Troy B. vs. The Schools

At the time I resigned as superintendent of schools a few months ago, I said it was rumored a "would be" big politician was laying plans to get control of the schools. This rumor has now become a reality; and Troy B. is head over heels in the school race. His candidates for the Floyd County Board of Education are Willard May and Joe Wheeler Burchett. It appears that Troy B. will never be satisfied unless he controls all the offices around the courthouse; and that's exactly what he means to do, making all the teachers and their relatives subject to his will. You will remember that another man called Hitler started out to rule the world just a few years ago.

Troy B. has taken great pains to tell the people on their tax notices that their school tax has been increased from 75c to \$1.50 per \$100 valuation. Why didn't you tell the people, Troy B., that their consolidated school taxes had been repealed by the Legislature and that all school taxes had been put under one levy? I suppose that you will agree that this is true. Considering that people do not have to pay any more consolidated school taxes in Floyd county, there

is not so much increase in school taxes after all, is there, Troy? Some rural sections pay a little more taxes, but their children get nine months schools, too, just as the children of our larger schools do. Under the new law everyone pays the same rate, and every school in Floyd county regardless of where it is located gets the same school term as do the larger schools. Troy, don't you think the country boys and girls deserve an equal chance with the larger schools?

Moreover, Troy, why didn't you tell the people that the county rate for school taxes is the same and not one penny higher than they are in Prestonsburg where your brother-in-law Wicker is superintendent? The rate is \$1.50 in the county; it is \$1.50 in Prestonsburg. Here in Prestonsburg Mr. Wicker does not operate a large fleet of school buses as is done out in the county at a cost of \$50,000 per year, and yet the school taxes are as high in Prestonsburg as they are out in the county. This is the cold truth, Troy, and it cannot be wiped off the record with a smile.

Here is another thing Floyd county teachers and

taxpayers ought to know. Under the present law, the sheriff gets 1 per cent of the school taxes for collecting them. Last winter while I was at Frankfort trying to get the Legislature to appropriate more money for the schools, Troy B. was down there trying to get a bill passed giving the sheriffs 4 per cent of the school taxes for collecting them. He got his bill passed. But he later found out that the law giving 4 per cent to the sheriffs did not apply to present sheriffs. I am informed that he is now writing the sheriffs of the state for money to finance a law suit to see whether he cannot get his 4 per cent instead of 1 per cent of the collection of our school taxes during his present term. Why do I mention this? It shows one thing beyond doubt: **Troy B. is more interested in his own bank account than he is in the teachers or the taxpayers.**

Back last year when Troy B. was running for sheriff, he said he stood for the veterans. This year he has changed his mind, and he is doing his dead level best to defeat a veteran, Palmer Hall, who is now superintendent of Floyd county schools, and who lived on a little bread and soup each day in

a German prison camp while Troy B. was safe at home. Does this sound very much like you are for the veterans or against them, Troy?

There is only one issue in this campaign, dear people! Do you want the schools to continue to go forward under Palmer Hall, a veteran who risked his life along with your boys, or do you want to elect Troy B. as political dictator in the superintendent's office to dominate all the offices around the courthouse without worrying about your children's welfare?

I was your superintendent for almost ten years. Even Troy B. will have to admit that I did a fairly good job. The Board of Education and I looked after your children's interests. We hired Democrats as well as Republicans for teachers. We did not try to control other offices as our sheriff is now trying to do. Whether you continue to have good schools in Floyd county depends upon your choice for Board members to be elected in November. Let's keep our schools clean! I'm sure you'll agree with me that you don't want your schools flung back into politics. I'd like to see our schools continue to go forward. This can and will be done if you elect as school board members James (Jimmy) Green in Educational Division No. 1 and Dr. J. H. Allen in Division No. 2. These men will co-operate with Palmer Hall, Superintendent, and the hold-over Board members—Dr. Dewey Osborne, Ray Fraey and T. N. Newsome—in continuing a good school program in Floyd county.

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Town Hall vs. Floyd County Schools

I am a veteran, but first I am a citizen and second a veteran. I saw action in the Pacific as a member of the Marine Corps. I do not want to cash in upon what I did or failed to do while in the service of my country. I want to take my place as a citizen here, deeply interested in the forces which affect the welfare of our people everywhere, but more particularly the people here in Floyd county.

As a school teacher and citizen I am interested in the selection of school board members this fall. The thinking citizens of this county and many veterans join me in supporting Joe Wheeler Burchett, Division No. 1, and Willard May, Division No. 2 as school board members of Floyd county.

