OFFICIALS SAY ROAD STATUS IS PUZZLING

Left Beaver Highways Not Let to Contract; County Plans Bridges

County officials this week expressed absolute ignorance of what the State Highway Commission will do toward improvement of Floyd roads this year.

Their quandary began with rejection, a month ago, of bids on the Melvin-Weeksby surfacing project. Then, when advertisements for letting May 31 of three sectors of the Left Beaver road from the junction near Martin to the head of Abner Fork for re-surfacing failed of visible results, their mystification was doubled.

"We know the Melvin-Weeksby road has not been re-advertised but what has been done about the other part of the Left Beaver road is not known," an official said this week.

The state has accepted the contract approved by the fiscal court for rural road work but no action has resulted. Deeds for procuring of right-of-way for improvement of the Prestonsburg-David road were promised but these have not been received, County Attorney W. W. Burchett recently wrote the Department of Highways.

Impatient, with more work than half the year gone and no new work undertaken in the county, the fiscal court plans to begin construction of the Caney and Jack's Creek bridges on its own initiative, County Judge A. L. Davidson said Tuesday. "We have asked the North-East Coal Company's price on an old bridge across Johns Creek, to see if it can be bought and moved at less expense than if we bought materials elsewhere," he explained.

In his letter to the Highway Department, Mr. Burchett pointed out that improvement of the Prestonsburg-Salyersville route has been promised and that the state also has promised to revise its plans so as to ask federal aid on the Harold-Hi Hat and Northern-David roads.

The same letter commented on Governor Willis' desire to improve recreational facilities in the state and thus attract tourists in greater numbers, and asked that the state, in keeping with this policy, maintain the road from Prestonsburg via Auxler to the Dewey dam and the Cow Creek and Brandy Keg roads which would link the Johns Creek reservoir with U.S. 23.

Allen Petitioners Ask Highway Commission To Inspect Bridge

The State Highway Commission has been petitioned by the Board of Trustees of Allen to make an inspection of the bridge joining the older part of Allen to the rapidly expanding section on the east bank of the Big Sandy river.

Evidence of scarred railings and the fact that one fatal accident has already occurred on the bridge testify to the necessity of a walkway for the safety of pedestrians, the petition states. A large number of adults and children are compelled to cross this bridge in order to attend church, Sunday School and the Allen consolidated school. The petition points out that on stock market days this thoroughfare is especially crowded when many farmers must cross the bridge in order to reach the market on the east side of the river.

The petitioners asked that the highway commission construct, on the outside of the roadway, a walkway for the use and benefit of pedestrians.

City Attorney Says Trash-Burning Fine, Jail Sentence Legal

The recently-adopted Prestonsburg ordinance providing that the burning of trash or other refuse in the city limits is a nuisance and punishable by either fine or imprisonment, or both, is valid under Kentucky Revised Statutes 86.140 and 86.150, City Attorney Walter Scott Harkins said this week after a few residents had asserted that the city cannot legally prevent them from burning waste on their own property.

The question of legality of the ordinance arose as Roe Layne, representing the city in connection with garbage collection and disposal, sought to collect a monthly fee from home-owners for the service.

Only a few residents declined to pay the fee of 50 cents per month for this service, Mr. Layne reported, and some of these, he added, contended they would burn their rubbish on their own lots with immunity to police action.

The penalty provided by the ordinance for such "nuisance," Mr. Harkins said, is from \$10 to \$100 fine or a jail term of five to ten days, or both fine and jail term.

WOULD ENJOIN BUS WORKERS

Sparks, Conley Lines File Actions; Workers See Operation Attempt

Circuit Judge James W. Turner announced this afternoon that he would hand down a decision Monday on the bus companies' motion for injunctions.

Jack Ryan, representative of the Transport Workers Union, and 28 members of Transport Workers Local No. 214 were summoned Tuesday to appear in the Johnson circuit court this morning (Thursday) when Circuit Judge James W. Turner will hear the motion of the Sparks Bros. Bus Company for a temporary injunction which would restrain Ryan and the workers from interfering in any way with operation of the company's buses.

Judge Turner at the same time will hear the motion of the Conley Bus Line for an injunction against its striking workers.

Sparks bus drivers here on strike saw in the legal action the company's first move to get its buses rolling without union drivers at the wheel. "We have committed no offense," Bill Allen, one of the drivers named, said Wednesday. "There's no law against peaceful picketing and that's all we have done."

Oakley Sparks, Paintsville, president of the Sparks Brothers line and the Kentucky-Virginia Stages, both of which have been strike-bound for weeks, was asked Wednesday morning if Sparks Brothers saw any possibility of early operation. "I couldn't tell you," he replied.

Asked if overt acts or threats on the part of striking employees led to the motion for injunction, Mr. Sparks said, "I've heard everything in the world, but I don't know whether it's true or not."

