COMMITTEE **DENIES FUND** TRUMAN ASKS





tained from the man in control of the hunt. This ammunition will be for 12, 16 and 20-gauge only. This can be obtained on the day of the hunt. No other ammunition will be permitted. Hunters may furnish their own ammunition, but it must be either slugs or 00 buckshot. Each hunter will be permitted to take one deer of any sex or size. Upon killing a deer it must be reported to the employe in charge of your party, who will supply the successful hunter with a legal tag upon payment of \$15. Men with teams will bring your deer out of the field where it can be loaded on a car or truck. There will be no charge to the hunter for this service.

It's not merely a deer hunt to be taged in the Bernheim game pre-erve, beginning the morning of Jan.

The U.S. Biological Survey estimated the area to contain about 1,-500 of these animals, and their numit's to be a war of extermination every deer in the area embracing Bullitt, Spencer, Hardin, Nelson and Meade counties, a Division of Game Fish release indicated this week.

These animals were stocked in trolled areas and directed areas, those counties several years ago by he Bernheim Foundation, subject to the state Game and Fish Commison, and the entire herd consists of propean Red Deer which are not ative to North America. They are large and very destructive to agricultural crops and the state has paid approximately \$15,000 in damages to farmers for their depredations. In short, they are the wrong species in the wrong place and their damage will increase with the increase of the herd, officials said. "It is with regret that we find it necessary to eliminate this fine herd of deer, but it has been determined that any further increase in their numbers will mean disaster to crops within the area,"

start when the shooting was over. On cross examination Miss Hall denied having heard of any previous trouble between Jesse Anderson and

Vaughan Holbrook told of seeing Jesse Anderson running up the hill from the scene of the shooting.

Raymond Anderson, 18, was the only defense witness to testify. He as driver of the wagon explained his failure to reach the top of the hill in the time intervening between his passing of the Holbrook home and the shooting by saying the road was in bad condition and that his team had to rest, often after a pull of only 25 or 30 feet. He said his brother overtook him and Hall after they had passed the Holbrook home and that soon thereafter Holbrook came ollowing them at a half-run Johnny said something I couldn't understand and Jesse asked him what he meant. 'I'll show you what mean,' he quoted Holbrook as saying. Til kill all three of you-

Both Holbrook and Jesse Anderson thrust their hands under their coats, he added, Anderson drawing a revolver and firing. He denied having seen the weapon before or since and on cross-examination admitted he did not see a weapon of any kind in Holbrook's possession. Commonwealth witnesses claimed Holbrook was unarmed.

Commenting on the case before rendering his decision on the motion for bond, Judge Hill said, "I've always felt I have been too strict on the question of bond in these felony cases, but taking the life of a human being is a serious thing . . . According to the proof, Holbrook was unarmed, with no means of protect-ing himself. But this is one of those cases where there were not many witnesses. This may be one of the worst cases in the country . . . but here I do not have proof showing that the killing was without provo-


