### Case Spurns Shrapnel Which Wounded Him As War Souvenir

Mitchel Field, N. Y., March 2 (Sp.)—Pfc. Elba Case, son of Mrs. Nancy Case, Honaker, Ky., arrived recently at this air evacuation center by AAF hospital plane after a year of service overseas. With the Third armored division, the 19-year-old lad has been through some of the toughest fighting of the war.

"None of the country over here can touch Kentucky," he said, "yet to be fair, I guess we moved around too fast to really see much of it." He was wounded at Stalburg before he received the wound which invalidated him from a German 88 which caught up with him. On the first occasion four days in a field hospital fixed him up so that he was able to catch up with his old unit.

The second time the shrapnel hit him in the stomach and severed the muscles in the upper part of his right arm. "The medics offered me one piece of shrapnel they took out of me as a souvenir, a piece almost as big as your fist, but I said no, thank you, I have had enough of it."

He is anxious to see his eight brothers and sisters and the farm again. Like all the wounded flown to this air evacuation hospital, Pfc. Case has been transferred to another hospital for further treatment.

### 2 FATHERS ARE JAILED

**As Second Offenders In Truancy Cases; Four Others Fined**

Two Floyd county fathers were serving 10-day jail terms here this week following conviction as second offenders in failing to send their children to school, county attendance officers said. They are Fred Ratliff, McDowell, and Herbert Slone, Wheelwright.

Meanwhile, four other defendants were fined \$10 each as first-time offenders in the truancy of their children: Woots and Anna Shepherd, Hite; K. C. Crum, Printer, and Isaac Shepherd, Hite.

The convictions were procured on warrants sworn out by Attendance Officers W. D. Steele and Paris Conley.

### Meadows Gets Two Of 23 Japanese Bagged by Patrol

WITH ARMY SOMEWHERE IN THE PHILIPPINES—Pfc. Dennis Meadows, Sloan, Ky., is credited with being a member of the first patrol of his veteran division to contact and kill Japanese during its third campaign. Cpl. Meadows got two Nips that day. Sent out to reconnoiter an area, the patrol first dispatched eight Nipponese hiding in an abandoned shack. Then they continued their march and added 14 more of the emperor's soldiers to their score. The Sloan infantryman shot one Jap who was running across a field and another in a Jap village. A search next day disclosed a newly dug grave spotted with fresh blood. This raised the number of Japs killed by the patrol to 23.

Several of the Japs were found playing dead and killed before they could do any damage. One was crouching in a doorway, saber in hand, waiting to cut down the first man to enter. A little way behind sat a second Nip with an American pistol ready for firing. Both were killed by the patrol leader.

Two more Nips were caught in this way. One was lying in a draw, the other, beneath a bed. Infantrymen saw them breathing and made sure they stopped before moving on.

As part of the patrol approached a shack, a soldier saw a Jap hiding beneath. He seemed to be working at something with his hands in front. Then he raised his right arm. The American fired. A few seconds later a hand grenade exploded. The Nip had been caught just as he was about to throw the grenade at the Americans.

A sergeant had just finished off a Nip when he saw two more lying in the grass a few yards ahead. Giving them no time for any surprise moves, he jumped over and killed both of them with lead.

"It sure was a big Jap hunt for me," was Pfc. Meadows' summary of the action. "I hope we get all of them soon. It'll be a big day for every one."

He is a son of "Smoky" Joe Meadows, World War I veteran.

### Alex Crider Victim Of Pneumonia at 92; Was Last of Family

Alex Crider, one of the section's oldest men, died at the age of 92 Monday night at his home on Coperas Creek, a victim of pneumonia which developed during an illness of several days.

A son of Mr. and Mrs. Reece Crider, pioneer residents of the Johns Creek section, Mr. Crider died on the farm where he was born and reared. He was a farmer, a member for many years of the Methodist church and one of the county's best citizens.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Elsie Crider, who is 89 years old, the daughter, Mrs. Ida Fraley, of German, 12 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.

Funeral rites were conducted Monday (Thursday) from the home near German, the Rev. Henry Crider officiating, and burial was made in the family cemetery under direction of the Arnold Funeral Home.

