



#### SUCCESSFUL WORK— AND WORK TO BE DONE

RECENT and gratifying press releases tell of Kentucky in 1946 for the tell of Kentucky in 1946 for the second consecutive year ranking No. 1 in the nation in the matter of improving its wildlife resources.

In 1944 Kentucky rated a poor 38th in the list of states and was going nowhere, its Division of Game and Fish bogged down in a political quagmire. As of last year it had passed up 23 states

and this year it expects to pass possibly half a dozen more. Especially gratifying is the knowledge that Floyd county is playing a leading

role in this part of the pageant, now showing, "Kentucky on the March." There is a pleasurable thrill in the fact that from the continued work of a few the Floyd County Fish & Game Club has become strong, with a membership of around two thousand, with approximately 700 schoolboys enrolled in Junior Sportsmen clubs, and with the parent club not only co-operating closely with the Division of Game and Fish toward re-stocking the county's fields and streams but planning its own fish-rearing pond and quail brooders to augment and hasten the work.

The Division of Game and Fish and many such clubs as Floyd county's are, this year of our Lord, working to restore what we and our forebears have taken from the fields, forests and streams over the generations. It is a slow, arduous grind. But the battle is being won.

Their success is obvious. THE TIMES wishes as much were being done in another field of conservation. Sportsmen of the state are interested in this field, that of protecting the forests and conserving the soil, but this is a task that will require the thought and work of others along ith the sportsmen.

Reforestation, sodding, protection of woodland from the axe and the torch these will require the work and interest of us all.

The need for the work was emphasized last week when Leroy Ballinger, of the Ohio Valley Conservation Commission, said:

"Residents of the Central West are only about six inches away from the Great American Desert instead of many ds of miles."

FOR HER EASTER

When \$86,000 Isn't \$86,000

T sounds great, this announcement that the Rural Highway Department has \$86,000 earmarked for Floyd county

But it isn't great. This is aid that is not to be snubbed, but it definitely is no

For the road is long and twisting from Frankfort to rural Floyd county and the road dollar devaluates a lot between the state treasury and "country" cuts and

ditches and fills and grades, etcetera.

We shall be most fortunate if this \$86,-000 gets \$30,000 worth of real, honest-togoodness road-building or road-improvement done. Administrative costs come out of that total, the state admits it cannot get work done for a figure even resembling the amount the fiscal court would spend in getting it done. And, somehow, somewhere, there always are too many good "party men" to be employed, whether they can do good work

The present Administration is not to be blamed for this sad state of affairs any more than its predecessors. To all of them belongs some blame, probably blame in approximately equal amounts. And if the present law prescribing the handling of rural highway work remains in effect, the next state Administration will come in for its share of culpability.

What needs to be done is this: The law should be changed to place rural highway building and improvement in the hands of the fiscal courts of the several counties. Then, if \$50,000 or any other amount is due Floyd county's rural road fund, or any other county's, exactly that much money will be in the hands of the Magistrates and the County Judge who should know, if anybody does, how and where the money should be spent.

Thus, each county could exercise its own ingenuity toward getting work done. As matters now stand, regardless of how much money could be saved through county administration of the rural highway fund, regardless of how many more miles of highway could be built or maintained, the law will not permit the county to touch the money. The fiscal court can only "sign up," with the department under the present law, then sit back, hope for the best and fear the profane criticism of their constituents.

Some have opposed "home rule" of this fund, expressing the fear that fiscal courts will mishandle the money. That is fearing Scylla more than Charybdis! Honest though administration by the state may be and probably is, as far as political exigencies will permit, it is worse than anything we can envision at the hands of fiscal courts in these days when publication of financial statements is mandatory.

And, besides-if the fiscal courts administer the rural road funds, then we the people will know exactly whom to blame, and precisely where the fault lies. Moreover, at the next election, we would be in position to do something about it.

This is a correction that can be made in state law at the next session of the General Assembly. The state association of County Attorneys, Sheriffs, County Judges and Clerks starting work now with their Representatives and Senators, can win this victory without further ado. Kentucky's lawmakers will listen to them, for, come election-time these legislators will have earnest words to which they will urgently want their county officials to listen.

Negotiations with the union have been going on since February 17. They are still proceeding and your telephone company has hopes that an agreement can be reached that will be fair to everybody.

The Southern Bell Telephone Company believes that its employes should be well paid, and that their wages should compare favorably with those paid by other concerns in the community for work requiring similar skill and equivalent training. To make sure that this policy is carried out, we are continuously comparing our wages with other wages.

In the present negotiations with the union, we have offered a renewal of our present liberal contract, but the union insists upon unreasonably large wage increases.

#### Wage Rate Increases in 1945 and 1946 Amounted to Approximately 26 Million Dollars

Telephone employees' wage rates are now the highest in history. They have been increased 75 percent since January, 1941. The largest increases have been in recent years, and only last year and in 1945, wage increases granted added approximately 26 million dollars to the annual pay of our employees.

These are increases in wage rates and are in addition to millions of dollars in regularly scheduled raises given our empoyees.

This is an important point to remember in any discussion of telephone wages.

These regular raises have been an advantage to telephone employees for many years.

Under our present contract, thousands of our employees receive wage increases as often as every three months. Other thousands receive increases every six months or every year.

