LIQUOR BOARD AROUSES IRE

Of Judge Davidson Who Says Promises On Licenses Broken

The number of licensed whiskey dealers in Floyd county jumped Friday to 36 as the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board at Frankfort issued licenses to six new dealers...

Judge Davidson termed the action of the board "deliberate double-cross." "They had assured me that no liquor license would be issued in Floyd county without my approval...

Continuing in his discussion of the action, Judge Davidson said: "I have nothing against any one of the men who got these licenses. As far as I know, they are all gentlemen. But I do want the people of this county to know that I did not approve one of these licenses."

The official added that, as late as the day preceding issuance of the licenses, he had informed various persons that there would be no more liquor licenses issued in this county.

REED NAMES SELF, OTHERS

In Robinson Flight; From Morgan Jail; Deputy Indicted

With Charlie Reed, of Magoffin county, incriminating himself, and Gobie and Wishard Watson, his neighbors, the grand jury this week returned indictments against the three, charging them with aiding Lonnie Robinson, alleged slayer of two Prestonsburg policemen...

The three, more particularly, according to Reed's statement, aided Robinson in his trip to this county to break out of Morgan county jail.

As late as Wednesday afternoon the \$1,000 bond asked for the release of each of the three had not been executed.

Removal from office by the Governor and prosecution by the courts are possible actions against jailers permitting the escape of prisoners, Attorney General Eldon S. Dummitt wrote Atty. Edward L. Allen, Prestonsburg, this week after the latter had specifically mentioned in a letter to the state official the escape from the Floyd county jail of William Caudill, under life sentence for murder...

Jailer Collins added that he had placed in the First National Bank here \$500 reward for the arrest, or for information leading to the arrest, of Caudill. "I already have spent a lot of money and I've hunted all over this section, everywhere I could hear of a trace of Caudill," he added.

The Rev. Jesse Kilgore, Cannel City minister, is under \$2,000 bond, accused of leaving the Morgan county jail door unlocked and thus permitting Robinson to escape. Jailer Smith, of Morgan county, last week posted \$300 reward for Robinson's capture, or for information leading to his arrest, and the same amount was raised here this week.

Deputy Jailer Chester Potter said here this week he had permitted Caudill to sit down in the dining room of the jail for a cup of coffee on the evening of the escape. He said the prisoner ran out the back door while he went upstairs to investigate a disturbance caused by another prisoner.

R. C. THOMAS HEART VICTIM

North-East Manager, Big Sandy Field Vet, Dies at Paintsville

A few weeks after Auxier, the Floyd mining town he helped to establish 36 years ago ceased to exist as a coal production center, Richard C. Thomas, 69 years old, general manager of the North-East Coal company, died of a heart attack Monday at his home in Paintsville.

Mr. Thomas had been slightly ill for several days but had been able to walk about Paintsville on the day preceding the sudden seizure. His wife died seven weeks ago.

A native of Wellston, Ohio, he came to Paintsville in 1906 as a bookkeeper for the North-East Coal Company, later being advanced to the post of superintendent and subsequently to that of general superintendent of all the company's operations.

One sister, Mrs. Amanda Stanley, of Bonanza, and 65 grandchildren also survive.

Former Resident Here Is Victim in Texas Of Tuberculosis

W. H. (Bill Buck) Howard, for years a resident of Prestonsburg and well known in this county as a restaurateur, died Friday night at his home in Fabens, Texas, of tuberculosis from which he had long suffered.

Mr. Howard, who formerly operated restaurants here and at Martin, left this county 14 years ago, seeking health in the west. He had resided in Fabens for a number of years.

A native of Meta, Pike county, Mr. Howard was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Jim Howard. He had many friends and relatives in both Floyd and Pike counties. Surviving are his widow, one son, Chester A. Howard, and two daughters, Mrs. Beatrice Allen and Mrs. Myrtle Josephine Sanders, all of Fabens, Texas. One brother, J. H. Howard, Prestonsburg, also survives.

