# The Truth for Floyd County's Schools

## LET'S GET IT STRAIGHT!

A school board race is now on. Much will be said and done before the race is over—some in all sincerity and some otherwise. The public is entitled to know the truth.

In the first place, I am now the superintendent of your Floyd county schools. I was employed by the Board of Education for a term beginning July 15 of this year and expiring June 30, 1948, with no strings attached. Regardless of the outcome of this coming election of two Board members, three of the present members will still be serving at that time and can, if they wish, give me a contract for another four years. I am confident that if I do my job right and ask them for such a contract they would grant it. I did not ask them to obligate themselves to me. I know they are not obligated against me.

As your superintendent of schools I am vitally interested in the election of members to the Board of Education. It is most important that I have Board members with whom I can work in harmony. Naturally, therefore, I am interested in the two men, Dr. J. H. Allen and James (Jimmy) Greene, who have expressed themselves as being in favor of the general policies followed by the present administration. Dr. Allen is a member of the Board at present. James (Jimmy) Greene is a

former teacher and like the present members of the Board is reputable and honorable, and a man of integrity.

## Not to Threaten Nor Cajole

So let there be no misunderstanding! If you are for me you are for these two men. If you are for them you are for me and will be helping me do my job better. I say this not to threaten nor cajole but to allay any suspicions or doubts as to what my position is. When I took over this job I had but one aim—to do the best possible job for Floyd county's school system. I have not the slightest wish to be a dictator nor do I propose to be dictated to.

## Two Real Reasons For This Race

I repeat much will be said and done—much effort will be made to bemuddle, confuse and hide the real issue. Actually there are only two real reasons for this race.

First: One or two county officials, whose career is that of politics, helped to initiate this race. They would like to have something to say about the hiring of teachers, bus drivers, etc., for their own political benefit. Too many straight, reliable men have told me of conversations and maneuverings which took place months ago to doubt this fact. Their present interest is an open book (or on a post card shall we say). It

is the privilege of these politicians to be interested in themselves but it is the privilege of the people to decide what is best for their schools and their children. Most of you can remember a time in this county when one went to see the sheriff or the county judge or some big politician instead of the superintendent when he wanted a school job. I know you don't want that again!

Second: Some of the boys are wanting a bigger job, and perhaps innocently unaware of the real situation are willing to go along with the politician. It is not quite clear, even though their plans could work out, who would be your superintendent of schools. In some places we hear Mr. Wicker mentioned. In other places it is Claude May. In still others it is Joe Taylor Hyden and in others yet it is Mr. Frazier. And still others do we hear mentioned for half-the-office or assistant superintendents jobs. Now I have no quarrel with these men for seeking something better. It is their privilege. All of these men I have considered my personal and professional friends. Mr. Wicker was an old schoolmate of mine when he was still a citizen of Knott county and is at present my neighbor. He has been on the payroll of the Floyd County Board of Education every year since I have been connected with it and up until he came to Prestonsburg of his own accord had one of the best jobs in the county.

Claude May has had a job in the school system of the county every year that he wanted one, during the past 10 years, as far as I can remember. He resigned as principal of the Garrett grade school just before school began this year so that he might take part in this campaign. Neither can I remember when Mr. Frazier or Joe Taylor Hyden was ever denied a job in the Floyd county school system, within the last 10 years.

Yes, boys, it is your privilege to ask but it is the privilege of the public to decide. If it is my job you seek then you must present your case against me and the present and aspiring members of the Board. If you wish to drag in the past and my predecessor, Town Hall, you can truthfully only admit what the public already knows—that more was done for the

schools of Floyd county in the past 10 years than was ever done before; that the Floyd County School System ranks high in the state of Kentucky. If any doubt the efficiency and the effective administration of our school system I should be happy to have them consult our State Superintendent, or our Director of Finance in the State Department, or our state supervisor of elementary education, or critic teachers from Eastern State and Morehead State Colleges who have worked with us and who can speak without prejudice.

Seriously, boys, do you propose to offer a better school system or aren't you just trying to talk yourselves into a job? You speak of better "organization and administration of our schools" and "better placement of teachers." Brother, if we could have it as good as we'd like I'd sleep much better at night. If you mean what you imply, then you must not be aware that we are now in the greatest emergency period that the schools of the entire nation have ever faced. Kentucky alone has over 5,000 emergency teachers. Floyd county has over 100 of these and yet we are managing to do a pretty fair job. When you ask what the duties of the man in charge of transportation and supplies and repairs are, you confess a gross lack of information as to just what the operation of Floyd county's schools entails. If you can suggest any improvements in the way we run the school bus garage and the transportation system in general, both Harry May and I would appreciate it, boys.