We are supporting Mr. Burchett and Mr. May because they stand opposed to three superintendents of schools in this county. We support them because they are for lowering your school tax from \$1.50 per hundred dollars assessed valuation to \$1.00. We support them because they are for eliminating waste and inefficiency in the office of the county superintendent, in the school bus garage, and wherever found in the school system. We support them because they are opposed to Town Hall, the greatest imitator of Hitler ever to enter Floyd county.

Town Hall, in the last issue of The Times, is trying to deceive you and becloud the issue by castigating Sheriff Troy B. Sturgill. Mr. Sturgill is not the issue in this election. The issue is simply this: "Do we favor the present set-up of the Floyd County Board of Education or do we oppose this set-up? The people of Floyd county just recently expressed their feelings toward Mr. Sturgill by re-electing him Sheriff. Mr. Sturgill conducts himself with friendliness and courtesy toward all the people all the time. Shame on you, Mr. Hall, for stooping to such littleness. You were once supposed to be a big man.

I ask Mr. Hall to answer these questions that I, and every other citizen am entitled to ask:

1. How have you been able to build up such a personal fortune, for example, your ability to build a town at Allen, during your ten years as superintendent?
2. Have not your expenses accounts, paid by the school system, been used by you to strengthen your political fences?
3. How diligently have you getting self, in your dealings with architects, building contractors, for the schools, for tractors, insurance agents and wholesale companies?
4. Have you driven your automobile to the school bus garage for repairs at the taxpayers' expense?
5. Your brother, Boone Hall, one of the three superintendents, is being paid a salary of \$3,600. What are his duties other than driving the Floyd county school pick-up truck and is this truck being diverted to any personal use?

Town Hall and satellites have been served well from the funds of the Floyd county school system. Indeed, far, far better than they have served the school children. Mr. Hall was supposed to have resigned and given the superintendency to someone else after he had grown tired of it. Let's not be misled. I am convinced that he still is and will continue to be the

boss unless his plans go astray.

FELLOW CITIZENS, we must wake up to this little man who started off to do a good job for the schools, but who let money, more money, become the dominating passion of his life. The urge to acquire, to possess became so strong a force that he succumbed to its power and forgot the boys and girls in the schools.

Mr. Hall spoke of doubling the school tax and tried to justify it by misleading statements. All school taxes of the state are not under one levy. All school taxes of a county are under one levy, but this levy may be as low as twenty-five cents and as high as \$1.50 per \$100 valuation. The levy depends upon the general budget prepared by the county superintendent and approved by his board. Town Hall gives you the works by demanding the maximum levy.

As a teacher I am for running the schools nine months and for higher teachers' salaries. I cannot, however, justify doubling the school tax when a rate of \$1.00 would have done the job. Here are some figures to point out to you the truth of this statement: The Floyd County Board of Education will receive approximately \$43,000 more money from the equalization fund of the state this year than was received last year. The Board will receive approximately \$70,000 more from state per capita than was received last year. A twenty-five per cent increase in the tax rate would have brought more than \$70,000 more to the school fund. These three items add more than the amount of money needed to pay the increase in teachers' salaries and to add two months to the rural schools. Furthermore, the Floyd county school system already had a reserve of approximately \$100,000 in bonds. Now, seriously, all this money is not going to the increase of teachers' salaries and the extra month's teaching in the rural schools. Tell us where it is going. Don't kid me! The Floyd County Board of Education did not need to double taxes to operate the school system on its present level. I realize that it is costing a great amount of money to pay a lot of useless jobholders to run about the county in big automobiles to campaign for their boss, Town Hall.

FELLOW CITIZENS, let us elect men who will serve the many and not a chosen few. Let us elect men to the

board who will see that every penny spent will go to the interest and welfare of the children rather than to enrich certain individuals who have become parasites, sucking the substance and sustenance from the educational life of Floyd county.

Join with us in electing Joe Wheeler Burchett, Division No. 1, and Willard May, Division No. 2 as your board members. Join with us in helping to tear down what, in my opinion, is the most dangerous political organization ever to exist in Floyd county.

Frankfort, Ky., Sept. 30 (Spl.)—The Kentucky Unemployment Compensation Commission handled a total of 63,155 continued unemployment benefit claims during the week ending September 21, Dr. H. A. Babb, executive director of the Commission, announced today.

Of this number, 8,639 were claims filed by Kentuckians; 4,313 by interstate claimants, and 50,183 by veterans under the Veterans Readjustment Allowance program.

The area served by the Prestonsburg office of the Commission reported 244 Kentucky claims, 420 interstate and 2,075 by veterans for a total of 2,739.

In addition to the testimony of the two physicians and the mortician, the Commonwealth relied strongly on the evidence elicited from Jack Wallen, Prestonsburg taxicab driver, who stated that he saw the blaze of the pistol. Mrs. Lewis had no weapon in her hands at the time and that she had her hands against a screen door at the moment the shot was fired.

