Approved Facilities For Vets To Enlarge College Enrollment

The Federal Works Agency, at its Chicago office, has approved the following veterans' educational facilities for Pikeville College: Completion of the gymnasium building, including all necessary fixtures, furniture and equipment; a four-room classroom building back of the administration building, with all fixtures, furniture and equipment; outfitting of six counseling offices and the Business Education laboratory, with additional fixtures and equipment for the chemistry laboratory.

President A. A. Pate said that the new facilities will enable the college to enroll 425 students—135 more than the present enrollment.

NEWS FOR THE VETERAN

MONTHLY SURVEY OF VETS IN TRAINING

A month-to-month survey of veterans enrolled in educational and training institutions in the branch area, was ordered this week by the Columbus Branch Office of the Veterans Administration in an effort to avert delays in payment of subsistence allowances.

During the first week of each month VA personnel will visit every educational and training institution, numbering approximately 45,000, including colleges and universities to determine that veterans are receiving their subsistence allowances promptly. Veterans who fail to receive their subsistence checks will be able to report directly to the visiting VA personnel, and it will be unnecessary for them to enter into correspondence with VA.

Since cases of delay in subsistence payments are inevitable because of the tremendous volume of work which will result from the start of a new school term, veterans are advised to be in position to meet their personal financial obligations for at least 60 days after enrolling in an educational or training institution.

INSURANCE RACKET PLAGUES VETERANS

Veterans are warned to make a thorough investigation of any offers to assist them with their insurance problems involving National Service Life Insurance, VA Insurance officials at the Columbus, Ohio, Branch office advised this week.

VA appreciates the splendid work performed by insurance companies, but is concerned with the promotional efforts of a few unqualified parties who have made unfounded claims as to the eventual worth of GI insurance—charging a nominal fee for the service. The Veterans Administration sanctions no plan whereby veterans are charged for information relative to their GI insurance, and further, states that parties operating such schemes are liable to federal prosecution.

VA DISTINGUISHES BETWEEN PUBLIC LAWS 16 AND 346

Seeking to clarify any misunderstanding concerning the intent and purpose of Public Laws 16 and 346, Veterans Administration officials at the Columbus, Ohio, Branch office for Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky this week explained the principal differences between the two laws.

VA officials emphasized that Public Law 16 is the Vocational Rehabilitation Act, which provides for the rehabilitation of disabled veterans. Its purpose is to restore a veteran's employability which was lost due to a disability incurred in, or aggravated by, active service in the armed forces. Disabled veterans and the educational or on-the-job training agencies where they are enrolled are supervised by VA.

Under Public Law 346, which is the Serviceman's Readjustment Act, or G.I. Bill, benefits are provided for eligible veterans regardless of any disability. These benefits include

education and training, loan guarantee, readjustment allowances and employment assistance. VA supervises only the veteran in education or training under this law and not the education or training agencies, which are under state supervision. Disabled veterans are entitled to benefits under both Public Laws 16 and 346, but non-disabled veterans are not eligible for training under Public Law 16.

VA MEDICAL STAFF INCREASES 100 PCT

Figures released from the Veterans Administration Branch office, Columbus, Ohio, revealed the addition of 609 officers, dentists and nurses to the nine VA hospitals in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky during the six-month period ending Sept. 1, accounting for a 100 per cent increase in the urgently needed medical staff.

Of this total, 231 were assigned to VA hospitals in Kentucky, 230 in Ohio, and 147 in Michigan. With additional medical personnel still needed in branch hospitals, interested applicants should communicate with the nearest VA hospital or with the branch office, 52 South Starling St., Columbus, Ohio.

VA ATHLETIC PROGRAMS POPULAR IN HOSPITALS

Award of the Retaining Athletic Trophy, marking the completion of the first quarter of an extensive sports program first inaugurated within VA hospitals in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky, was announced this week by the Veterans Administration Columbus, Ohio, Branch office.

Winner of the summer sports quarter was VA Lexington hospital, topping nine other VA hospitals within the three-state area. To be awarded at the close of each seasonal sports session, the trophy goes to that hospital having the highest percentage of sports participation among its patients and personnel. Another sports innovation was the telegraphic track meet held between Branch 6 hospitals, with VA Chillicothe hospital the winner. Results of the six-event meet, first of its kind held among VA hospitals, were relayed to the Branch 6 office, where Special Service officials computed the scoring.

Long recognized as a leading method of physical therapy, the sports program doubles as a moral and body builder among the 7,230 veteran patients in the nine Branch 6 hospitals.

VETS' ADVANTAGE IN PAID-UP INSURANCE

Insurance minded veterans can save many dollars by investing in a paid-up National Service Life Insurance Policy, according to VA officials at the Columbus (O.) Branch Office for Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky.

This is advisable only in cases where veterans want to get their policies paid up during the period of life when they are most likely to be at their highest productive level. This plan has assumed most importance under the new N.S.L.I. amendment which includes three endowment policies.

The veteran receives a 3 per cent discount of premiums paid in advance, and in the event of his death prior to the paid-up date, all premiums in excess of that date are returned. This procedure is favored over back-dating the policy to its issuance date.

Otherwise, VA officials advise veterans to hold on to their insurance until they know what their income is going to be, and whether endowments, 20-pay life, 30-pay life, or ordinary life would best suit their requirements.