The body was returned here Tuesday morning and funeral rites were conducted from the Presbyterian Church Wednesday afternoon, the Rev. M. Robert Reagan officiating. Funeral and burial, directed by the Arnold Funeral Home, was under auspices of Prestonsburg lodge, Independent Order of Odd Fellows, of which Mr. Howard had been a member for years. Burial was made in the Mayo cemetery near here.

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COURT TALKS RURAL ROADS

Engineer to 'Locate' Several Routes; Beer And Whiskey Fees Up

Preliminary moves in a road-building program expected to be made possible as the result of increased rural highway funds contributed by the State Highway Department were made here Tuesday with the fiscal court directing the County Judge and County Attorney to employ an engineer to "locate" roads on Prater Creek, Frazier's Creek, Wilson, Spurlock, Corn Fork of Brandy Keg Creek, Caney Creek and Goose Creek.

The court's negotiations with the rural highway department have not reached the definite commitment stage on road work but a conference expected to be held within the next few days will probably result in a full-fledged program.

At Tuesday's meeting the court voted appropriations continuing the work of the Floyd county health department, the county agent and home demonstration agent. The appropriations remain as last year's—\$3,000 for the health department, \$1,050 for travel expenses of County Agent S. L. Isbell with \$1,100 for clerical assistance and \$600 for Home Demonstration Agent Requa Kincaid.

Meanwhile, the court boosted whiskey and beer licenses. The county whiskey store license was raised from last year's \$100 to \$200 and the beer license was upped from \$2 a month to \$50 a year. License fees paid corporate towns by such businesses are deductible from the county fee.

These increases resulted in a tie vote in the court, with County Judge Davidson casting the vote in favor of the license boosts. Magistrates Henry Stumbo and John May, contending the raises place a burden on liquor and beer dealers outside incorporated towns, cast dissenting votes.

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LEGION PLANS MEMORIAL

For Floyd War Dead; To Launch Campaign For Funds, May 25

Officials of Floyd Post No. 129, American Legion, this week described plans for a permanent war memorial to be placed in the courthouse grounds here and announced that a drive will soon be launched to raise funds for that purpose.

Legion leaders conferred at a call meeting of the Post Tuesday with an architect representing the Muldoon Memorial Company, Louisville, and later met informally with members of the fiscal court. The company will submit to the Post Sunday varied designs and specifications for a memorial.

One design, now favored, is a memorial in the form of a fountain, with a tablet bearing the names of Floyd countians who gave their lives in service in the Spanish-American War and World Wars I and II. Location of such a memorial would be squarely in front of the courthouse, with the sidewalk widened to accommodate court visitors. Members of the fiscal court assured the Post of their co-operation.

The drive for funds will probably start with the Post's annual picnic, Dr. Earl T. Arndt, president, said.

FOUR JAILED ON CHARGES OF MURDER

Mrs. Homer Parsons, 21, Slain, Husband Wounded, Comptons, Collins Named

An April Fool's Day joke carried on into the following day resulted in the slaying by pistol fire Tuesday night near Betsy Layne of Mrs. Sylvia Helen Parsons, 21-year-old wife of Homer Parsons, 42, service station operator, and the wounding of the husband.

Arrested later in the night and jailed here on murder charges in connection with the shooting were Charlie, Basil and Columbus Compton and their brother-in-law, Dan Collins.

Mrs. Parsons died instantly with a bullet through her head. Her husband was shot in his side, the bullet ranging downward, and it was said Wednesday morning at the Prestonsburg General Hospital, where he underwent an operation, that he will recover.

At the hospital Parsons told County Attorney W. W. Burchett that the trouble started from the use of a dummy with which some children had been frightening motorists. As Basil Compton approached with his brother-in-law, Collins, as a passenger, the dummy resembling a human figure appeared in the highway and Compton swerved his car to avoid striking it. While the children were laughing about the incident, Parsons said, Compton and Collins became angry and one of them struck D. M. Parsons, son of the wounded man. The younger Parsons retaliated in kind and Compton left, leaving Collins behind.

