REJECT PHONE PEACE OFFER

Schwellenbach Tells Need for Pressure On Both Parties

Secretary of Labor Schwellenbach Tuesday night promised a "fight" after both sides had rejected his formula for peace in the nationwide telephone strike.

He gave no inkling of any intention to seize the industry, but scored both sides and called for public pressure on company and union to settle.

Schwellenbach said in a radio broadcast that the two parties forgot they are "in a public utility industry." He criticized them sharply for rejecting "a fair proposal" and called for pressure from the public to persuade them to take

I do not propose to accept this rejection without putting up a fight for my proposal," he said, and appealing directly to the public, he added:

"Whether or not I succeed in that fight is going to depend upon you. I made the proposal upon behalf of the American people and I am asking you who want telephone service, and who pay the telephone bills, to demand of each side that they accept the proposal which I made."

The striking National Federation of Telephone Workers turned the secretary's proposal down outright and demanded a general pay raise as a basis for any settlement. The Bell System companies proposed 13 modifications of his plan including regional instead of national arbitration and protection for the company against retroactive pay raises for which they could not raise rates.

The secretary had come up with an idea by which the strike might be ended late Thursday. Under his plan, both sides would agree to (1) arbitration of basic money issues by a five-man board and (2) intensive negotiations to settle other issues so that telephone service could be resumed on a normal basis.

As Schwellenbach put it: 1. The American Telephone & Telegraph Company declined nationwide arbitration on the grounds that it is regulated in each state, but failed "to recognize that the reason it is regulated is that it is a monopoly."

2. "The union on the other side takes the position that the proposal it made in the beginning has to be accepted, or else the strike will go on."

The major modification proposed by the Bell System companies was that 10 regional arbitration boards be substituted for the single board Schwellenbach asked.

CHILD AID CUT SEEN

Slash of 15 Per Cent In Benefits Predicted Effective Next Month

Aaron Paul, state director of public assistance, announced last week that, due to lack of funds, the average aid to dependent children in Kentucky will be reduced approximately 15 per cent beginning next month.

Aid for children has been stepped up during the past 12 months. Paul estimated the average grant for May will be \$35.37, compared to \$21.50 in May a year ago.

The cut will be made, he explained, by reducing the state's maximum grant for matching federal funds from \$24 for the first child in a family and \$15 for each additional one to the former maximum of \$18 and \$12.

The director said the decision was reached "after thorough analyses revealed that the increased number of cases made it impossible to continue the present level of assistance payments."

"This was true," he continued, "even though every dollar appropriated by the Legislature for grants plus over \$100,000 of funds for administration is to be used for assistance payments."

The current legislative appropriation for old persons, needy blind, and dependent children is \$4,750,000 and under the budget bill's "escalator" clause this amount will be increased by \$450,000 during the fiscal year beginning July 1.

In addition bills are pending in Congress to increase the amount of federal aid for children. Paul said the federal government now grants two-thirds of the first \$9 for child aid and 50 per cent of whatever above that a child gets each month.

For the need and the blind, he added, the federal grant is two-thirds of the first \$15 to an individual plus 50 per cent of whatever he gets above \$15 a month.

Paul said possibility of raising the child-aid average grant after July 1 would be studied in the light of the additional \$450,000 and any further federal aid that Congress might authorize. If the number of applicants levels off, he explained, there might be some larger grants than that to be given in May and June.

Announcement of the cut in child aid came after Paul consulted with the Governor and the welfare commissioner.

FINES WERE ILLEGAL—BUT WHAT CAN YOU DO ABOUT THEM?

Announcement was made last week that there is no law by which fines may be collected from truck-owners for failure to have the gross weight painted on their trucks.

But, before that, fines had been collected, and thousands over the state had rushed about in a dither, seeking the services of sign painters.

And now, says the Attorney General's office, those who have paid fines have little chance of collecting refunds. This opinion was based on the premise that the time for appealing to circuit courts has probably expired. But, it was suggested, those who have paid these fines might do well to consult a lawyer.

Minister 35 Years Is Victim April 7, Is Buried at Myrtle

The Rev. Wiley Kendall Bayes, who for 35 of his 81 years was moderator and pastor of the Chestnut Grove United Baptist Church, Magoffin county, was buried last week in the family cemetery at Myrtle, this county. He died April 7 of senility. Funeral rites were conducted from the home of Mrs. Dee Prater, the Revs. Alex Stephens and W. M. Hall officiating.