Let's be specific, fellows. Just what would you do? We have two attendance officers. The State Department requires two and recommends three for an enrollment as large as ours. The State Department recommends three full-time supervisors for our rural teachers alone. We have one full-time supervisor. He is one of the Assistant Superintendents you are so "against." The 12-month principals mentioned serve as rural supervisors in the schools in the area served by their high schools, during the summer. The man in charge of transportation and supplies and repairs is the other Assistant Superintendent to whom you are so "opposed." These two jobs have existed for years.

Let's be honest, boys! We know that if you are school men you wouldn't have less supervision, and you'd have to have somebody in charge of transportation, etc. We know too that you are interested in jobs and that you would not eliminate a single one of them! Would calling them by a different name make a bit of difference?

You try to point at our county with the finger of shame as being one of a few counties of Kentucky with \$1.50 tax rate. The State Department points to Floyd county with pride as being one of the few counties with

the courage to "do things" for her boys and girls. Our State Supervisor said that to her knowledge Floyd county was the only county in the state that thought enough of her boys and girls to furnish shelter houses at the school bus stops. Would you take a single one of them away, now, boys?

Let's tell the whole truth, Troy B. when you give your little lecture to the people who come in to pay their taxes. Don't forget to tell them that almost half of the people—those who have been paying consolidated school taxes—will pay little if any increase. Some will actually pay less since all consolidated taxes have been abolished by state law. Don't try to tell them that the teachers aren't getting higher salaries or that the people aren't getting more for their money. They know better. (We won't expect you to tell them that you'd like for your brother-in-law, Mr. Wicker, to be Superintendent.) And the little landholder knows that when he pays one extra dollar the railroad and the big gas companies and coal companies, etc., pay an extra \$5 or more and his child will get the benefit of all of it. These big companies who pay most of the tax made no objection when the bill was passed at Frankfort.

I stand for the lowest tax rate that will provide these things:

- (1) Nine months school for all children.
- (2) Continued higher teachers' salaries.
- (3) Keep our school buses (and more of them) on the road.
- (4) Expanded and progressive school curriculum.
- (5) Construction of the new buildings or additions planned, as soon as possible at Betsy Layne, Weeksbury, Lackey, Melvin, Wheelwright, Martin and McDowell without voting bond issues for a single one of them.

I did not prepare the general budget under which the levy was made but I am spending the money, with the Board of Education, as carefully as I would spend my own, under a working budget that I did prepare. If at the end of this year, I am convinced that an adequate school program can be carried on with a lesser tax, then it shall be reduced.

But your budget won't do, Joe Taylor. Mr. Wicker could have told you that. He has not been able to reduce the rate in Prestonsburg below \$1.50. What would you do? Use up the \$110,000 in bonds set aside to build these new buildings that should have been built already, had the war not intervened. If these buildings are to be constructed when materials are available money for some of them will have to be set aside now. That is just good, sound business. Your budget would not build a single one of these buildings, unless you were willing to cut off all the school buses and take off a month of the school term or cut the teacher's salary or

leave off all repairs and improvements. You don't say you are for the school buses but the people wouldn't let you take them off and the people want these new buildings, the children need that extra month of school and well you know how the teachers would feel about a lower salary!

## First a Citizen, Then a Veteran

I agree with you 100 per cent, Joe Taylor, that a man is first a citizen and then a veteran. I believe in veteran's preference. Other things being equal, or nearly equal, the veteran should come first. Every man working in or out of my office except Preacher Alex Stephens is a veteran. Joe Taylor returned to the job he left just as did the other veterans who so desired. Fifty veterans are now teaching in our schools. Not a day passes but what veterans are in my office seeking help on On-the-job Training program, G.E.D. Tests, etc. They are all welcomed and helped as far as possible. I know how much some of them deserve it. Some of the boys opposing me are veterans and some are not. Certainly it should not be held against any man who offered his services but was rejected.

As for myself, while I would give preference to veterans, I claim nor want none for myself. I neither joined nor dodged. I sought no officer's commission nor arm chair job but took it as it came for more than 32 months, like the boys I left

Floyd county with, some of them teachers and boys I had known in the school-room. I ate dust, tasted sweat, crawled in the mud and snow of Europe under the whine of machinegun bullets; learned that a man can grow years older in a single night under incessant shellfire; and how it feels to have a German 88 on a Tiger tank look down your throat; experienced the abject humility of the filth, and inconvenience and starvation diet of a Nazi war prison camp. But that was all in the line of duty. It would not necessarily make a man a better Superintendent of Schools. I

claim nor want no preference. All I ask is an even break, a chance to prove that I can do the job I want to do for the Floyd county schools.