Later, he said, the Compton brothers returned and began firing, entering the building. He said some of those shooting had two revolvers. "The husband and wife fell in the floor, in the narrow confines of the service station office. Parsons said the others returned to begin shooting while he and his wife were dressing Collins' head, which had been injured in the first encounter.

Archie Parsons, 19, son of the wounded man, said the men fired several shots at him, that he took refuge behind a refrigerator and fled when there was a lull in the shooting as the men reloaded their guns.

Sheriff Troy B. Sturgill said he saw "six or more" bullet holes in the walls of the room when he and several deputies and members of the State Highway Patrol reached the scene after 10 o'clock Tuesday night, approximately an hour after the shooting. Mrs. Parsons' body still lay where it fell. Others said there "must have been 25 shots fired."

Sheriff Sturgill said Columbus Compton, Betsy Layne teacher, told him that when he and his brothers went to Parsons' place to get their brother-in-law, Parsons emerged from the building with a revolver in either hand. He added that Parsons fired one shot at Dan Collins where he lay on the highway, hurt in the first encounter, and another at Basil Compton. Thereupon, he was quoted as saying, Charlie Compton began shooting. Columbus Compton said he took no part in the shooting.

Basil Compton told THE TIMES Wednesday morning that he and his brother Charlie almost wrecked their cars when the dummy appeared on the highway. He admitted that he and Dan Collins left their car, adding that "they beat us up."

"I left Dan in the road and went up to Columbus' home and then we went back to get Dan. A man started hitting me. I don't know who he was. I had Dan and was trying to get away when this man fired three shots. I don't know anything about who fired at them. I had no gun and Dan didn't have any."

He claimed that he had left his brothers, Charlie and Columbus, in his car but that neither was there when he returned. Compton claimed he was afraid to drive back past Parsons' place and that he took Collins on to Wheelwright to a doctor and I had Dan and was trying to get away when this man fired three shots. I don't know anything about who fired at them. I had no gun and Dan didn't have any."

Collins was severely beaten, officers said, and Basil Compton had suffered a minor cut on the top of his head.

During the few hours between the time of the shooting and the arrest of the four men, a large number of Floyd county officers with the assistance of highway patrolmen searched for them.

A grand jury investigation of the shooting will be made this week. Body of Mrs. Parsons was brought to the Arnold Funeral Home here. She was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Lewis, Jr., and Miss Ruth Lewis, both of Betsy Layne.

Funeral arrangements had not been completed Wednesday.

## ORDINANCE

An ordinance correcting certain passages of an ordinance dated March 4, 1946 "providing for the construction of a school building and gymnasium for the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky; declaring said construction to be a necessity; providing for the issuance of School Improvement and Refunding Revenue Bonds in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 162 and Section 162.150 K.R.S. to pay for the cost of said construction, providing and determining the duty of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, in connection with the operation of said school building and gymnasium and the creation of a fund to pay the interest on and the principal of said bonds as and when they mature and authorizing the execution of a lease on such school buildings and gymnasium to the Prestonsburg Independent School District, Board of Education, Prestonsburg, Kentucky; and ratifying and approving all steps taken to date in connection with the construction of said school building and the issuance of said bonds.

