



#### To Start the New Year Right

EGINNING with the first day of next year, a law goes into effect which does not force the Kentucky motorist to have public liability and property damage insurance—but, if he has an accident, it will make him wish he did

This new law provides for "proof of financial responsibility" and there are only three kinds of such evidence: a certificate of insurance, a bond, or a receipt showing that the driver has on deposit with the State Treasurer the tidy sum of

The law will be a boon to the insurance salesman. At the same time, if properly enforced, it will be a boon to the public, both motorists and pedestrians.

Reckless or drunk driving thus receives another penalty, one which cannot be sidestepped. The law may be erous to some who are careful and sober, since it requires "responsibility" of every driver in a wreck, whether at fault or no, but the greater benefits it ill render the public as a whole justifies harshness it possesses.

#### A Salute to Solid Citizens

STATE of lawlessness no longer exists in Floyd county.

That was another of the verdicts written by petit juries at the recent circuit court term here, in action rather than in as many words.

A few short months ago, the Commonwealth, dismayed by the failure of juries to meet effectively the threatening challenge of crime, asked that murder trials be transferred to other counties. "A state of lawlessness exists," declared Commonwealth's Attorney John Chris

But all that is changed now. Floyd county juries, not juries from other counties, changed it. Even when the regular panel, composed of jurors regarded as "too tough" and rejected by defense counsel for certain trials, was not in service, jurors summoned from over the county came to Prestonsburg, heard evidence-and they were "tough." Four of five men given murder trials received life pen terms.

This is not to say that every man accused is guilty. Nor do we maintain that every man who escaped with a light sentence at the hands of juries at earlier court terms was a double-dyed murderer. But it is to say this: Men and women of the county, from all parts of the county, have come to abhor crime, to shudder at the threat of murder to the good name of the county-and they have met the grave challenge.

This, then, is to salute these solid citizens-citizens who had an unpleasant duty to perform and who, like Wellington's soldier, seeing danger, met it







# Who's Trying To Tell Us How To Vote?

The Big Boys from Gotham love us like a step-child. Haven't you noticed how they love us? It is touching.

First of all, they are out after Jack May. They tell us what to do to thisfy them—defeat Jack May. Two weeks ago, for instance, NEWSWEEK, the New York magazine which poses as an impartial dispenser of the nation's news, wrote of Mr. May's opponent's campaign by jeep through this section:

"The men who live in the Kentucky hollows along the Big Sandy river haven't had much chance to talk to strangers. Dry creek beds and wagon paths are all that connect many of their log cabins where at night spinning wheels still hum and the 'leastuns' play by the open fire."

Let us break off the quotation there to ask, HOW DO YOU LIKE THAT? Aren't we pitiful, shut off from strangers, cooped up in our log cabins, lulled to sleep only by the hum of the old spinning wheel in the parlor?

Yes, they love us-they would not lie about us for anything-ex-

cept to regale the appetite for lies and dirt that their readers have. Now, read further from this same magazine:

"It is a long time between visitors, like the wandering singers with their 'sure-enough' fiddlers and their songs—'My Gal Is Bill-be-Damned' or 'Pa's Done Et the Shotgun'. Their names for their hollows give them away—'Lonesome, Troublesome, Peevish'."

Personally, we see nothing wrong with "Lonesome" and "Trouble-some" as names. Of "Peevish" we know nothing. If it exists, it's all right. It is there—and nothing is "given away" but the spirit of malice these New Yorkers feel for us. Remember John Fox' fine romantic story, "Christmas Eve on Lonesome," or Mrs. Furman's novel, "Mothering on Perilous"? These two very fine writers found only romance, color, beauty, rugged honesty here.

Speaking of names, what about these New York "darbs"—Yonkers, Harlem, Hell's Kitchen, Jamaica, the Bowery and all those lilting euphemisms that tickle the delicate New York ear?

But do we folks of Eastern Kentucky go around sniggering up our sleeves with stories of East Side filth and crime, of New York killers on the prowl, of a child ground to death under the wheels of a gangster's car in one block, of a child dying horribly at the hands of a sex maniac in another?

