As the strike which had paralyzed bituminous coal production in Kentucky. West Virginia and Pennsylvania started into its third week, John L. Lewis, UMWA chieftain, suddenly declared the work-stoppage at end Wednesday.

Miners prepared to resume work Monday. At the same time, operators were believed ready to forego retaliatory measures against striking employes.

Sam Caddy, president of District 30 (Big Sandy-Hazard fields), said at Lexington that his office was notifying all miners to be prepared to resume work Monday.

"I feel assured all the men will be back in the mines Monday," Caddy

said.
The walkouts involved more than 36,000 men in Kentucky and curtailed coal production by an estimated 135,000 tons a day. In some cross stockpiles of coal had reached

mated 135,000 tons a day. In some areas stockpiles of coal had reached extremely low levels.

The overall production loss to date in approximately 200 mines of the state which have been idle during the strike is above 2,000,000 tons. Wages which would have been paid during the production of this much coal, it is estimated, would have totaled around \$4,000,000.



# OUR GOLDEN OPPORTUNITY

The Big Sandy Valley Association is a non-profit organization. In addition to its officers it consists of a group of directors of representative business men located in Tazewell and Buchanan Counties in Virginia, McDowell, Mingo, Mercer, and Wayne Counties in West Virginia, and Boyd, Lawrence, Johnson, Floyd, Martin, and Pike Counties in Kentucky, all of which communities are actively and enthusiastically supporting the association's program, with the exception of those who are railroad dominated.

The objects and purposes of the Big Sandy Valley Association are to promote and encourage the development of industry, commerce, and agriculture in the valley. After much study our association decided the greatest asset to constructive industrial development is economical transportation. This study further convinced us that the most economical transportation is canalization.

Our association is enthusiastically and whole-heartedly supporting the canalization of the Big Sandy River and its two forks. It is universally believed throughout the valley that with cheap river transportation available in the valley as it is available in other valleys in Kentucky, West Virginia, and Pennsylvania, (which the people of Big Sandy Valley helped build) a great era of economic development will unfold based on the abundant high quality and diversity of raw materials known to exist in the valley. The citizenship of the valley is eager for an opportunity to assist in a program to make the natural resources render the highest service in the economic, industrial, and social upbuilding of our valley and the country.

At the Army Engineers hearing in Pikeville in 1940 I presented a paper showing in detail the general economic condition at that time. I wish to review a few of the outstanding facts:

In the six highest relief areas in the United States the Big Sandy Valley was designated as "problem number one" by the Federal Emergency Relief Administration. The number of people on relief was two and one-half times that generally of other areas. In 1939, not taking into consideration the Tug Fork, 13,225 families were receiving relief in way of work or commodities, over 30 pct. of the entire population.

I have made a further study and find from 1936 to 1940, inclusive, the Government spent for "aid" to the people of the twelve counties in the Big Sandy Valley over Sixty Five Million Dollars (65,000,000), the estimated cost of the canalization, and "The Big Sandy coal field, from the standpoint of quality, quantity, and accessibility is the greatest coal field in the world."

Following World War No. 1 we had in Pike County alone forty-four coal mines located on the C. & O. Railroad; in 1939 we had two left—and one of them in "receivership."

Without some form of national plan or orderly development this area will continue to present a serious social problem. This area's importance in the national economy must be recognized and it is the duty of some Government Agency to encourage the development of its resources and industry—Canalization will do both.