WHEREAS, the Prestonsburg City Council by ordinance duly enacted on March 4, 1946, provided for the construction of a school building and the issuance of bonds, etc., as more fully set out hereinabove; and

WHEREAS, an error was made in the schedule of maturities of said bonds and in the amounts necessary to be paid into the bond and interest redemption fund; and

WHEREAS, the City has proceeded with the issuance of said bonds according to the corrected schedule of maturities;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Prestonsburg City Council, Prestonsburg, Kentucky, as follows:

1. That portion of the first literary paragraph of said ordinance relating to the schedule of maturities of said bonds is amended to read as follows: "maturing yearly on April 1st of each year as follows: \$2,000 in each of the years 1947 to 1960 inclusive; \$3,000 in each of the years 1961 to 1963 inclusive; \$4,000 in each of the years 1964 to 1975 inclusive."
2. The schedule of payments to be made into the City of Prestonsburg School Building Bond and Interest Redemption Fund is hereby amended by striking off the payments provided for in the years 1976 and 1977.
3. All acts heretofore performed by the City in connection with the issuance and sale of the bonds provided for by said ordinance of March 4, 1946, are hereby ratified and approved.
4. This ordinance shall take effect and be enforced at the earliest date provided by law on and after its publication.

Three prizes totaling \$400 will be given winners of the fifth Tom Wallace Forestry Award which is now open to farmer-foresters in Kentucky and southern Indiana, Barry Bingham, president of The Courier-Journal, The Louisville Times and Radio Station WHAS, announced recently. Named in honor of the editor of The Louisville Times, one of the nation's well-known conservationists, the contest, sponsored by the two papers and the radio station, sets its sights at stimulating constructive forestry practices. The contest closed midnight of November 1, 1946.

A grand prize of \$200 will be given for the best report on a complete forestry program which includes the best work performance in protection, management and utilization of established wood areas, and for planting and protection during the year of at least two acres of forest seedlings. Two \$100 prizes will be given for reports showing (1) the best work performance in protection, management and utilization of established wood areas where no planting has been carried out; and (2) for the best work performance in establishing a forest or plantation area of two acres or more in extent.

The report is to cover the period between Jan. 1, 1946 and Dec. 31, 1946, with the period between November 1 and the year's end to be estimated. ### MISS GIFFORD CLUB SPEAKER

Garrett, Ky. April 1 (Spl.)—"It is essential that we stop to think what World War III would cost us," warned Miss Chloe Gifford, chairman of the Bureau of Information, University of Kentucky, and second vice-president, Kentucky Federation of Women's Clubs, in an address at the Wayland high school auditorium Friday night.

"We must not only proclaim ideals," continued Miss Gifford, "but we must also do our part to carry out the dirty work of fulfilling them. We failed after the last war because we did not endorse the League. Call it what you may, the idea of World Union is definitely not a new one. Now we have another chance and this time we must win the peace. Political co-operation, the making and maintenance of peace is the responsibility of the individual and not of the government alone. The United States can put the world back on its feet. We cannot shirk responsibility a second time. Peace is not to be picked up on a bargain counter. The price is high, but unless we are prepared to pay it, all our sacrifices of World War II will have been in vain."

Miss Gifford, speaking under auspices of the Lackey-Garrett Woman's Club, urged the continuation of price controls, high production rates, amalgamation of the problems of capital and labor, and higher expenditures for education. In speaking of Kentucky's ranking with other states educationally, Miss Gifford said, "When education was mentioned, we in Kentucky used to thank God for Mississippi; but Mississippi has risen above us and now we can only thank God for Arkansas."

As a preliminary to Miss Gifford's speech, the Wayland and Garrett high school bands, under direction of Jesse Elliott, presented several numbers. The Flag Salute and the Lord's Prayer were then led by members of the Girl Scouts, who served as ushers. An address of welcome was delivered by Boone Hall, principal of Wayland high school. Mr. Hall praised the work of Women's Clubs, especially in connection with education. Miss Gifford was introduced by Mrs. Thomas Hatcher, president of the Lackey-Garrett Woman's Club.

WAC stenographers, clerk typists, general clerks, telephone switchboard operators, and teletype-writer operators comprise the specialists needed in the European theater at present. The Military Occupation Specialty members for these classifications appear in the table below. Only Wacs with these MOS numbers will be eligible for overseas duty due to the current critical shortage of such specialists:

No. 213—stenographers; No. 405—clerk-typists; No. 055—clerks, general; No. 650—telephone switchboard operators; No. 237—teletype-writer operators.