WE DO NOT. We are a fair and unprejudiced people.

Do we try to be mirch the names of their public officials because they do not recognize us and do as we would like them to do?

WE DO NOT. We are an independent people who believe as little in dictating to others as we believe in others dictating to us.

NEWSWEEK, from which we have here quoted in an article commending Jack May's opponent, has its editorial offices on 42nd street, New York City. It is owned and controlled by the Wall Street Astors.

In the same great city is The New York Post whose John O'Donnell came to Prestonsburg several weeks ago and returned to write with the same poison pen that assailed the late President Roosevelt. He attacked not only Congressman May but all the rest of us. He wrote, not in kindness, not with any thought of helpfulness, but from the distilled essence of vitriol that fills his heart, this diatribe of falsehood:

"Human nature is nowhere more onery in this Republic than among these feudin' hillbillies . . . And nowhere is the universal streak of larceny darker and deeper."

And there we are, all of us—libelled, ridiculed, set apart as Things, not People, by folks who know nothing and want to know nothing of Eastern Kentucky, its fine people, its beauties, its hope of the future and its great and fine loyalty to its own.

These are the kind of folks who tell you and us how to vote and for whom to vote—these folks who paint us as savages living in log cabins, as deep in hopelessness as the Man with the Hoe.

We ask you—are you willing for such as these to advise us?

We wonder if these New Yorkers know that out of the Kentucky hills have sprung a Fred M. Vinson, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, a Green H. Hackworth, a member of the World Court, and an Andrew Jackson May, who has made a fine record as our own Congressman, and many others.



AN INSTITUTION OF COMMUNITY SERVICE

The answer to this question is simple and easy. "Let's take a look at the record."

Every one will agree that the passage and final approval of all legislation affecting men in the service was reported and passed by the Committee on Military Affairs of which Congressman May is Chairman.

The following are some of the many bills he sponsored and had enacted into law:

1. "Soldiers and Sailors Civil Relief Act." This law suspended enforcement of certain liabilities of men in the service as follows:

(a) No landlord was permitted to throw any soldier or sailor's wife and children out

2. Pay and Allotment Law. This law provided family allowances to wives, children and dependent parents of men in the service. The following are the rates of allowance:

The wife \$22.00 from soldier, \$28.00 from the government, equals \$50.00 per month. 1st child \$30.00, additional children \$25.00 each so that a wife and five children would receive \$180.00 per month.

3. An Act to readjust pay of service men raising their pay from \$21.00 in first World War to \$50.00 in the last war.

4. A Bill to Protect Mentally Disabled Veterans. This bill removes restrictions and provides prompt payment of muster-out-pay to mentally disabled veterans—a very human act.

5. A law that liberalized the pay and allowances of the wife, children and dependent parents of service men by increasing the allowances. 6. Muster Out Law. This bill, which is now Public Law No. 225, provides "muster out"

pay of \$300.00 for all men on being discharged from the service, payable \$100.00 at the time of discharge, \$100.00 thirty days thereafter, and \$100.00 sixty days thereafter. 7. A law to provide for return of bodies of our war dead. This law directs the War De-

partment to provide metal caskets without cost to the relatives of our soldiers, sailors and marines who lost their lives in the service, and bury the bodies wherever parents or next of kin may request. It authorizes appropriation of the necessary money which has already been made available. The War Department is now engaged in returning the bodies as fast as caskets can

8. The G.I. Bill of Rights. This law provides material assistance to all our service men and women who want to go to school and hundreds of thousands are now in schools and colleges throughout the country who otherwise could not have gone to school at all. It authorizes federal loans to enable veterans to buy homes or start in business. It provides unemployment compensation for those who can not secure a job. It is the open door of opportunity for all those who strive for a chance in life.

9. Terminal Leave Pay. This bill, now Public Law No. 704, provides terminal leave pay to enlisted men and women in the service on a basis of equality with officers. Gives equal treatment to the privates in the ranks as heretofore given under a law passed in 1887 to officers. These claims are now being processed and paid as rapidly as possible.


