Survey To Determine Number of Parking Meters Necessary

The City Council Wednesday night in a special meeting voted the pur-chase of parking meters for Pres-

The meters, purchased from the R. H. Rhodes Company, Hartford, Conn., manufacturers of the "Mark Time" meter, will be delivered within 30 days after a survey is made to determine the number needed. Meanwhile, the order stood at "100, more or less."

Frank H. Layne who, with two other members of the Council, C. H. Smith and Herbert Salisbury, investigated the various types of meters in use, said the "Mark Time" meters cost \$58 each, installed, as compared with a cost of \$80 for the next cheapest meter on the market, adding that the committee's investigation also revealed that it is the most satisfactory. The purchase is made without cash outlay to the city, inasmuch as the manufacturer collects half the "take" of the me-ters till the purchase price is paid. It is estimated that the meters will thus pay for themselves within thus pay for the eight to 18 months.





These outlays will mean additional income to practically every local business and will finance additional wiring, bathroom improve-ments and new electrical equip-ment for the county's 4,765 farm and rural homes already served with electricity, according to a study re-leased by the Tile Council of Amer-

Introduction of running water, installation of tiled bathrooms and replacement of outmoded plumbing fixtures head the list of the most wanted farm home features, D. P. Forst, chairman of the Council's Residential Construction Committee, revealed. One in five families thruout the nation plan bathroom improvements, he said.

Additional wiring is needed in practically every farm home with electricity, according to the study. A huge market likewise exists for milking machines, quick freezing units, electric motors, baby chick brooders and other equipment. and other equipment.



#### Crop, Feed Loans Offered Farmers By Farm Credit

Van H. Reneau, field supervisor of the emergency crop and feed loan division of the Farm Credit Adminle farmers who are unable to secure redit from banks, PCA, or other cal lending agencies on reasonable erms and sufficient to meet their roduction needs.

Crop loans may be made for the ctual production costs of such crops corn, soybeans, oats, cotton, hay, ruits, potatoes, tomatoes, beans, and other truck crops grown for market. The money may be used for such production costs as seed, feed, ertilizer, fuel or oil for tractors, pray material, minor repairs, and planting and harvesting expenses.

anting and harvesting expenses. Feed loans are made for the pur-nase of such feeds as are usually chase of such feeds as are usually fed to commercial stock, such as hogs, beef cattle, breeding stock or livestock, the product of which will be sold, such as dairy cattle, sheep being maintained for the sale of wool or lambs, or for the production of feeds such as hay, oats, corn, ensilage, or other popular feed crops.

Poultry loans may be secured by armers who have facilities, such as louses, brooder stoves, watering and leeding equipment sufficient to care for the poultry. The money may be used for the purchase of feed, medcare and incidental supplies, for ling young chicks or turkeys be-grown for the market, or the chase of feed and incidental supfor a flock kept for the produc

on of eggs. Security for loans is a first mort age on all crops to be grown or took and poultry to be fed. Crop, feed, or poultry loans be-

come due and payable upon the sale of the crops, livestock, poultry or eggs, or upon Oct. 31, 1946, whichever comes first. Interest rate on all loans is 4 pct. and is deducted in advance to Oct. 31, 1946.