### PAY \$40,000 IN GAS DEAL

**Local Group Acquires 20 Producing Wells, Drill Big Gasser**

Purchase for \$40,000 of gas holdings in Floyd, Pike and Magoffin counties and in West Virginia which include approximately 20 producing wells was made Monday by Ex-Magistrate W. A. Wills, Commonwealth's Attorney John Allen, Circuit Judge Henry Stephens, Otis Cooley and Ken Sparks, all of Prestonsburg.

The properties, consisting mainly of gas interests formerly owned by County Clerk A. B. Meade, were acquired from Glenn C. Spradlin, it was said.

Same day the deal was consummated, a gas well of 1,770,000 cubic feet volume was struck on the J. H. Roop lease, Johns Creek, which is a part of the property conveyed in the transaction.

### Mrs. Shepherd Found Dead at Home Near Lancer Last Sunday

Mrs. Louraney Handshoe Shepherd, 73 years old, widow of Almander Shepherd, well-known Prestonsburg man, was found dead in bed at her home near Lancer early Sunday morning.

Although in ill health for the last three years, Mrs. Shepherd on the preceding evening was cheerful and talked with relatives and friends till late. Her death during the night was ascribed to a heart attack.

A daughter of the late Brice Handshoe, she was a native of Knott county but had resided in this vicinity for years and had many friends over a wide section. Her husband died 18 years ago.

Surviving are five sons and one daughter: Tobe Shepherd, Prestonsburg; Mrs. Lee Harmon, Prestonsburg; Troy, of Trenton, N. J.; Frank, of Huntington, W. Va.; Melvin, with the army in Italy, and Woodrow, on army duty in Germany. She also leaves one sister, Mrs. W. B. Fitzpatrick, Garrett, and two brothers, Dave and Wilson Handshoe, of Quicksand Creek, Knott county.

Mr. Conley had been in ill health for some time. He was about 35 years old. Besides his sister here, he leaves three sisters and three brothers. Funeral arrangements had not been announced when the Rev. and Mrs. Regan left here Tuesday.

### REA CO-OPS PLAN SUIT

**Public Service Body Denies Re-Hearing In Rural Power Case**

The Public Service Commission has denied a re-hearing to four Rural Electric Administration co-operatives opposing the 1,156-mile rural expansion of the Kentucky and West Virginia Power Company, Ashland, it was announced last week by Thomas B. McGregor, chairman.

Curtis Brown, Brandenburg, president of the Kentucky Rural Electric Co-operatives Association, immediately began plans to appeal the case to the courts. The legal fight will be financed jointly by all the co-operatives in the state, notwithstanding that only four are directly affected. They have 20 days to file their appeal.

The four East Kentucky co-operatives—the Fleming-Mason, Licking Valley, Big Sandy and Cumberland Valley—are fighting rural expansion of the Kentucky and West Virginia in 16 mountain counties on the grounds R.E.A. cannot develop area coverage of sparsely settled territory if private utilities are allowed to skim the cream of rural business by serving the more densely populated sections.

Two other major developments have occurred since the commission approved Kentucky and West Virginia's \$2,085,508 rural expansion program January 22, following hearings in July, 1943. They are:

1. R.E.A. at St. Louis immediately suspended loan allotments to Kentucky co-operatives until their ability to be self-liquidating can be re-examined in light of the Jan. 22 order allowing Kentucky and West Virginia to make 151 rural extensions in territory claimed by the four co-operatives.

2. The co-operatives announced they will ask the 1946 Legislature to remove them from jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission.

McGregor said the record will show the commission's soundness of judgment in granting Kentucky and West Virginia's rural expansion. Mc-

### WOMAN DIES OF GUNSHOT

**Rifle Accidentally Fired by Children Results in Tragedy**

Wounded Saturday morning at 11 o'clock by a bullet from a 22-calibre rifle which was accidentally discharged as her children played with the weapon, Mrs. Fanny Francis Derossett, 47 years old, wife of Sol D. Derossett, died on the operating table of the Prestonsburg General hospital, seven hours later.

The bullet first struck Mrs. Reynolds Derossett, daughter-in-law of the victim, inflicting a flesh wound, then passed through the elder woman's abdomen. The rifle had been used, shortly before the tragedy, in shooting a chicken and had been left, loaded, on a bed of the Derossett home on Abbott mountain, near here.

A daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenis Francis, of Riceville, Johnson county, Mrs. Derossett had resided in this county for years and had many friends in this section. She was a member of the Baptist Church. Besides her husband and parents, she leaves three sons and two daughters: Reynold Derossett, Garrett; Mrs. Arthur Johns Archer, Atlantic City, N.J.; Robie Lewis Derossett, Prestonsburg; Sol D., Jr., and Lillis Derossett, at home. Three brothers also survive: Bill Francis, Pikeville; Bernard, of East Point, and Goldin Francis, Man, W. Va.

### DEMS ENTER FIRE PROBE

**C.-J. Reporter Says Party Leaders Hire Private Detective**

Some Eastern Kentucky Democratic leaders have decided to help the Kentucky State Highway Department try to solve the mystery of the \$75,000 fire which destroyed the department's garage at Pikeville last October, Allan M. Trout reported from Frankfort Monday to The Courier-Journal.

They have pledged money to hire private detectives to investigate the fire, Trout wrote.

Commissioner of Highways J. Stephen Watkins said if the Democrats have discovered something that would warrant their putting up their own money to develop it, he will ask the circuit judge, commonwealth's attorney and county attorney to summon sponsors of the investigation before the Pike county grand jury to find out what it is. Who the sponsors are, THE TIMES failed to learn through inquiries made by telephone.

Watkins said his department, the Highway Patrol and the state fire marshal's office started investigating the fire the next day, are still at work on it and expect to continue until the origin of the fire is cleared up. If private detectives can clear up the mystery, Watkins said, he will welcome their help.

The decision to employ private detectives was reached in Frankfort late last week at a conference of the Democrats putting up the money.

State Fire Marshal Clyde Smith said his office held a court of inquiry in Pikeville in November and another in December. While nothing developed bearing directly on the origin of the fire, Smith said testimony revealed several minor irregularities that resulted in indictment of three garage employes by the last Pike county grand jury.

The disension at Pikeville started early last year when district highway headquarters was moved from Pikeville to Ashland. The trans-

**Floyd War Dead Total Now Stands at 97; 3 Wounded 2nd Time**

A casualty list of nine Floyd county soldiers was reported to next-of-kin during the week, and the one listed as killed in action raised the total of the county's war dead to 97.

Killed in action was Pvt. Curtis Conn, son of Mrs. Mayte Conn, of Dana, who had previously been listed as missing. His mother was notified by the War Department that he was killed Christmas Day.

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## EXHUME THE FACTS!

WE all may have appeared a bit ridiculous in our discussions of the selection of Ashland as a site for the district tuberculosis sanatorium, but none so utterly ridiculous as one member of the Sanatorium Commission.

This latest contributor to the argument is Dr. O. F. Hume, of Richmond, and the doctor in his declaration that criticism of the Commission's choice of Ashland is "a bloody butchery of true facts" not only did the King's English no good but he probed so deep into the absurd that he reached the nadir thereof.

Nobody except the Richmond doctor has, even during the earliest and most heated reactions to the selection, turned either tongue or pen to the cheap business of belittling any community.

As quoted in The Courier-Journal, Dr. Hume said the several sanatoria would employ "scores of professional people—doctors, nurses and other attendants. These professional people will have to have rooms, apartments and homes to live in. They will not live on the side of the road or in a cave."

Delightful, isn't he? "Caves"—indeed! "True facts"—my maiden aunt! Is this all a man who has presumably spent years in learning one of the noblest of arts knows of a section of his state? Have not the very human experiences he must have had in the practice of his profession broadened the doctor's point of view beyond that of those ignoramuses who think of the Kentucky mountains as a place like the comic strip "Dog Patch"?

Now to the points the doctor makes about the tuberculosis program bill calling for adequate utilities. "That means," (he says) electricity—not some (small) farm generating plant; that means natural gas—burning gas, not talking gas."

Did not the learned doctor know that the village of Allen is in the heart of the rich Eastern Kentucky gas field, that within a mile of the place is one of the largest compressor stations in Kentucky, that within a radius of a few miles are two of the largest gas compressor stations in the United States? Is his ignorance of Eastern Kentucky so abysmal that he does not know that every town in Floyd county has electricity and that the Kentucky & West Virginia Power Company and a Rural Electrification Administration co-op are now warring for the right to extend their lines farther into rural territory?