It is, and I think you will agree with me, the purpose and function of democratic government—of our own government—to promote "equality" of opportunity and betterment of the conditions of living for our "whole" population. One of our greatest Presidents, a Kentuckian by birth, (Abraham Lincoln), declared of

our United States Government, and I quote, "Its leading object is to elevate the conditions of man; to lift 'artificial' weights from 'all' shoulders: to clear the paths of laudable pursuit for all; to afford all an unfettered start and a fair chance in the race of life." We have learned that poverty is as dangerous as pestilence. Poverty is the negative side of our great American problem. The positive side of the same problem is "work." Unemployment constitutes a case of gradual expulsion from the social order. Idleness is the most difficult occupation to follow: human nature will not accept it. No form of Government can withstand mass unemployment. The fact is, we support each other by consuming the product of each other's labor. If the producers of coal and the producers of food do not exchange their products, then some must freeze and others go hungry. It is because we have reached an advanced stage of development in our capacity for mass production of goods, without having as yet developed any corresponding extensive methods of mass distribution of goods that we did suffer from mass employment, and will do so again unless corrected.

Coal is our principal resource—During War scarcity times people must buy coal where they can get it. When the blood-bought boom is over people will buy their coal from those who can put it at their door at the lowest price, which is largely controlled by the cost of transportation. Any community to function must either supply its own essentials or have something they can exchange for their essentials; otherwise the community has no economic underpinning and must either die or stay on the dole.

Seventy-five percent of the people of the Big Sandy Valley depend for a living directly or indirectly on sale of "coal." Our people are hoping and praying the Board of Engineers (meeting in Williamson, W. Va., next Monday) will recommend canalization for our river, thus insuring low cost river transportation to the consumer markets; thereby insuring that never again will it be necessary to sacrifice the lives of our boys in order to sell our products.

Canalization of our valley will assist during the reconversion period and it will be an economical servant of the people in the building of a sound and constructive trade in time of peace.

DR. O. W. THOMPSON, President Big Sandy Valley Association and dam program for the Big Sandy River and its tributaries, the Levisa and Tug Forks, I am thoroughly familiar with the attitude of most of the leading citizens of the Valley, and up until coercive measures were adopted by the railways, the sentiment has been practically unanimous in favor of the project.

Coal operating companies are particularly dependent on the goodwill of the railway companies in many vital respects, such as car supply, fuel coal contracts, branch lines to new mines and mine sidings. In several cases, it is a matter of common gossip that some of the larger companies secured substantial loans either from or through the good offices of the railway companies during the depression years preceding World War II.

The railways have, therefore, been in position to coerce the Big Sandy-Elkhorn Coal Operators Association into passing a resolution unfavorable to the canalization project.

This is unfortunate and not only contradicts the widespread public approval of the project, but would seem to adversely commit many of those who have here-tofore been enthusiastic proponents of the project.

It is understood that the U. S. District Engineer Office at Huntington has on file the confidential statements of many of the coal operating companies which express their true sentiments, uninfluenced by coercive railway influences. It is believed that these statements are a truer measure of sentiment among the coal people than the Resolutions of the Association heretofore referred to.

Competition is the life of trade—Competition, and not monopoly, has made America "GREAT."

The State Auditor's Office in Charleston, West Virginia, shows that the C. & O. Railroad paid in taxes, in Kanawha County, in 1935 \$188,198.31. Eight years after the river was canalized they paid \$433,055.82. In 1935 the C. & O. hauled 14 million tons of coal from the Kanawha River. Eight years after the river was canalized they hauled more than 19 million tons.

The Kanawha Coal Operators Association's records show that 16 million tons of coal was mined in the Kanawha Valley in 1937. The same records show that in 1943—25 million tons were mined. Can you "Mine" and "Haul" 9 million more tons from Kanawha Valley and "lay off" miners and railroad employees?

The Charleston Industrial District in the Kanawha River used 1 million tons of coal in 1935. Eight years after the river was canalized it used  $4\frac{1}{2}$  million. This means "jobs" for the people!

In the last ten years the Monongahela "River Shipments" have increased 25 million tons. The "Railroad Shipments" on the Monongahela increased 116 million tons. Were the railroads hurt?

We helped to pay for the canalization of the Monongahela, Kanawha, and other rivers. We have the "Resources," let's see that our part of the billions of dollars is spent improving the Big Sandy River.

It will cost Floyd County Taxpayers the same amount of money whether or not our valley is included in the National Program of Development.