DAVID COMES FROM BEHIND

To Lick Paintsville In League Thriller; P'Burg Holds Lead

To the Big Sandy Baseball League's card for last Sunday, David and Paintsville contributed the most rousing game, the former winning out, 5 to 3, at Paintsville in a story-book finish after two men had been retired in the ninth and the Paintsville pitcher had two strikes on the third batter.

Elsewhere over the circuit, Prestonsburg slaughtered Harold here, 25 to 0, with Kidd, Prestonsburg moundsman, holding his former teammates to three scattered singles; Wayland lost, 2-1, at Pikeville and Drift downed Auxler, 9 to 1.

In the ninth at Paintsville, with Hill running for Buskirk on third, two men down and two strikes on Ward, Paintsville leading, 3-2, and David players disconsolately preparing to leave the field, Ward hit through third, scoring Hill and knotting the score. Ward took second on the throw-in and Burke promptly doubled him home. Laferty followed up by singling past third to score Burke. Paintsville came back to threaten with two men on base as the game ended.

In the game here, Hamilton, Harold starting hurler, suffered from wretched fielding and his successors fared no better. Drift scored all its runs in the first two innings against Auxler and was held scoreless thereafter by Hobson, young high school twirler.

Hueysville Vet and K-9 'Buddy' Are Together Now as Civilians

There is at least one ex-GI in Wilmington who isn't troubled about the housing problem. He is Spike, a veteran of overseas service with the K-9 Corps.

This huge dog, part shepherd and part chow, is the pet of Paul Hayes, a native of Hueysville, Ky., now a senior at Wilmington College. Paul and his "old army buddy" now live at the T. J. Thompson residence, 338 Douglas street.

Spikes and Paul became pals nearly three years ago. That was when Paul was just beginning his career in the armed forces. Because Paul had majored in psychology in college he was soon assigned to the animal psychology branch of the army. That finally led to the K-9 Corps training station in San Carlos, California.

There for several months he worked in the training of dogs for war duty. Paul became quite expert in this job of teaching the dogs the many duties they must master to become valuable sentries and just two years ago he was sent overseas. During this time he was stationed in India as a technical observer for the K-9 outfit.

There he had a chance to see the dogs in action in a theater where they were so badly needed to help guard against infiltration and other Jap action on the Burma frontier.

LOCKS, DAMS HAVE CHANCE OF SURVIVAL

Approval by Senate Sought; Committee Conducts Hearings

The Big Sandy canalization project, last week ineptly described by THE TIMES as "killed" by the House when it was removed from the rivers and harbors bill, this week is still alive, with hope for its survival resting with the Senate.

If the Big Sandy locks and dams are restored to the bill by the Senate, the entire bill will go before a joint committee of the Senate and House, then back to the floors of the two Houses for final vote.

"Somebody said I got licked on the Big Sandy project," Congressman A. J. May, House sponsor of the river improvement program, told the district American Legion convention here Saturday. "I'm not licked. I'm going to run, though the blood flows."

Tuesday, the navigation project for this section and the Tug Fork section of West Virginia was before the Senate Commerce Committee where Congressman May and Dr. O. W. Thompson, Pikeville, defended it and where it was assailed by J. Brooks Lawson, Williamson, W. Va., attorney, and representatives of the Norfolk & Western Railway Company.

Lawson told the committee that the \$22,300,000 project was "utterly fantastic and unsound."

Congressman May said that the project had the third highest ratio of benefits to cost of any of the 38 in the rivers and harbors bill.

May contended the project, which was voted down by the House, not only would serve an area rich in high quality by-product coal, but also would be a valuable extension to the improved waterways system of the Mississippi valley.

Dr. Thompson, president of the Big Sandy Valley Association, said the Big Sandy area needed the river improvements to prevent unemployment.

"Our people shudder to think what the situation will be when we go back to normal times," he said.

W. W. Cox (Roanoke, Va., representative of the Norfolk & Western Railroad, argued that the project is economically unsound and unfeasible.

S. T. Saunders, Roanoke, also representing the Norfolk & Western, said the project was opposed by governors and congressmen of West Virginia and Virginia.

Proponents of rivers and harbors legislation are faced with a railroad fight to slash \$750,000,000 from the billion-dollar bill.

Biggest target of the land carriers is the \$500,000,000 Arkansas river navigation program for which

14 Floyd-Johnson Mines List 5,618 Employees

Total employment in 14 local mining establishments, 12 of which are located in Floyd county and two in Johnson, was 5,618 on May 15, a decrease of 18 from April 15, the Prestonsburg office, U.S. Employment Service, said this week. During the same period, veteran employment at these mines increased from 565 to 570 and female employment from 143 to 148.

