I will propose to the Fiscal Court the elimination of the payment of a county poll tax and, by stopping the leaks and useless expenses, I will further propose a decrease in your tax rate. Just one example of bad managment: You will recall that, a number of years ago, the fiscal court, pursuant to a vote of the people, issued a bond issue of \$475,000 worth of 5 per cent road and bridge bonds, without any callable feature, and as a result of the non-callable clause, more than \$100,000.00 has been paid out in interest and is still being paid and will be for many years to come because the bonds were not callable. I was schooled in the experience of hard knocks and know the conditions

of people in remote places. I will perform the duties of the office and not burden you with promises. I am not running on a promissory platform, but will give you action instead. Use your head and cast your ballot for those who will serve your best interest and then you will have done your duty to yourself, family and children and Floyd county as a whole. Anyone coming before me will receive a fair trial and a square deal in the future as in the past. You may rest assured that I will guard the finances of the county. Floyd county is one of the best counties in Kentucky from a point of natural resources and deserves the best in of-

Anyone not acquainted with me is invited to inquire of the people with whom I have been reared and associated as to my honesty in the various kinds of business in which I have been engaged.

I have never been in the Army or Navy, but I would have been glad to have served my country in that capacity as my patriotic duty. I only had one brother and he served in the first World War, who was killed. I now have a son who has been in the present war for more than four years and is now somewhere in Germany.

I have, both as an official and private citizen, played no inconsiderable part in the development of my home county. It has been my pleasure over the years to be of service to thousands of good citizens in a business way and to join others in the life of the community. I am a life member of Zebulon Lodge No. 273, F. & A.M., also a member of Royal Arch Chapter, Knights Templar and Shrine for many years; a Red Man for 30 years, a member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows for 33 years and also a member of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks-none of which, of course, are political in any sense, and which I mention merely as a part of my record as a citizen. I am making this race on my record as an official and private citizen and not that of someone else.

I have always tried to be the same every day and have never gotten to the point of feeling I was important because of any position I held. Some people have thought I was not making this race to win, but merely for some other purpose. You will soon be convinced I am not making it for fun.

Cast your vote for the candidate for the office of County Judge who in your honest opinion will be the safest and do you the best job, and I will be satisfied. If I am nominated and elected, you will never have cause to regret it and you may be assured I will be on the ticket until the end and I will not let you down.

depending upon type syrup wanted. Addition of a few grains of salt will improve flavor of canned and preserved fruits. Do not use extra salt if fruit was dropped in salt water when preserved.
