### Davidson To Appeal To Franklin Court On Liquor Permits

Appeals of five Floyd county whiskey dealers to the state Alcoholic Beverage Control Board being successful and resulting in licenses being issued to them despite refusal of county Judge Alex L. Davidson to approve their applications. Judge Davidson himself may do some appealing, he indicated this week.

### Appellees Granted Retail Liquor Licenses Over a Written Protest of the County Judge

Commenting on action of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board, Judge Davidson said the board assured him in a meeting at Frankfort, early in his administration, that it would co-operate with him and that his judgment in the matter of issuing licenses would be respected.

After state licenses were issued the five dealers, Judge Davidson instructed County Clerk Jarvis Allen not to issue county licenses to them, pointing out that the law required the approval of licenses by the County Judge as the County Alcoholic Administrator. County Clerk Allen last week went to Frankfort to request a ruling by Attorney General Eldon S. Dummit, who held that the state board action was his authority for issuance of county licenses.

Re-iterating his statement that his refusal of approval of licenses was an impersonal matter and that his action was based solely on his opinion of what is best for the people of the county, Judge Davidson bitterly criticized the alcoholic board. "I was required to execute a surety bond as Alcoholic Administrator for the county," he said. "But I have never been able to learn what my powers are, if I have any. Anybody on this board certainly isn't in any danger through any action of mine, because it seems I can't do anything," he added.

The state board last Wednesday also issued a retail whiskey license to Byron Nunery, whose store will be Prestonsburg's sixth. Mr. Nunery is erecting a building on Court street, near the traffic light.

### PROFITEERING STORY 'HOOEY'

Says Congressman May, Adding He Acted To Aid Production of Supplies

His name linked with a wartime munitions combine now under investigation as having profited from its war production efforts. Congressman A. J. May, chairman of the House Military Affairs Committee, was quoted Wednesday as ascribing the attempt to link him with the companies as "a lot of hooey."

This source quoted Mr. May as saying that what he did "was only a matter of expediting the war effort" and that "every Congressman did the same thing."

The Prestonsburg man's name was mentioned during a Senate probe of the Batavia and Erie Basin Metal Products Corporations and it was claimed that the combine procured a contract as a result of Congressman May's appeal in their behalf to Secretary of War Patterson who at that time was undersecretary.

### Capt. Beverly Named Campbell Adjutant

Camp Campbell, Ky., July 1 (Spl.)—Capt. Kermit C. Beverly, Garrett, Ky., has been appointed camp adjutant at Camp Campbell, to succeed Maj. Frederick C. Pacher, Columbus, O., who was transferred to the regional hospital at Fort Knox.

Capt. Beverly, a graduate of Berea College, served for four years in the army airways communications system in Manitoba, Canada. He was commissioned in the reserve in 1931 and entered active service in July, 1942. Prior to serving in the army Capt. Beverly was employed as a salesman with the Oil Well Supply Company, Charleston, W. Va.

Mrs. Beverly and their sons, Robert, William, and Kermit C. Beverly, Jr., reside at Garrett.

### PREDICTS FREE X-RAY SERVICE

Machine for Year-Round Service Arrives Here, To Be Installed Soon

Free x-ray service to Floyd countians will, within the next few weeks, be given the year round. Dr. Marvin Ransdell, director of the Floyd County Health Department, announced Wednesday upon arrival here of the \$2,000 x-ray purchased by the Floyd County Tuberculosis Association.

Dr. Ransdell, who will operate the x-ray, said this free service will be initiated as soon as the new courthouse wing is completed and the x-ray machine installed in this part of the building. Only plastering remains to be done on the wing.

A federal appropriation of \$10,000,000 makes free x-ray service possible, Dr. Ransdell said, since film will be available without cost. The Association hopes later to receive federal aid sufficient to employ a full-time tuberculosis worker in this county, it was said.

The x-ray machine was purchased with money raised in Floyd county Christmas Seal sale drives. A representative of the manufacturer said the Association saved between \$600 and \$700 by ordering six months ago.

Second trial of Charlie Compton, 41-year-old Floyd county man, one of four accused of the slaying at Betsy Layne April 2 of Mrs. Sylvia Helen Parsons, will be held in the Pike circuit court at the September term, it was announced this week.

First trial of Compton ended here, a few weeks after the shooting of Mrs. Parsons, in a jury disagreement and the Commonwealth immediately sought a change of venue.