"True facts", eh? Let us see. Dr. Hume propounds for himself and the Commission this bit of profundity: "To our way of thinking, the center of any T.B. district is the place in that district that is most accessible . . . the town most visited by people is the center of the district . . ."

Then will this expounder of "true facts" explain to the satisfaction of this newspaper why he and every other member of the Commission selected Paris, Bourbon county, over Lexington, Ky., in District No. 3?

And will Dr. Hume tell us if he, in his burning desire to make the best choice of sites, ever studied the plans for these sanatoria that are to be built? He says homes and apartments will be necessary for doctors and nurses. We are told—we regret that we have not studied the plans, ourselves—that nurses' and doctors' living quarters are a part of the plan for each sanatorium.

Will the doctor also make bold to declare to the people of Kentucky that his interest in the poor sufferers from tuberculosis is as deep as that of Dr. Howard, of Glasgow, who from the beginning led the fight for a state tuberculosis program, spent hundreds of dollars from his own pocket and gave of his time and physical strength to stand before officials and legislators to plead the cause of these men and women of the state who are threatened with the slow torture which ends only at the grave? If he cannot show such a record he might explain why he could not go along with Dr. Howard and three other members of the Sites Committee, all of whom visited Allen and there found not cave-dwellers but a fair and growing community where they decided a hospital for the treatment of the suffering should be located.

For a change, Dr. Hume, exhume some truly "true facts."

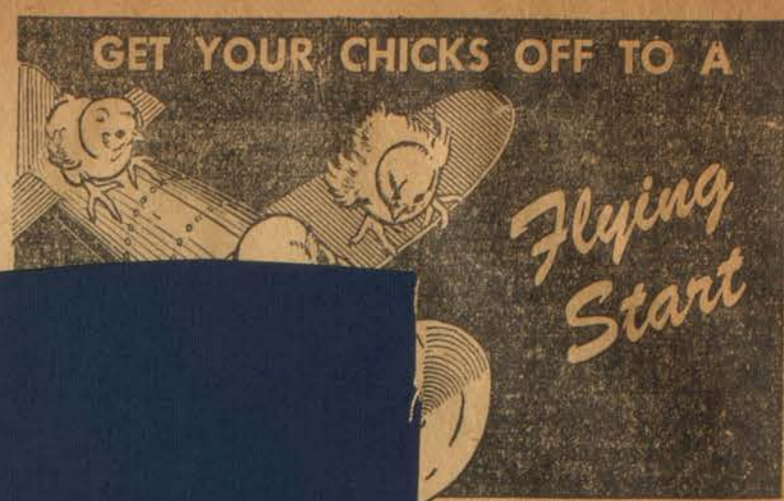

The Floyd County Fish & Game Club held a meeting at Garrett in the high school auditorium Sunday evening. Moving pictures were shown, one film of "Fresh Water Fishing," a war picture, "Sicily," and "The Fish Fry at Allen in 1942." E. R. Burke, conservation officer, outlined the plans of the club's activities for this year, among them the two quail farms that will be operated by the club, the restocking of raccoons, and the liberation of black bass. He pointed out that several million dollars are to be spent in Kentucky to improve hunting and fishing conditions in a post-war program and that in order for Floyd county to share in the program, we must have a large and active sportsman's club (the membership at present is over 400 members). A group of sportsmen and landowners living near Hueysville had got together prior to the meeting and sent a representative, offering the club several hundred acres of land for another game farm. They promised the club their co-operation in getting the necessary work done to furnish the birds proper food and cover, and asked that the club furnish a few pairs of raccoons to be stocked on the farm. The club is considering the site for a third game farm in the county and is ordering the raccoons they asked for.