VETS CAUTIONED ON USE OF G.I. LOANS

World War II veterans have until 10 years after termination of the war in which to use their guarantee benefits, so they should exercise extreme caution in purchasing property at current high-level prices. Veterans Administration officials advised this week at the Columbus, Ohio, branch office.

Pointing out that under existing real estate conditions the sale price often exceeds the purchase price, VA officials warned veterans to look ahead, as present day purchases might lead to financial chaos in later years. This is especially true for those veterans who violate the G.I. Bill and pay "under-the-table" when the sale price is lowered to meet the appraisal price. The loan guarantee benefit is a one-time deal, and the veteran who sells his loan privilege or uses it for speculation, loses one of the most valuable benefits earned by his army service.

DEATH CLAIM FILES IN BRANCH OFFICE

The Columbus, Ohio, branch office of the Veterans Administration, serving Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky, is now processing virtually all death claims filed in behalf of deceased veterans in the three states, VA officials announced.

Over 50,000 files involving death claims have been transferred from the VA regional offices in the three states to the Columbus branch office. Cases formerly handled in Washington are being transferred to Columbus at the rate of 2,700 monthly, this plan to continue thru next December.

Upon completion of the decen-

tralization plan, all death compensation claims, as well as claims for reimbursement for burial expenses and claims for payment or accrued benefits, will be processed in Columbus.

The transfer includes all claims for death compensation resulting from the death of World War I and II veterans in cases where government insurance is not a factor. Eventually, the Columbus branch office also will handle claims in which insurance is involved.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. May I make larger payments on my G.I. loan than my regular installments when I am able?
A. Yes. You have the right to repay at any time without premium or fee for the entire indebtedness or any part of your loan, but not less than the amount of one installment or \$100, which is less.

Q. When and how are readjustment allowance payments paid to unemployed and partially unemployed veterans?
A. Readjustment allowance payments are figured on a weekly basis and in most states payments are issued weekly. The practice may vary in some states and allowance for two or more weeks be included in one payment.

Q. I am an honorably discharged veteran. How can I get a Certificate of Eligibility for a G.I. loan?
A. Under the amendments to the Servicemen's Readjustment Act (G.I. Bill), an honorable discharge shall be deemed a Certificate of Eligibility. Any veteran who does not have a discharge certificate, or who received a discharge other than dishonorable, may apply to the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs for a Certificate of Eligibility.

Q. I am a widow of a World War II veteran and have been receiving insurance payments in monthly installments. May I now change and receive a lump-sum settlement?
A. No. Lump-sum cash settlements can be elected only by the insured on death claim occurring on or after the date of the enactment of the Insurance Act of 1946.

Q. I have been receiving unemployment allowance. Will this bar me from taking an educational course or on-the-job training and receive subsistence allowance at some future date?
A. No. Receipt of readjustment or unemployment allowance does not take away any of the benefits provided by the G.I. Bill. However, a veteran cannot receive subsistence and readjustment allowance at the same time.

Q. Can a veteran pay his National Service Life Insurance premiums by deductions from his compensation, retirement pay, or his pension?
A. Yes, the veteran may authorize the monthly deduction of his insurance premiums from his compensation, his retirement pay, or his pension.

Q. Is a partially employed veteran carried on the unemployment allowance roll for a longer period than the unemployed veteran because of his smaller readjustment?
A. Each time a veteran receives a weekly allowance, regardless of the dollar amount of the payment, he has used up one week of the limited number of allowances to which he may be entitled.

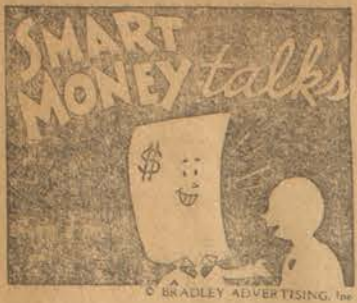

FORAGE-POISONING SEASON IS HERE

A warning to guard against feeding mouldy hay, silage, corn fodder, grains and other feeds has been issued by Dr. W. W. Dimock, of the UK Experiment Station, as this is the season when animals become ill from forage-poisoning.
 Corn, corn stover, hays and silage are especially dangerous to horses and mules, he said. For pigs and chickens, corn, garbage, spoiled canned fruits and vegetables are common sources of the poison.
 One of the symptoms of forage-poisoning is paralysis. Affected animals have difficulty swallowing. This condition is most evident in horses. Animals, especially pigs and chickens, are often unable to stand. In chickens the disease is called limber-neck, because the head hangs limp.
 To prevent poisoning of stock, Dr. Dimock suggests that farmers make sure feeds are sound and of good quality and have been properly cured and stored. Other advice:
 Never feed silage to horses and mules.
 Never feed spoiled canned goods to pigs and chickens.
 When stock becomes sick and symptoms point to forage-poisoning, change the feed at once, then have the suspected feed tested.
 Dr. Dimock points out that corn in the center of big cribs sometimes fails to dry out properly, and so becomes a source of botulism or forage-poisoning. Such corn is especially dangerous to horses and mules, he said. Also, where corn is husked from the shock and piled on the ground, ears next to the ground sometimes develop the poison.