Compton was indicted jointly with his brothers, Basil and Columbus, and a brother-in-law, Dan Collins. Mrs. Parsons was slain in a shooting in which her husband, Homer, 44, was wounded.

Compton claimed self-defense in the shooting which stemmed from a belated April Fool's Day prank.

### 141 from This County Listed As Losing Lives During War

To the 117 Floyd countians officially listed last week by Selective Service headquarters as having lost their lives in service during World War II, the American Red Cross chapter this week added 24 others listed on its records as having died in wartime service.

It was emphasized, upon release of names of these who were lost in service from all causes, that records here still may lack names of some Floyd countians who were killed, fatally wounded or died in wartime service. Relatives of these were requested to write either Selective Service Board No. 44 or Floyd Chapter, American Red Cross, here and thus help form an authentic record.

In the state Jefferson county had the highest number of servicemen deaths with 896 and little Robertson county was low with six.

### OPA Dies--One Less Thing For American People To Cuss

The American people Monday morning had one less thing to cuss about—OPA was dead.

The death wound had been dealt OPA by Congress; the merciful coup-de-grace, by the President.

As quietly as price controls lifted, as quietly did the people resume the ways of "free competition" before the country went to war. As quietly a minority went about the business of boosting prices and cashing in on materials purchased under price control.

Meanwhile, the country waited the full effect of the new freedom which will not be apparent in one week or two, not perhaps for one month or two or three.

First reports said rents were being unmercifully hiked over the nation. In many cases this was true; in as many, it was not. Locally, there were a few who realized heavy profits with the ceiling off, but on the whole there was no sudden upsurge. Corn meal, one of the section's scarcest commodities, literally "took off," however; it jumped from last week's wholesale price of around \$1.65 per bushel to \$2.35 or thereabouts this week.

Cattle and hog prices went soaring with both. Beef and pork supplies within the next two weeks are expected as a consequence to be plentiful—at what prices, is not yet known. Poultry took a three-cent jump.

In this county, as elsewhere, there were those who pledged themselves to help "hold the line" by refusing to raise prices on their present stocks of goods and never to ask higher prices unless higher prices are asked of them when they replenish their inventories.

### MARTIN MINE HEADS FIELD

1945 Safety Award Goes to Utilities, Is Announcement

The Utilities Elkhorn Coal Company mine at Martin achieved the best safety record for 1945 in the large mine group of the Big Sandy-Elkhorn Coal Mining Institute, A. D. Sisk, Pikeville, Institute secretary, announced Monday.

Caudill Ward Coal Company's Heller mine was honored for maintaining the best record among smaller mines. Sisk said the pit has operated two and one-half years without lost-time accidents.

An award went to the Consolidation Coal Company 204-207 for having produced 1,674,842 tons of coal from Dec. 29, 1944 to Jan. 28, 1946, without a fatal accident.

Awards yet to be made include one to the Inland Steel Company and one to the Koppers Coal Company. The Inland firm produced more than 2,000,000 tons of coal without accident Koppers turned out more than 1,000,000 tons without injury to workers.

### William G. Burchett Passes at Hospital Here in 88th Year

William G. Burchett, 87 years old, well-known Lancer man, died Friday at the Prestonsburg General hospital, following a hernia operation.

A son of Ed and Millie Branham Burchett, he was a native of Sugar Loaf Creek. He was married, 62 years ago, to Miss Julia Hubbard, and to this union were born 14 children. Mr. Burchett had been a member of the Free Will Baptist Church for years and was known and revered by hundreds of Floyd countians.

Surviving are his widow and the following children: Banner and Willard Burchett, Mrs. Joe Crum, Mrs. Frank Blackburn, Mrs. Dave Hubbard and Mrs. Wade Blackburn, all of Prestonsburg; Mrs. Jasper Wallen, of Jenkins. He also leaves 41 grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren.

Funeral rites were conducted from the residence Sunday, the Rev. Isaac Stratton officiating. Burial in the family cemetery was directed by the Arnold Funeral Home.

### HALL TO QUIT SCHOOL POST ON JULY 15

Cousin To Succeed Him; New Tax Levy Of \$1.50 Approved

Town Hall announced Wednesday morning that he had resigned on the preceding day as Superintendent of Floyd County Schools, effective July 15, after almost 10 years as head of the county school system and that his cousin, Palmer L. Hall, had been named by the Floyd County Board of Education to succeed him.

