## LOCKS, DAMS LOSE BY VOTE

Opposed by Virginia, West Virginia Men

The bitterly contested Big Sandy canalization project, previously approved by the board of army engineers and by the House rivers and harbors committee, Tuesday became a lost cause as the House voted to remove it from the huge rivers and harbors improvement bill.

With West Virginia and Virginia representatives opposing the \$82,-300,000 program for the Big Sandy and its two tributaries, the House voted, 88 to 52, to remove the project from the over-all rivers and harbors legislation.

They were met in vigorous debate

They were met in vigorous debate by Congressman A. J. May, Pres-tonsburg, who was the legislative sponsor of the Big Sandy improvement program.

Rep. Dondero, Michigan Republican, offered the amendment to remove the Big Sandy canalization from the bill.

Urging approval of the project, Mr. May asserted, "This is a fight between two railroads (the Norfolk & Western and the Chesapeake & Ohio) and the masses of the people (in the Big Sandy valley). I don't think the House wants to take a stand against the masses of the people," he added.

The \$750,000 estimated expenditure in drilling these wells is to be spent in Floyd, Pike, Knott and a few oth r counties of this area.

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

I am in receipt, as of May 3, of the following instructions from the Department of Revenue:

Old licenses will not be renewed; new licenses bearing new numbers

will be issued.

All applicants for 1946-47 motor vehicle operator's license will be required to appear in person and make original application for his or her license.

cense.

All applicants who are absent from the county may apply and receive application forms which must be completed before a notary public or other person authorized to administer oath.

The department will not approve any application which has not been executed before either a circuit clerk or a person authorized to administer.

executed before either a circuit clerk or a person authorized to administer oath and which does not contain the signature of the applicant. All licenses issued contrary to this procedure will be cancelled.