The Reverend Bayes had been a member of the Baptist Church for 51 years. His wife preceded him in death and he is survived by the following sons and daughters: Mrs. Myrtle McClure, Mrs. Josie Puckett, Mrs. Effie Comstock, Bill and Jim Bayes, all of Ohio, Mrs. W. B. Prater, Water Gap, Mrs. Margy Mills and Joe Bayes, of Kentucky.

SOME MINES MAY NEVER BE OPENED

Is Report Received Here As Operation Is Being Resumed

Although coal production was estimated above 90 per cent of normal, with most mines of this section returned to operation after inspection by safety committees and federal inspectors, there remained a strong possibility, it was said this week, that some mines will never re-open.

One mine which had not re-opened in this county is that of the Glogora Coal Company at Glo. It was said that federal inspectors have refused to certify it as safe for operation.

The operations that may be abandoned are those at which conditions are such that conformity with the federal safety code would entail a prohibitive cost. In such cases, it is authoritatively predicted, equipment will be scrapped or otherwise disposed of and operation undertaken in new locations.

The return to work was accelerated by a sudden change of course by UMWA chieftain, John L. Lewis, who last Saturday authorized district presidents to re-open mines immediately "where there is reasonable ground to believe they are safe."

Early last week he had proclaimed a policy of work only after mines had been declared safe by federal inspectors—a process that would have required much time.

Tom Roney, international board member, said at Pikeville Saturday he had received a copy of an order from Lewis authorizing district officials to re-open coal mines they deem to be safe.

"This stipulates," he said, "that any and all mines except those covered by the Krug order should be inspected by the (union) committee and re-opened Monday."

Roney added that "in my opinion all mines in District 30, aside from those on the unsafe list, will be working Monday."

FOXHUNTERS ORGANIZE

To Promote Sport, Join in Protecting Forests of County

For the promotion of probably the section's oldest sport and to preserve forests of the county, the Floyd County Foxhunters' Association was organized at a meeting of sportsmen here Monday night.

Roy Cook, of Wayland, was named the group's first president. Other officers are: J. E. Conley, Prestonsburg, vice-president; Magistrate G. C. Burchett, of Woods, secretary, and County Judge Alex L. Davidson, Prestonsburg, treasurer.

The board of directors of the association is composed of Kit Stumbo, of McDowell Tom Moore, Prestonsburg, and Anell Ridener, Wayland.

At the initial meeting \$90 was raised to carry on early work of the organization. Meeting with the foxhunters, E. R. Burke, Prestonsburg, seventh district supervisor of observation, promised them eight pairs of red foxes for release, two pairs to the Magisterial district, in June.

Aims of the Association include not only the re-stocking of Floyd county hills with red fox but also the protection of woodland from fires and the destruction of gray foxes. Later, various events, including field trials, will be staged.

Bronchial asthma aggravated by privations suffered while 14 months in a German prison camp resulted in the death Saturday of Jake Hamilton, 33 years old, at the home of his father, Jesse Hamilton, of Amba.

Radioman in the operation of a tank in the African, Middle Eastern and European theatres of war, Hamilton, an army sergeant, was held prisoner until liberated by the Russian forces. Before his army service he was a miner but had not been able to work since being mustered out of the armed forces. Mr. Hamilton was a member of the Baptist Church.

SHY OF GOAL, EXTEND DRIVE

Mine Lay-Off Hurts Red Cross Campaign; Services Are Cited

With Floyd county's Red Cross fund drive goal only one-third reached, the duration of the drive has been extended, it was announced this week at Red Cross headquarters.

Extension of the drive was made necessary, in part, by the mine lay-off, it was explained.

Citing the duty of every citizen to support the Red Cross, Mrs. Wayne Bradley, drive chairman, pointed out this week that 32 per cent of all funds go to national headquarters for immediate use wherever needed—as in the recent tornado disaster in Texas and neighboring states. In that disaster alone, the American Red Cross has allocated \$250,000 to relief of sufferers.

"We are too prone to forget the needs of others," Mrs. Bradley commented. "Our needs today are few. Tomorrow, even we may need help as much as the hardest-hit community in the nation, and if we are never visited by suffering we should be sympathetic to others who are."

YOST URGES LEADERSHIP

Tells Foremen Here They Are Major Unit For Important Work

Kenneth Yost, regional manager of the National Association of Foremen, spoke Sunday evening to the Pecco Foremen's Club and guests from several companies in neighboring communities at the Brown hotel here on "What Does Management Expect of Foremen?"

