Did the Governor Sound the Tocsin?

F Howard Henderson, The Courier-Journal's political writer, quotes Governor Willis correctly, the Governor is giving a fair imitation of the late Huey Long in this state reformatory matter.

According to Henderson, Governor Willis set his jaw firmly and declared, when told last week that the Legislature proposed the passage of a resolution calling for an investigation by legislators of conditions in the LaGrange and Eddyville reformatories:

"I have guards at the prisons. If necessary I will call out the militia. The legislators will not get in the prisons to investigate anything, I will see to that."

Later, the Governor in a special message to the General Assembly presented the claim that the Legislature cannot during the present special session, while summoned to do only three specific things, legally adopt such resolutions. But before that, he threatened to resort to force to stop a legislative investigation. He wasn't using logic or the force of argument then.

The better part of discretion, unless there was a burning desire to prove the valor of the militia's arms, and unless there indeed is some deep, dark secret within the prison walls of LaGrange and Eddyville, would have been for the Governor to have called legislative leaders of both parties into conference, immediately expressed his willingness for an impartial probe into the unsavory mess and to have named a bi-partisan board of legislators to do a thorough, conscientious investigation.

THE TIMES cannot believe such an offer would have been spurned by either
