BENEFITS FOR U.S. VETS WITH SERVICE IN CANADIAN FORCES

An American citizen who served in the Canadian armed forces during the war and who received gratuities as a veteran under the Canadian laws, is not barred from certain benefits under the G.I. Bill, according to VA officials at the branch office in Columbus, Ohio.

The veteran who received a cash bonus and a "re-establishment cred-it" in an equal amount from the Canadian government, is eligible for a VA loan guarantee as provided by the American law. This decision clarifies the amendment to the G.I. Bill that stated: "American citizens who served in allied forces in the war are entitled to certain G.I. benefits if they have not received 'the same or similar benefits from the nation whose forces they served, and if they are residing in the United States:


Benefits, under the Canadian law, are a cash bonus, based on length and place of service, and an equal amount in the form af a re-establishment credit. On this basis, the VA decision ruled that a guaranteed loan which the veteran is commit-ted to repay with interest, is not "similar" to the Canadian gratuity.