When the war in Europe ended in May, 1945, total employment at the same establishments was 5,675 and female employment was 152. Employment is now 190 less than it was in May, 1945, due to the fact that operations at one location were abandoned in March of this year, leaving the total employment at the remaining 13 mines 133 greater than it was one year ago. The figures are 5,383 and 5,250 for May, 1946 and May, 1945, respectively.

A large proportion of the veterans who returned to this area have filed claims for their readjustment allowances. Wages paid on many of the local jobs, in industries other than coal mining, are very little higher than the \$20 per week readjustment allowance to which the veteran may be entitled if a suitable job is not available, the USES office commented. It is believed, however, that a large number of veterans with coal mining experience will be willing to accept employment in mining establishments during the last half of 1946.

Six of the 14 mines from which reports are obtained in this area are in need of additional men, especially in the coal fields. There is such a demand for bricklayers that they are demanding and receiving from \$2 to \$3 per hour for their services, but there is an abundant supply of most all other types of labor in the area, the report added.

LIBRARY HERE TO OPEN SOON

Woman's Club Sponsors Undertaking; Canvass For Books Is Planned

Within the next 10 days, Prestonsburg will realize its dream of a public library, Miss Alice Harris, president of the Woman's Club here which is sponsoring the library project, predicted this week.

The woman's club is contributing between 200 and 300 books it owns to the library, and Girl Scouts will make a book canvass of Prestonsburg homes Saturday. Books contributed to the library will be marked by name plates bearing the names of contributors.

Miss Harris explained that, while the library is starting "from scratch" and on a non-paying basis, there is every indication of its success. It will be located in the grade school basement, with Miss Margaret Douglas Spurlock and Doris Ann Clarke volunteer librarians. The library will be open through the summer, mornings only.

Later, the club hopes to procure city aid in employing a fulltime librarian. "We hope every home the Girl Scouts visit Saturday will give at least one suitable volume," Miss Harris said. "We are interested in good books for children as well as for adults."

The only public library facilities previously enjoyed by Prestonsburg residents was the library provided by the Works Progress Administration several years ago.

LEGIONNAIRES NAME COOPER 1946 LEADER

Congressman Explains Stand on Universal Military Training

Carl Cooper, Jr., Salyersville, World War II veteran, was elected Tenth district commander of the American Legion at the district convention held here Saturday. Mr. Cooper succeeds J. H. Rees, of Hazard.

Dr. Earl T. Arnett, Prestonsburg, was nominated to the post but declined to be a candidate for election.

The election of officers followed an address by Congressman A. J. May, chairman of the House Military Affairs Committee, during which he discussed universal military training, preparedness and legislation for veterans.

Attending the convention were war veterans from Floyd, Pike, Johnson, Magoffin, Knott, etcher, Perry, Breathitt, Martin and Leslie counties, the latter represented by Willis Sandlin, commander of the Leslie county Legion post at Hyden and one of the two Kentuckians to win the Congressional Medal of Honor in World War I.

The Legion parade to the music of the Floyd County Band and a fireworks display featured the morning activities.

Mayor E. P. Arnold of Prestonsburg, a veteran of the Spanish-American War, welcomed the Legion to Prestonsburg at the afternoon session. J. P. Hobson, Pikeville, gave the response, during which he expressed a belief in a strong army and navy and expansion of the Legion under the direction of younger men. Mrs. Edith Fitzpatrick James, Prestonsburg, sang the national anthem.

Tobe Owens, state Legion commander, spoke briefly in favor of universal military training and expressed gratification that Congressman May is supporting this program.

"Johnny is overseas and wants to come home. Willie is at home and doesn't want to leave. Tell me how to satisfy both," Congressman May asked of his audience.

Mr. May explained the difference in the draft and the universal training plan proposed. The United States, he declared, had practiced the doctrine of beating its swords into plowshares till in 1939, two years before Pearl Harbor, only 500 pounds of iron and 2,000 pounds of nickel were being made available to the army.

"With a small army and the tremendous number of reserves that would be created by the universal training system, it will not be necessary for this country to maintain a large standing army," he said.

Asserting that he favors terminal leave pay for servicemen, Mr. May pointed out that officers have for 40 years been receiving such benefits. "This will add millions of dollars to the national debt, and I am not for any expenditure that is not self-liquidating, except in this instance," the Congressman told the veterans.

Floyd Post was host to members of the Floyd County Band, composed of players from the various high schools and directed by Jesse Elliott, at a banquet at the Valley Inn. Floyd Post Commander Tom James, commenting on the orderliness of the crowd, expressed on behalf of the Legionnaires appreciation of the consideration given them by Prestonsburg police, the Sheriff and his deputies and other peace officers of the county.

Walter Scott Harkins, War II veteran, was named delegate to the Legion national convention to be held in San Francisco, with J. H. Rees, Hazard, an alternate.

