



The Council in taking this step is not seeking to work a hardship on any person. But the plan of garbage collection and disposal was worked out at considerable time and effort, as best the Council could, and it intends to give this plan a thorough and fair trial.

The Woman's Club of Prestonsburg has, on several occasions, appeared before the City Council, asking that the town be cleaned up and made more beautiful. This ordinance and the work being undertaken seek to do exactly that. Now, the Council asks that the Woman's Club and every other local civic and social group extend their co-operation.

Again, we remind the people of Prestonsburg-

This is the final notice to be given in this matter. We ask your cooperation. The Council does not wish any person to be embarrassed by arrest or legal action taken on the part of the city.