#### Here Are Some Typical Rates of Pay

A five-day, 40-hour week is the basic work period. Non-supervisory employees, such as operators, linemen, installers and repairmen receive overtime pay for work beyond eight hours a day, 40 hours a week, and also receive premium pay for Sunday, holiday and evening and night work.

The following table shows some of the present wages paid, according to the size of the telephone exchange:

#### Large Exchanges

Starting Rate Top Rate ...... \$ 27 to \$ 39 per week Installer-Repairman \$ 28 to \$ 62 per week Stenographer ........\$125 to \$190 per month

#### Medium Exchanges

Starting Rate Top Rate Operator ...... \$ 25 to \$ 35 per week Installer-Repairman . \$ 27 to \$ 58 per week Stenographer ...........\$120 to \$180 per month

#### Small Exchanges

Starting Rate Top Rate Operator ...... \$ 22 to \$ 31 per week Installer-Repairman: \$ 27 to \$ 56 per week Stenographer-Not usually needed.

(These rates do not include premium pay mentioned above.)

We believe most people would agree that these are good wages. There are, in addition to good wages, many other advantages in working for the Telephone Company, including pensions (with full cost paid by the Company), sickness and death benefits, attractive working conditions, holidays with pay, and vacations with pay of one, two or three weeks, depending on length

#### Union Demands Total \$69,000,000 a Year. This is Equal to An Increase of \$3.30 a Month in the Average Telephone Bill.

The demands of the union on wages and other matters would increase the cost of providing telephone service by about \$69,000,000 a year. This comes to 70 percent of the Company's wage payments in 1946. It is more than six times our net income in 1946. It would make our payroll alone over two million dollars more than the total of all the money we took in last year.

In terms of the average telephone bill, it amounts to about \$3.30 per month for every one of a little more than 1,731,000 telephone subscribers, and it is the telephone user, after all, who pays us the money that we pay out in wages. Wages that are too low are not fair to the employees-who do the work. Wages that are too high are not fair to the public-who buy the ser-

#### Further Increases in Wages Would Necessitate Additional Increases in Our Rates

We earnestly desire to go as far as possible in meeting the wishes of our employees and the union. But their demands must be practical and realistic. The earnings of the Company are such that we are now appearing before the Public Service Commissions throughout the Southeast asking for increases in rates to help meet the cost of wage increases granted last year. Should present negotiations result in large wage increases, we must immediately seek additional telephone rate increases to meet the increase in expenses. It is with this in mind that we are proceeding in our present negotiations with the

#### An Obligation to the Public Welfare

The Telephone Company is asking union leadership to recognize the obligation of all of us to you—the public. We are pointing out to the union in our meetings that only by rendering a constantly improved service in the most efficient manner possible can the employees, the union, and the management continue to deserve your goodwill. We must not disregard the welfare of the public, either in our charge for service or the quality and continuity of the service we

In view of the facts presented here, there does not seem to be justification for a complete revision of our working practices as requested by the union, nor for such large wage demands. Consequently we have offered the union a year's renewal of the present liberal contract, but with the right to re-open the matter of wages at a time when changes in conditions may justify. We sincerely hope the union will accept this

We want to keep our employees happy about their wages and their jobs. We want to keep you pleased with your telephone rates and service. And, we want to keep our investors satisfied about the money they have put in the telephone business. For it takes all three—telephone user, worker and investor-to keep this business going.

A telephone strike would be such a serious thing for you, for telephone employees, and for the telephone company that everything possible is being done to prevent it. There is no excuse for a telephone strike.

"The management of the company, after making comprehensive estimates of probable increases in demand for power during the nex few years, decided that now is the time to go ahead with the project. The plant is to be owned jointl by the Appalachian Electric Power Company and the Ohio Power Company, both units in the General System of the American Gas and Electric Company. "The idea of a jointly owned and operated plan s not new in the system of the American Gas and Electric Company," Mr. Funk said. "Over a period of 30 years in that system here have been jointly operated three large electric power generat ing plants-one in New Jersey, one Pennsylvania, and one near Wheeling, West Virginia. Join ownership and joint operation permits economies of first cost operation that cannot be obtained if each company built its plant indepen dently of the other.

The plant will be known as the Philip Sporn Plant, named after the Executive Vice-President and Chie Enginer of the American Gas and Electric Company in recognition his leadership in the development economical steam power generatio and transmission. It will be located adjacent to a large coal acreage controlled by the company with sufficient coal underlying to supply the plant for about 30 years. For the present, however, it is not planned to conduct any mining operations and coal used will come t the plant in barges on the Ohio

The capacity of the first unit in this generating plant will be 190,000 horsepower, although with the load growing at its present rate it is probable that before this first unit is in operation another of the same size will be under construction. The generating unit technically known as a cross-compound turbine will be operated at a throttle pressure of 2, 000 pounds per square inch with the steam at a temperature of 1050





School Health

The school health program is designed to prevent the spread of communicable diseases, to reduce absences from school, to correct physical defects, and to teach the school child the rudiments and principles of healthful living. School work requires 50 percent of the nursing time during the school year. The following program is followed by the health department personnel in their school work: Routine nursing visits to each school, physical inspections of children immunized against diphtheria during the past year.