Except for the wartime period when his wife, Mrs. Hollie B. Hall, was Superintendent while he was in the navy, Mr. Hall has held the office since Sept. 9, 1936. Formal explanation of his reason for resigning is given in a statement published elsewhere in this edition of THE TIMES. He said that for the present he will be in the real estate business.

The new superintendent, who has been assistant superintendent for several months, after receiving his army discharge, has been connected with the school system for several years.

At Tuesday's meeting of the Board of Education Boone Hall, former Wayland consolidated school principal, and a brother of Town Hall, was chosen assistant superintendent at a salary of \$3,600 a year. Henry Martin, of Eastern former navy lieutenant, was named second assistant at a salary of \$3,600 a year.

Leonard Martin, who has been associated with the County Superintendent's office throughout Mr. Hall's administration, recently resigned to enter private business here. Paris Conley and Adrian Hall were named attendance officers Tuesday at monthly salaries of \$200 each.

Preparing for increased cost of teacher pay increases and operation of all schools in the county for nine-month terms, the board of education budget, as submitted to the fiscal court this week, called for a levy of \$1.50 per \$100 on all taxable property in the county for general school purposes. The levy, twice that of last year, was approved by the court.

Superintendent Hall explained that the new law eliminates consolidated school tax and that the new levy made in this county provides a unified tax, with all schools to receive the same advantages. He estimated that the increased levy will result in \$60,000 higher revenue for general school purposes.

The fund set up for teacher pay totals \$515,000—\$100,000 more than that of last year. The budget for 1946-47 provides for total expenditures of \$687,000, including \$249,576 for new grounds and buildings (this includes \$110,000 and \$27,000 invested in U.S. bonds) and \$2,000 for general control.

Of the \$515,000 earmarked for teacher-pay, state and federal funds will supply all save \$118,000, it was estimated.

At Tuesday's meeting of the board of education, the last \$2,000 of Wheelwright's old school indebtedness and the \$1,000 debt on Martin's old school were paid, leaving the board's total debt at \$24,000.

### BUS STRIKE END HINTED

### Company and Union Representatives In Conference

A day-long conference Wednesday between representatives of the bus companies and their striking employees gave rise to the belief here that settlement of the labor dispute which has paralyzed public motor transportation in this section since April 15 may be nearing a settlement.

Neither company nor union representatives was contacted by THE TIMES, but it was reported here that a gap of "only a few cents" remained between them.

Meanwhile, Police Judge J. D. Harkins, Jr., of Prestonsburg, had not handed down a ruling on the peace bonds sought by John J. (Jack) Ryan, Transport Workers Union field representative, for McKinley Sparks, member of the Sparks Brothers firm, and his brother-in-law, John P. Wells, as a result of an altercation here July 18.

THE TIMES in last week's news-story telling of the hearing held by Judge Harkins on the peace warrants incorrectly stated that City Attorney W. S. Harkins represented "the union cause" at the hearing. Mr. Harkins prosecuted the case in behalf of the City of Prestonsburg and the Commonwealth.

### Late Congressman's Sister Dies June 27 Of A Heart Ailment

Mrs. Geneva Mae Stanley, 68 years old, of Betsy Layne, and widow of Judge Robert E. Stanley, died last Thursday at the Methodist hospital, Pikeville, of a heart disease from which she had suffered for the past three years.

She was a daughter of Joseph R. and Susan Chick Langley and a sister of the late John W. Langley, Congressman from this district for many years. Mrs. Stanley was a member of the Baptist Church for 50 years.

She is survived by two sons, Eugene Stanley, of Pikeville, and John Stanley, of Tram; a step-son, Joe E. Stanley, Prestonsburg; three daughters, Mrs. Ruth G. Roberts, of Paintsville, Mrs. Edith D. Caldwell, of Man, W. Va., Mrs. Sylvia Helen Stevens, of Tram, and two step-daughters, Mrs. Nora S. Allen, of Catlettsburg, and Mrs. Ella S. Layne, of Betsy Layne; also by four brothers, James Langley, of Greenup; Joseph Langley, of Ashland; Ernest Langley, of New York City; and three sisters, Mrs. Belle Flanary, of Washington, D.
