difficult flying conditions as well as much flak and enemy fighters with no losses.

"This splendid record is partly due to the fine co-operation of the best ground crew in our outfit. I am quite sure that Sgt. Archer's parents, relatives and friends will be pleased to read about him in your paper."

Commanding Officer Lauds Floyd Soldier

The personal interest officers of U.S. fighting forces take in the men in their command is strikingly shown in a letter from Col. Rothwell H. Brown at headquarters of a Chinese-American tank group to Mrs. Susie Osborne, Hite. The letter, telling Mrs. Osborne of her son, Norman, who was wounded, follows: "Please accept my sincere apologies for not writing to you sooner about your son, Norman. War Department regulations and a little unfinished business with the Japs have made it impossible to write to you sooner.

"Norman was wounded in the left arm. It was only a flesh wound, no bones being broken. While the wound was painful, it is not at all serious. Norman will probably have a scar, but already skin grafting and excellent surgery are at work, even removing this reminder of his wound. Norman was administered first aid by our medical officer very shortly after he was wounded, and was then evacuated to an American hospital. My latest report shows that he is coming along just fine, and we are all looking forward to having him join us once again.

"I know that you would have been proud of Norman the night that he was wounded. Although we were entirely surrounded by Japs, and receiving heavy fire from all sides, Norman proceeded about his duties calmly and unflinching by the dangers around us. When he was wounded he waited calmly for first aid treatment and then waited bravely until the time when we could evacuate him to the rear.

"Norman had been with us for many months and I had come to depend greatly upon his skill and ability. During the months that Norman worked with this organization he helped forge and train a unit that has since paid back for the wound he received many times over. I cannot tell you how many Japs we have killed or wounded, but for each of our men hurt the Japs have been hurt fifty-fold.

"There is so little that we can say to the mothers and fathers of our soldiers, to help ease the grief and worry that they bear in silence in their hearts. I hope that knowing that Norman is all right, and that he has borne himself bravely and proudly as a real man and soldier will help in some small way to ease your worries. Some day, when this is all over, Norman will come home to you a fine, brave young man to take his place in the world which he is fighting to defend."
