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**There IS a Law "Agin It"**

**M**OST encouraging feature of the federal court trial of Harlan countians, charged with fraud in the election of Senator A. B. Chandler in 1942, is found in the court holding that the "big-boys", those who organized the one-gallus war, are to suffer the heaviest penalties. Clarence Poer, former Harlan county Jailor, received the heaviest penalty of two years in prison and a \$5,000 fine as ring-leader; and Clyde Saylor, a former state employee, the next stiffest of two years in prison and a \$100 fine as Poer's lieutenant. The other fifteen, "buck privates" in the war of politics, got off with a year and a day in the federal penitentiary and fines of \$100 each.

But the startling feature of the entire proceeding to those ordinary citizens and voters who have despaired of election crookedness finding its just desserts is the fact that anybody at all was convicted.

These skeptics are the voters and citizens who have seen elections in their home counties dominated by money and by the thievery of election officials, with the law never overtaking any individual offender.

Said Federal Judge H. Church Ford, in imposing sentences:

"Harlan county has arrived at the point where public officers do not feel any responsibility to enforce the law . . . I want it clearly understood by every election officer from Harlan county who comes into this court that the penalties of the law will not be sidestepped . . . There is no difference between election thievery and the theft of an automobile." And so the voters do at last see the law exacting just penalty from violators of a law which intimately concerns the lowliest and the greatest among us.

County and state courts have utterly failed to curb election fraud in local elections. In Floyd county, for instance, a scattered few are indicted from time to time for vote-buying or vote stealing; but—many may be called for prosecution, yet few are chosen to suffer the consequences they richly deserve.

If the Harlan county election fraud case can be followed up over the counties of Kentucky and throughout the nation in every federal election, a clearer expression of the will of the people will result in all elections. Moreover, Senate committees will not be blandly reporting, as they did last week, the expenditure of near fifty millions of dollars in a national election without a trace of law violation.

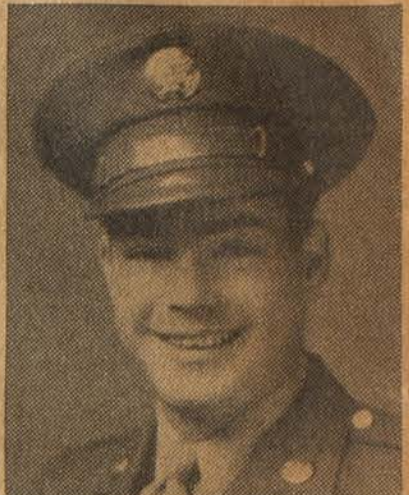

**Recovers from Wounds, Returns to Action**

**HEADQUARTERS 68TH INFANTRY DIVISION (Delayed)**—Sgt. Billy Burga, 22, son of Mrs. Mary Hyden, Prestonsburg, Ky., has been awarded the Purple Heart for wounds received in action against the enemy. Sgt. Burga, who has since returned to duty, is fighting with the American forces in the St. Nazaire and Lorient pockets in France. In addition he has previously been awarded the American Defense, American Theater and Good Conduct Ribbons and the Combat Infantryman's Badge. He enlisted Oct. 12, 1940 at Ft. Thomas, Ky.

**Ten Knott Countians In Same Hospital—But Not Patients**

Probably the greatest concentration of Eastern Kentuckians in any space of comparative size overseas is in 1322nd evacuation hospital, Sixth army group, in France.

In that hospital are 10 Knott countians—and they're not patients, either . . . All are members of the hospital staff. They are:

Pfc. Alvis Fugate, orderly; Cpl. Maston Cornett, utility man, and Pfc. Willie Stone, ward orderly, all of Hindman; Cpl. Carl Pridemore, ward master, Amburgy; Pfc. Milton Hall, basic, Dry Creek; Cpl. Jasper Combs, truck driver, Garner; Pfc. Delmos Reynolds, ward orderly, Pippapas; Pvt. Arley Combs, ward orderly, Red Fox; Pvt. Earl Breeding, ward orderly, Spider.

Lt. Col. George W. McCoy, a 10-year veteran of the army medical corps, hospital commander, said that skilled surgery and the use of blood plasma, whole blood, penicillin and sulfa drugs to prevent infection and build up the condition of the wounded, had produced an extremely low mortality rate for his hospital. Only four out of the first 2,000 patients died.

"I am particularly impressed by the guts of the American soldier," the colonel continued. "A soldier with the hell shot out of him will be brought in from six to 24 hours after he was wounded, and you'll never hear a whimper out of him. He shows a complete confidence that what the surgeon does is right."

WITH U.S. SUPPLY FORCES IN FRANCE—When German planes bombed and strafed behind-the-lines supply depots in support of the recent break-through in Belgium, clerks, typists and truck drivers from headquarters of the Oise section were hastily pressed into service as anti-aircraft crews. Dubbed "Wilsey's Ack-Ack Brigade" by the GIs, the supply troops were organized by Colonel Wilsey, of Washington, D.C., chief of staff in the Oise section, a major communications zone supply base. They were supplied with .50-calibre machine guns and placed on 24-hour duty during the emergency.

Floyd Man Six Times Decorated as Gunner On Flying Fortress

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE STATION, England—Six times decorated for "courage and skill" in aerial combat, Staff Sgt. Bert W. Hall, 25, of Estill, Ky., Eighth air force B-17 Flying Fortress ball gunner, has passed a milestone in his combat career with the completion of more than 30 flights over Europe. During the course of these operations the Floyd county, Ky., gunner has spent more than 150 hours at an altitude in excess of four miles, where a minute without oxygen would result in loss of life. He has flown in temperatures as low as 50 degrees below zero and against targets which were defended by more than 400 heavy flak guns.

THE 129TH GENERAL HOSPITAL, ENGLAND—The target of a German automatic pistolman while helping to hold an American position against an enemy assault in Belgium during the Von Runstedt counter-offensive, Pfc. Bert Elam, 34, of Martin, Ky., is now convalescing at this U.S. army general hospital from wounds of the right arm, shoulder and hip. He has been awarded the Purple Heart. "Pfc. Elam is making a satisfactory recovery and will be able to return to duty after a thorough convalescence," said Capt. Harris S. Wendorf, of Ravenna, Ohio, his ward surgeon. "A Nazi infantryman strafed the ground with his machine pistol as I lay in a firing position," said Pfc. Elam, member of an armored infantry unit. "He got me in several places. I was moved to an aid station for further treatment and was evacuated to England aboard a hospital ship."
