After the Democratic majority on the Legislative Council had falled to receive from Governor Willis a statement as to his fiscal policy, including the matter of repeal or re-tention of the state income tax, two Floyd county legislators moved to modify the Governor's appointive

Representative Jerry F. Howell, of Gearheart, a Democratic member of the Council, said he and Democratic Senator Doug Hays, of McDowell, are in agreement that the Democratic majorities in both branches ought to consider the following bills:

1. To abolish the present one-man highway commission appointed by the Governor in favor of a commission of seven to nine members to be named by the Governor with ratification by the Senate.

2. To abolish the present three-man Republican Alcoholic Beverage Control Board, appointed by the Governor, in favor of a board of, say, three Democrats and two Re-publicans to be appointed by the Governor with ratification by the

3. To give the Senate general power of ratification over the Governor's major appointees.

The Governor has the unimpeded power of appointment and removal since the Reorganization Act of 1936 centralized wide authority in the Governor's office.

Representative Howell said he favors the broad prinicple of approval by the Senate of major appointments by the Governor. Now that the Governor is a Republican and the Senate is Democratic by 21 to 17, Howell said the time strikes him as opportune to amend the law in anticipation of the time when the Governor and a majority of the Senate will be from the same party.
