#### A START TOWARD REAL SERVICE

THE Prestonsburg Kiwanis Club, THE TIMES believes, is altogether within its rights, and is right, in seeking an honest and equitable assessment of Prestonsburg property for taxation purposes.

It is a civic organization, and has for its motto, "We Build," a slogan Kiwanians have never seen the need for improving. Being a club dedicated to the theme of building, of rendering service to its community, it cannot close its eyes to community needs. Otherwise, it belies its motto, it cannot build or even attempt to build.

Now, this movement to effect an equalization of essessments will cost most us us—some, more than others. 

6. Educational benefits under G.I. Bill of Rights for men who enlist before official termination of war and remain in the service 90 days or more.

7. Family allowances for dependents of men enlisting or re-enlisting continue until six months after official termination of war.

8. Enlistments for 11/2, 2 or 3 years, (1 year enlistments for men now in the Army with six or more months of service.)

9. Option to retire at half pay for the rest of your life after 20 years' service, increasing to threequarters pay after 30 years' service. All previous honorable service federal military service counts toward retirement.

"Persons who do not furnish the Commission with their full names and Social Security numbers are, themselves, bringing about delays in processing their claims. Time lost in ying to ferret-out the proper claim nt when only a name or part of ; name and no Social Security number are given could be saved and the laimant receive better and quicker service, if all necessary information is included in every letter."

J. Foley Snyder, assistant director of the Commission, said today that so many benefit checks have fallen into the hands of the wrong people, that the Commission has called in district federal postal inspectors in an attempt to halt this practice.

Snyder cited many instances where as many as four people having exactly the same names have been getting checks meant for only one of their number, and have been ble to have these checks cashed at

The assistant director has urged hat banks and others always ask hat a person seeking to cash a benfit check issued by the Commission show his Social Security number. This number is on every check and f a person's Social Security number does not correspond with that on the check, banks and others should decline to cash the check, regardless of whether the name is the same on the check as that of the man or woman offering it.





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