Trials of Dorothy Spears, the woman in the case, Frank and Pearl Harris were continued.

Wednesday afternoon, evidence was being heard in the trial of Lonnie Robinson for the murder of Policeman Orbin Moore, of Prestonsburg. After the regular jury had been exhausted Saturday Circuit Judge Hill directed that 100 veniremen be summoned for possible jury service Wednesday. The jury panel was completed by noon Wednesday, and the jurors qualified as having no conscientious scruples against the death penalty if the evidence warrants such a verdict.

Jesse Anderson became the eighth man to receive a penitentiary term during the September term of court, which has been extended till Oct. 5. He was held guilty Wednesday morning of the slaying of Johnny Holbrook on Jack's Creek.

Commonwealth testimony in the Anderson case contended that Holbrook, a war veteran, was ambushed and shot while offering no offense. Defense evidence claimed that Holbrook, armed with a gun, followed Anderson and that the veteran had, a few nights earlier, shot under Anderson's feet.

Jointly indicted with Anderson were his brother, Raymond Anderson, and Troy Hall but they will not be given trial at this term of court.

Nor will Mrs. Laura Bayes, accused of the murder of her husband, William Bayes, at West Prestonsburg, be brought to trial till later. The case was continued till January when physicians stated that she is ill and unable to stand trial at this time.

The Commonwealth produced testimony showing that Policeman Moore was shot one time down through his shoulder and again over the back of his head. One woman witness testified that Robinson, describing the shooting to her, said that Horn when shot "sulled like a possum."

When first arraigned here, a few days after the twin killings, Robinson denied knowledge of the crime. Ballistics tests of bullets fired from his automatic pistol, which was recovered by officers from his mother on the night of the slayings, revealed, however, that this was the weapon from which the bullets that killed the policemen were fired.

It was said this afternoon that Robinson's attorneys were preparing to file motion for a new trial. The case ended the criminal term of court. The civil docket begins Monday.

Federal Judge H. Church Ford entered the order. The order said the amount to be received by Williamson was the balance of a year's allowance of \$25,000 from July 1, 1937, to Jan. 1, 1946, less the amount previously received by Williamson from his drawing account.

The sum to be received by Smith represents a \$7,500 a year allowance from 1942 to 1945.

These allowances, the order states, are "on account and to be credited on any final allowances made to trustee and attorney."

Your Telephone Company has found it imperative to file application with the Kentucky Public Service Commission for higher rates on local telephone service and on most long distance calls within the state. This action was taken because telephone earnings are dangerously low and reasonable earnings are required to furnish adequate service. We ask that you read this message carefully so you will understand clearly why increased telephone rates are necessary.

Your telephone rate is low and it is the earnest desire of your Telephone Company to keep it low.

While your rate has remained the same for many years, the total cost of furnishing telephone service has steadily gone up. Since 1939 our expenses for Kentucky operations have increased 118 per cent, while revenue increased only 88 per cent.

Wage Rates Up \$2,162,573

Much of the increase in expenses is represented by wages, since wages make up the greater part of the cost of furnishing telephone service. Wages have been raised in keeping with national policies and the general trend throughout the country. These wage increases were necessary to assure, through competent personnel, the provision of an adequate service. Telephone wage rates in Kentucky have been raised during the past 18 months by \$2,162,573 on an annual basis.

Since the first of this year, 40,000 new telephones have been installed in Kentucky, but 23,000 people are still waiting for telephones. This demand forces us to build new facilities now, in the face of high costs. The cost of erecting buildings has jumped 75 to 100 per cent; the overall cost of providing telephone facilities has advanced 45 to 60 per cent and the cost of telephone materials has increased 15 to 25 per cent. Despite these high costs, we telephone folks—and there are 4,000 of us in Kentucky—must continue to improve service generally, and to expand it. Our plans call for gross expenditures of approximately \$35,000,000 for telephone construction in Kentucky during the next five years.

Pay-Out Is Increasing Faster Than Take-In

With the tremendous increase in the expenses of furnishing telephone service and with rates unchanged for years, we have a difficult time making ends meet. So much so, that today we find ourselves confronted with the lowest earnings in our history in spite of a record volume of business.

No business can long continue to render service when the amount paid out to provide that service is increasing faster than the amount taken in. Therefore, it is our

duty, as your public servant, to report this condition to you since it directly affects your telephone service. We must appeal to you for relief through the Kentucky Public Service Commission, which regulates our rates.

The requested rate increase for local service would be on a sliding scale depending on size of locality. Authority is also being asked for an increase of 5 cents on most long distance calls within the state.

