## Cornett's Statement To Voters



### DEAR FRIENDS OF FLOYD AND KNOTT COUNTIES:

We are all proud that the devastation of this horrible war is rapidly coming to a close. Almost every family throughout the United States of America and the lands of our allies have done a noble job.  
I am proud of America, her heritage, and her institutions.  
I am proud that my great-great-grandfather, William Cornett, served under General George Washington in the Revolutionary army. I love the freedom and liberty for which he fought. As Common-wealth's Attorney, I will uphold these principles. I will not betray the trust of my forefathers nor the trust of the good people of this district.  
I am proud of the many families in this district who have shown courage and love of country in this and past wars.  
There is not the least doubt in my mind but that my opponent in this campaign did his duty in World War I. I had five uncles in that war.  
My father was about my opponent's age. He belonged to my generation. He gave his life to our country. He served overseas nearly three years, and was in uniform nearly nine years. No one could have done more. As Commonwealth's Attorney I will try to live for the things for which he died.

Like Father — 1918 — Like Son FOUR SONS OF WORLD WAR I VETERAN IN UNIFORM DURING PRESENT WAR



Four sons of Joe P. Tackett, World War I veteran, and Mrs. Tackett, of Prestonsburg, have taken part in the present conflict. Sgt. Joe P. Tackett, Jr., 26, eldest of the four, has been in the army since December, 1942, and is now stationed at Ft. Jackson, S.C., with a medical detachment. His two children are here with his parents. Cpl. Bernard Tackett, 24, is with General Clark's army in Italy, serving with the signal corps. A veteran of the Anzio landing and the remainder of the Italian campaign, he enlisted in December, 1942. His wife, the former Thelma Jean Africa, of Prestonsburg, resides in Louisville.

While my volunteer campaign committee insisted upon reproducing the above clipping from a former issue of The Times, I am frank to say that the war record of me and my sons alone does not qualify me for the office I seek. It does show, however, that we are, to say the least, worthy and patriotic citizens.