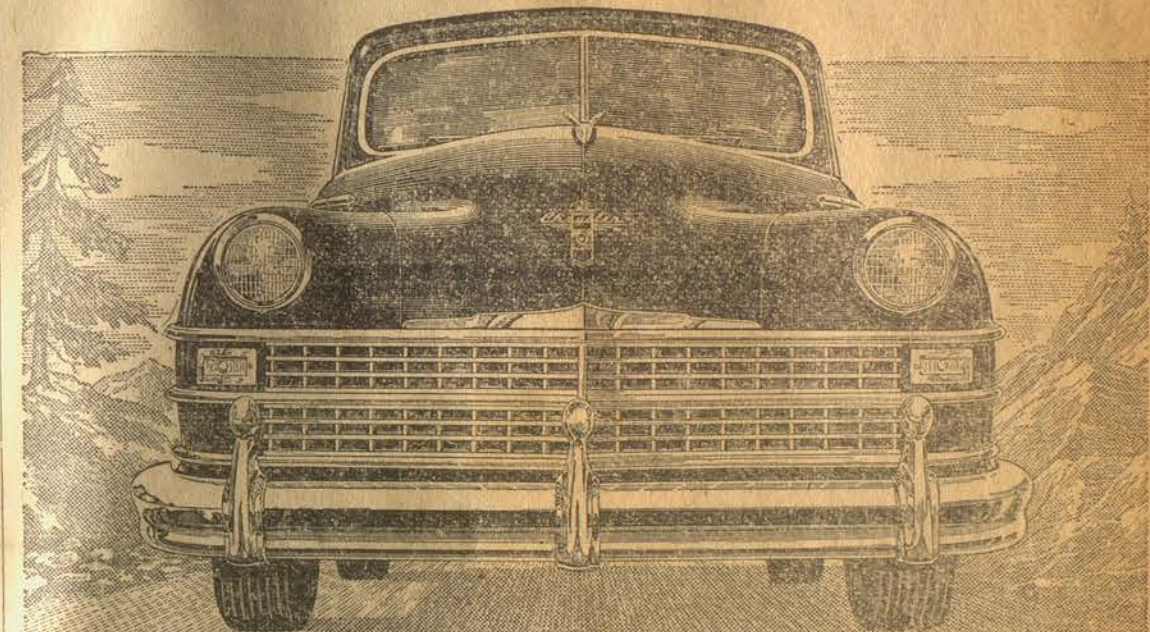
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## CAVALCADE HISTORY

**National Physically Handicapped Week**

It is good business for employers to utilize the abilities, skills and experience of handicapped persons and the entire community benefits when it is done. Glenn S. Anderson, manager of the United States Employment Service here, said Monday in calling attention to the objectives of National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week, October 6-12.

"Few Americans realize that in this country there are some 28,000,000 persons handicapped to some extent by disease, accident, or as a result of war. Each year there are approximately 350,000 people permanently disabled by accidents alone," Mr. Anderson said.

"For many years we have heard about the employment problems of the handicapped person and too many people have grown accustomed to believe that these constitute a community problem that cannot be solved," he added. "During the war years we learned that handicapped workers make efficient workers when they are placed in jobs for which they are qualified."

"Now is the time to recognize the qualifications of handicapped veterans and other persons who are able and willing to take their place in industry or commerce," he stated. "When they are placed in the right jobs, handicapped persons are able to do as good or better work than able-bodied persons."

The local USES office this month is stressing the need for employers to hire a greater number of handicapped workers, Mr. Anderson said. "While many employers have done a splendid job in hiring handicapped persons," Mr. Anderson explained, "we still have more employment opportunities for disabled veterans who have returned from service."

### Damages of \$67,100 Given Silecosis Victims

Cattlettsburg, Ky., Oct. 5—Damages totaling \$67,100 were awarded today to eight former employes or their estates in settlement of charges that they had contracted silecosis at the North American Refractories Company.

Circuit Judge Watt M. Prichard, who heard testimony in the collective suit at court sessions over a period of nearly five years, dismissed four other cases.

Five of the awards were made posthumously.

The individual suits, for sums ranging from \$35,000 to \$50,000 and totaling nearly \$500,000, were filed late in 1941. The submission of evidence was not completed until last September 8.

They charged the company, a brick manufacturing firm, with failing to provide proper safeguards.

Governor Simon S. Willis was an attorney for the company in the suits before he was elected to his present office.

The individual awards included: To the estate of Marion Fisher, \$9,000; estate of John Fisher, \$3,500; estate of Charles Thomas, \$6,500; Arthur Abbott, \$7,250; Arnold Cunningham, \$14,500; T. A. Queen, \$7,500; estate of Daniel Dixon, \$5,000, and estate of Oscar Brown, \$7,760.
