A library, dedicated to Floyd county's men and women who wore their country's uniform, would stand as more than a physical thing in memory of these of our kith and kin who served in behalf of us all. The children of this and succeeding generations for whom the "boys" fought would find therein a beauty in the printed page, and through them the memory of a memorial library would be a living, even an undying, thing. Therein would be the wisdom of the sages, the depths of imagination, the beauty of the

Such a county institution would be dedicated to all who wore the uniform in the country's hours of need. Inside its halls might well be tablets bearing the names of those who died for this and all other such institutions. It should contain a "Town Hall" where the American Legion and all other veterans' organizations, as well as every civic body, could

In brief, such a monument to service could be a community center.

If this is an idea so fantastic it should be ignored, it deserves no further thought. If it is worthwhile, readers of this newspaper can make it a success by begin working now. Your suggestions

"On the 30th day of May, 1944, the ber of a tank crew with his organization. During an engagement with the enemy the tank in which he was riding was knocked out of action by an enemy anti-tank shell. The gunner, who was severely wounded, managed to escape from the vehicle and stated that he was the only member to get out of the tank. Shortly thereafter the enemy advanced and the gunner was taken prisoner. Due to the enemy concen-tration on the area where the tank battle had been in progress, it was impossible to reach the knocked-out tank to evacuate any remaining occupants. Later, the tactical situa-tion rendered it impossible to return to that vicinity, therefore, Chester was reported as missing in action.

"Recently, on the area being searched and the interior of the tank being inspected, sufficient evidence was uncovered to determine that the gunner, who had been ac-counted for, had been the only member of the tank crew to extricate himself from the vehicle. Such evidence being considered reasonably conclusive of death, and which leads to no other logical conclusion, it is determined that Chester perished in his tank on the 30th of May, 1944 after it was knocked out by an enemy anti-tank shell."

A son of the late Rev. and Mrs. R. S. Allen, the victim entered the army Oct. 14, 1941 and was one of two selectees picked at Ft. Knox to go along with men who had from three to four years' previous training. His armored regiment embarked from New York for Ireland, later invading North Africa. He took part in the following engagements: Oran, Ousseltia Valley, Kasserine Pass, El Guetarfi and final pursuit of the enemy in Africa to the sea, May 7, 1943. He was in Sicily with Gen. Patton's men for several months, thence into Itay.