MINE MISHAPS CLAIM TWO

One Killed, One Hurt In Wheelwright Mine; Koppers Miner Killed

Left Beaver Creek mine accidents during the past week claimed the lives of two miners and injured a third.

Floyd Castle, 52 years old, of Virgie, was killed Monday night in the mine of the Inland Steel Company, Wheelwright, when a mine car which he was riding was wrecked, knocking down timbers supporting the roof and permitting slate to fall onto him.

Hillard Burke, 34, other occupant of the car, was injured but not seriously.

Funeral rites for Winfred Tackett, 25-year-old miner, who was instantly killed shortly after noon last Wednesday in the Koppers Coal Company mine at Weeksby, were conducted Friday at the graveside in the Sebastian Johnson cemetery, Hartley, Ky.

Surviving Mr. Castle are his widow, four sons and two daughters. The body was taken to Virgie for burial today (Thursday) by the Call Funeral Home.

Tackett's head was crushed between a two-ton piece of slate and a mine car, it was said at the Call Funeral Home which prepared the body for burial.

Surviving the victim are his widow, Mrs. Emma Johnson Tackett, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Sylvan Johnson, and two brothers, Simon Tackett, of Virgie, and Luke Tackett, of Drift.

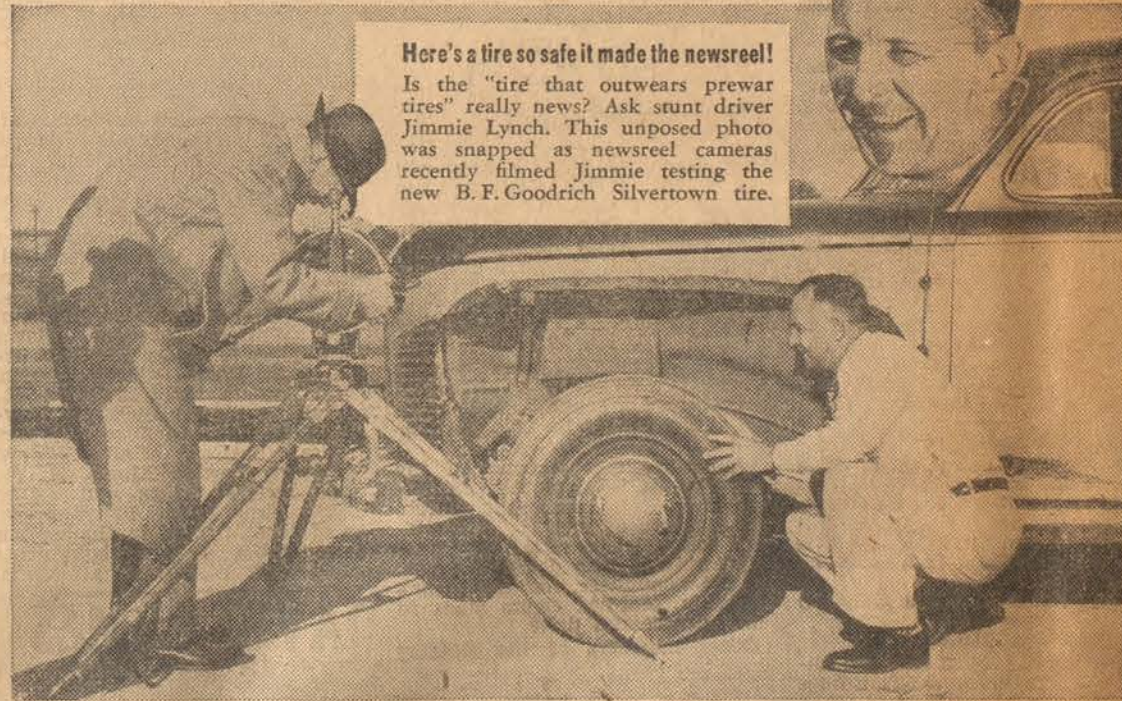

Earl's Place, Bowling Green, beer, had alcoholic beverages stored without license, and moved from one location to another without advising the board.

House-approved measure proposes an initial expenditure of \$55,000,000. Henry N. Roberts, spokesman for the Association of American Railroads, opened the drive as the Senate Commerce Committee took up the legislation.

Roberts testified after Major General Raymond Wheeler, chief of the army engineers, urged the committee to approve the Big Sandy project as well as all the other 50-odd items left in the bill by the House.

He said the authorization, which provides no money, would assure orderly and full development of the country's water resources.

The bill proposes navigation, flood control, hydroelectric power, irrigation and related works in all parts of the country. It originated in the House rivers and harbors committee.

A similar measure from the House flood control committee proposing projects to cost \$900,000,000 will be considered by the House next week.