In addition to the 600 earmarked for Europe, there is an urgent need for skilled Wacs in personnel centers, hospitals and headquarters installations in this country. Hospital, x-ray and laboratory technicians, code, and cryptography and other communications technicians are especially in demand, as well as clerk-typists and stenographers. Former enlisted women may re-enter the WAC for these duties, at which time they will be given the grade which they held at the time of their discharge. No closing date has yet been announced for such applications, but it is expected to be determined shortly.

## 600 of WAC Offered Service in Europe

Overseas service is now being offered to enlisted personnel of the Women's Army Corps, the War Department announced last Thursday. Openings are available in the European theater for 600 women in five specialist categories. This applies equally to Wacs who re-enter the service, who will be given the grade which they held at the time of discharge, and to those still in uniform who volunteer to remain beyond their scheduled time of discharge. All applications for re-entry must be filed in local U.S. army recruiting stations by midnight April 30.

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## Miss Francis To Return Soon To City Where She Was Prisoner

(Donie Carmack's Washington feature in The Courier-Journal recently led off with the following, relating to Lyda Mae Francis, daughter of the late H. C. Francis and Mrs. Francis, of Prestonsburg, Miss Carmack's reference to Miss Francis' departure from China does not include the fact that she left that country in an exchange of prisoners between the United States and Japan. She was held in a Shanghai hotel along with other Allied nationals for six months before leaving China.—Editor.)

Sun-tanned from Brazilian skies, Good Neighbor Lyda Mae Francis is just back from two and a half years in the United States Embassy in Rio de Janeiro and shortly will leave the State Department here for the Orient where she will be secretary to the Consul General at Shanghai, Monnet B. Davis, who at present is Minister to Denmark.

When Admiral H. H. Good and his wife gave a cocktail party for Lyda Mae, who knew them in Shanghai before the war, she was introducing Representative Andrew J. May (she used to report his court cases back in Kentucky) as a fellow-Kentuckian from her old home-town

—Prestonsburg. "Just a minute," put in the Congressman, "is it my home town or is it yours?" Diplomatically, Lyda Mae replied, "It must be yours. You got there first."

Lyda Mae and Lela Mae Stiles, those rebel twins from Kentucky who first met up in New York where they worked in adjoining offices, are next-door office neighbors on Pennsylvania Avenue. Lela handles President Truman's mail, as she did for President Roosevelt. Lyda Mae started her foreign service in China in 1935 and got out of Shanghai on the first diplomatic ship after the war started. But when the ship reached East Africa she was transferred to Turkey and worked at the embassy in Ankara.

On her return trip to the U. S. from Rio, she didn't miss the boat although she had to wait for it—a Swedish cargo vessel. She had a spot in the sun meanwhile on the beach at Santos, Lyda Mae, last week in a stunning brown serge dress she got in Rio (it seems the quality of wool is not strained down there), said she would leave here in March to spend a month with her mother, Mrs. Malissa Francis, in Prestonsburg, before taking off for China.

The county tax levy was set at 50c per \$100 worth of taxable property, plus 20 cents per \$100 for the bond fund and a poll tax of \$1.50. The levy on crude oil was set at 1 pct. of the market value of oil produced in the county. A 20-cent levy also was made on each \$100 of bank stock.

For the Prestonsburg grade school district the levy was set at \$1.50 per \$100, with a poll tax of \$2 and 40c per \$100 of bank shares.

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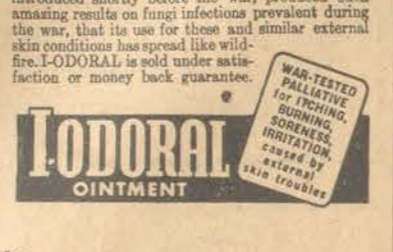
