In the same skeptical mood, we wonder why, even though there is a dearth of trainees at this time, those charged with the program's responsibilities do not recall that July and August have in the past been equally dull at the shop. Floyd county has a very real interest in this matter, for it was the money paid by every taxpayer which made the building here possible, and federal funds equipped it with modern machinery such as which at one time made it the envy of other NYA plants of the section.

That the shop should "go on vacation" is not a matter for argument. Perhaps it should for these two months. But it most certainly should not be closed-somebody should remain there to confer with applicants for future training-if it is to remain an active part of the vocational education program.

### Pfc. Wells Killed In Philippines May 15



Pfc. Arvil Wells, 22-year-old son of Sam Wells, of Garrett, was instantly killed on Cebu, Philippine Islands, May 15, while fighting as an infantryman.

He had been overseas 25 months. A letter from his commanding officer, Capt. Edward L. Wood, told circumstances of the Floyd soldier's death: "Our company was engaging the enemy 2500 yards southwest of Tabogan, Cebu, Philippine Islands. In the action Arvil was mortally wounded in the head by an enemy rifleman. He died instantly . . . Arvil was with us through two major campaigns and was always dependable, even during the many trying times we had to endure . . . He was a credit to his family, his country

ous. In most camps there has not been any meat in the last 10 to 14 6-21-2t days. If the coal supply is to be maintained this matter must be adusted immediately as it is serious. It is impossible to expect coal miners to maintain present coal production unless this matter is corrected at once.

"President Caddy has literally burned the wires up sending tele-grams to Senator Barkley and Congressman Robsion telling the story of the meat shortage in the Hazard field, showing that only two pounds per person of fresh meat, bacon, lard and lunch meat was available for the combined months of March and April. The telegram also revealed that during April only 1.07 pounds of lard and meats were available for the 11,000 people in the Big Sandy area. Five mines of the Elk Horn Coal Corporation received less than one pound per person for the month of April, including butter, lard and cheese. At the Wheelwright mines 1,500 persons received less than four ounces for the month of April, or less than 20 pounds per person per year, which includes all fats, butter, lard and cheese. Caddy pointed out that for a population of 1,225, only 18 pounds of meat and 36 pounds of lard were received for