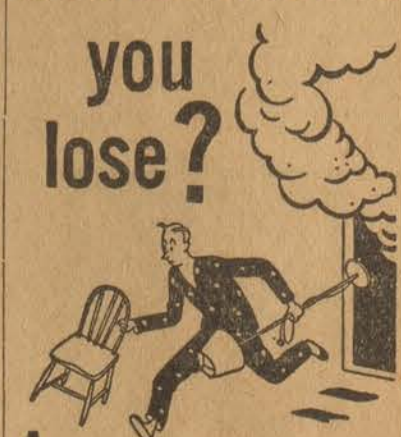

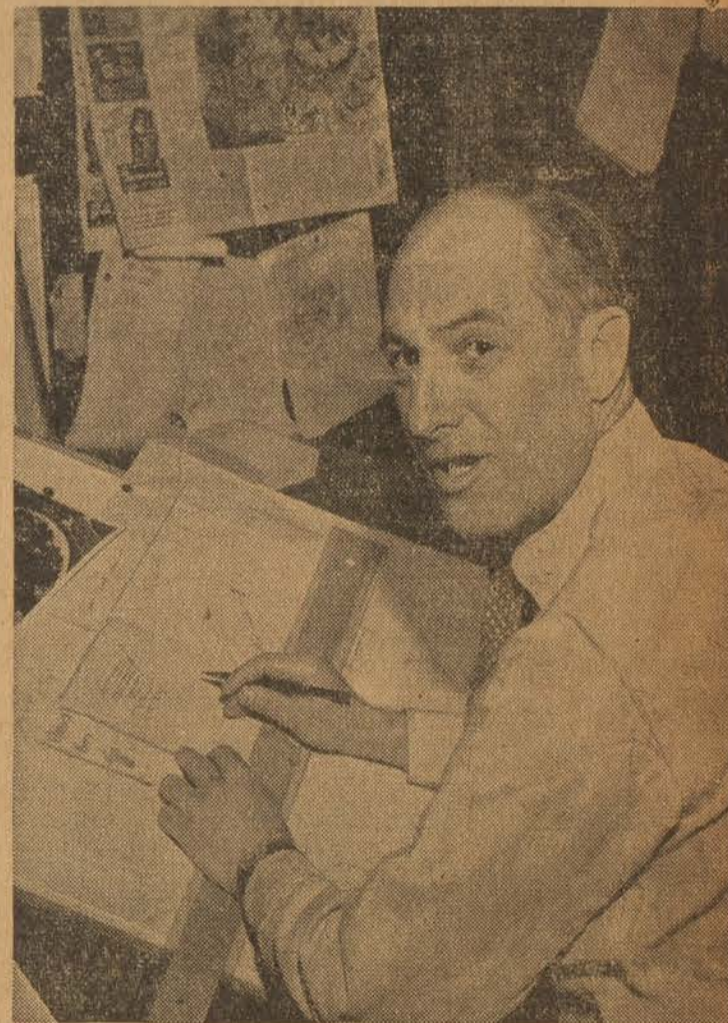

regor cited the following points as justifying the order: 1. Kentucky and West Virginia edged rate reductions, contingent on the expansion, that would reduce service below R.E.A. charges. 2. The area to be served is not firm lands, but is dotted with coal mines, mining camps and saw mills. 3. Most of the extensions proposed would be lines leading direct from many sub-stations Kentucky and West Virginia already operates in the area. 4. The new sections proposed to be served lie at the edges of the territory now served by Kentucky and West Virginia, and logically belong to it by reason of proximity, accessibility and noncompetition with R.E.A. in its development of farm service.

During his stay in Prestonsburg, Mr. Rupp will be the guest of Bill Sturgill, a member of his championship team of this year, at the home of Sturgill's parents, Sheriff and Mrs. Troy B. Sturgill.

Rupp, widely recognized as one of the nation's greatest coaches, has developed winning teams consistently since he came to Kentucky in 1930. In 1944, he was elected to basketball's Hall of Fame, being the 10th coach so honored.

In 14 seasons, his fast-breaking, hard-charging and accurate-shooting Kentucky teams have won 233 games while losing but 58.

Rupp's Wildcats have won eight conference championships in 14 years, annexing titles in 1933, 1935, 1937, 1939, 1940, 1942, 1944 and last week's tourney.

During one period, overlapping two seasons, the Rupp Raiders won 24 consecutive victories and, over a five-year period, they won 45 straight conference victories.

Since Rupp, the Baron of Kentucky basketball, has been at the University, the Wildcats have lost but eight games on their home floor. The coach is a native of Halstead, Kansas, where he captained his high school basketball team. At the University of Kansas, from which he was graduated in 1923, he played under Dr. Phog Allen. After graduation from Kansas, he coached for one year in the high school at Marshalltown, Iowa, and then at Freeport, Illinois, for four years. His teams at Freeport won 72 games and lost only nine.