Residence Rate Held at Minimum

Today's high costs indicate a need for greater increases than we are asking, but it is hoped the proposed new rates will prove sufficient. In view of this, the increases requested on residential service were held to a minimum. Your Telephone Company feels that it is to the best interest of every business man in Kentucky that residential rates remain as low as possible.

The new rates we are asking represent an increase of 11 per cent of our total revenue in Kentucky. This is small when compared with the increased costs of doing business. In fact, even with the new rates, long-distance charges generally would be lower than they were 21 years ago and local service rates only slightly higher, while service has been considerably extended and its value has been increased many times.

Southern Bell wants rates no higher than necessary to furnish everyone with good service and expand it. The proposed rates are the very minimum increases we can get by on. In face of rising costs, they are very modest.

fore," J. M. McAllister, Kentucky manager of Southern Bell, said, "but our earnings have dropped to a dangerously low point. This has resulted from the fact that wages and other costs have gone steadily upward while rates for local telephone service have remained the same for many years and long distance rates have even been reduced."

Mr. McAllister pointed out that telephone wage rates alone for Kentucky had increased by \$2,132,503 since March, 1945, on an annual basis, adding that the costs of erecting buildings have jumped 75 to 100 per cent, plant construction 45 to 60 per cent, and telephone material 15 to 25 per cent.

"We are asking now for increases in rates that will more nearly reflect the costs of providing the service," Mr. McAllister said.

"That we have been able for many years to absorb increased costs, without asking for higher rates, is, we feel, a remarkable achievement of which the company's management, our employes, and subscribers can justly be proud."

Mr. McAllister stated that the Telephone Company's investment in Kentucky is approximately \$40,000,000 representing an increase of about \$10,000,000 since 1939.

"The Telephone Company did not profit from the war," Mr. McAllister said, "as is shown by the fact that earnings declined throughout that period and are today less than half of what they were before the war. For 1939, the return was 4.40 per cent of the average investment. This percentage dropped point by point until in 1945 it was only 2.99 per cent. And for the period of April, through August of this year, extended on an annual basis, the return was only 1.83 per cent. This earnings rate does not include any possible

tax refund that may be available this year only on 1944 federal income taxes. We have every reason to believe that in the face of rising costs earnings will continue to drop unless we get some relief in the form of better rates.

"We must extend our facilities to meet the rapid growth of Kentucky because the telephone is a business and social necessity of modern living. We have great confidence in the future of this state and the company has carefully-laid plans to keep pace with its development. Our plans call for gross expenditures of approximately \$35,000,000 for construction in Kentucky during the next five years. In the interest of our subscribers, we must protect the soundness of the telephone system by having our earning capacity more nearly equal costs."

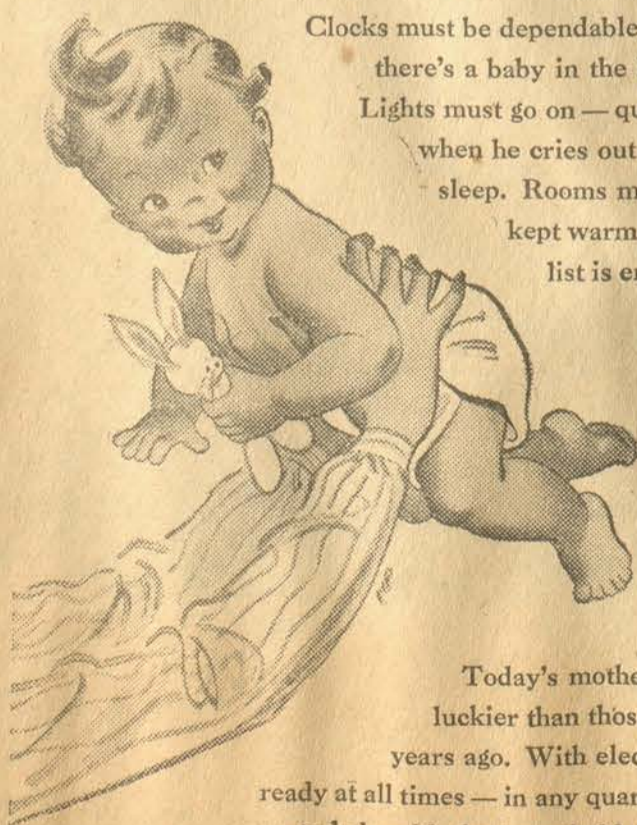

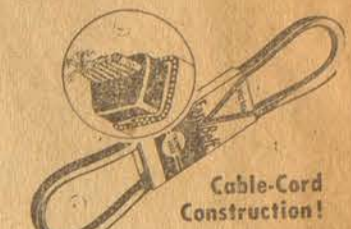