Mr. Yost effectively pointed out that the foremen are the only major leadership unit in the country today who are in a position to lead the people in the right direction. "The people are going to follow someone and if you foremen don't provide the type of leadership that you should, the people will be undermined with subservient ideas and our country will be placed in a much more serious position than we are today," he declared.

How management men were unthinkingly undermining each other and how they should act to develop respect and maintain the loyalty that they rightly deserve was a point the speaker stressed, pointing out that, regardless of the products being made or mined, the first thing that every management man is building is human beings.

"The foremen should recognize that every man above, beside or below, has an inherent desire to do good work and to be a useful and respected citizen. Until he has considered every possible motive, he should not assume that any man wants to do anything less than his best," Mr. Yost concluded.

TWO PENNED UNDER NEW PISTOL LAW

Convicted Man Seeks New Trial; Officers' Indictment Dismissed

Although the more sensational murder case still held major interest in circuit court here, conviction of two men under the new state pistol law and their sentences of two years each was creating most of the comment.

The two—Harlan Clark, of Wheelwright, and Jake Hughes, of Hueysville—are the first convicted here on indictments made for carrying concealed deadly weapons since the new law became effective.

A new trial is being sought for Spurlock Damron, Printer merchant and coal operator, who drew a life term last Thursday in the slaying of his step-son, Arthur Damron.

Other convictions: Joe Brown, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses, one-year pen term; Tommy Harris, cutting and wounding, \$50 fine; Gersher Waddles, reckless use of a deadly weapon, \$50 fine; Stanley Lazenby, carrying concealed deadly weapon, \$50.

Noah Stone was acquitted of a grand larceny charge and so was Gersher Waddles, charged with carrying a concealed deadly weapon. The \$250 fine assessed of Margaret Prater for possessing illegal whiskey for the purpose of sale was reduced \$100 when it was found the fine was that amount in excess of the legal maximum.

Ora Conley, former Estill youth, was acquitted Monday of the knife-slaying at Estill of W. J. Stone, and the murder charge against Oak and Troy Mullins, Wayland and Garrett officers, for the slaying of Arnold Howard, was dismissed for lack of evidence to convict.

It was said after dismissal of the murder charge against Troy Hall and Raymond Anderson in the fatal shooting of Johnny Holbrook, war veteran, that the case may be re-submitted to the grand jury.

Before adjourning Saturday for a vacation till May 1, the grand jury returned a murder indictment against Allen Stone, Martin policeman, in the recent slaying at Martin of Deputy Constable Bob Taylor, and also named Anthony Newsome on a voluntary manslaughter charge in the death of Rosa Hall when Newsome allegedly ran his auto into a train at Gearheart. Other major indictments follow:

Names of four of the men were unavailable, since, it was said, they were so drunk when jailed that names could not be procured and they escaped before again questioned. Known fugitives were listed in jail escape warrants by Police Judge J. D. Harkins, Jr., as:

Robb Harmon and Sport Hale, both of West Prestonsburg; Flem Frasure, Martin; Lon Everett, Dewey Osborne and a man listed as Johnson, address unknown.

Bricks were knocked out of the jail wall over an adjoining storage room of wood construction and escape thus made. Police Judge Harkins said an iron bar had apparently been slipped to the prisoners.

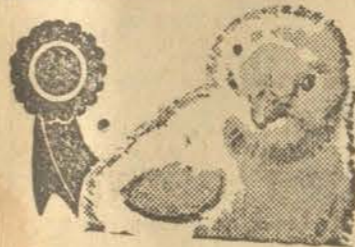

## Jane Todd Crawford Is Discussion Topic Of P'burg Woman

Wheelwright, Ky., April 7 (Sp.)—Mrs. J. D. Mayo, of Prestonsburg, and 7th district chairman of the welfare program sponsored by the Kentucky Federation of Woman's Clubs, was guest speaker at the April meeting of the Wheelwright Club, choosing for her subject, "Jane Todd Crawford." It was Jane Todd Crawford who prepared the way in co-operation with Dr. Ephraim McDowell (Father of Ovariotomy), for abdominal surgery, which has in modern times become relatively simple, safe and not an unusual procedure, said Mrs. Mayo. She gave a short history of Jane Todd Crawford's life and discussed circumstances of the operation performed on that dark December 25, 1809, when, without the aids of modern science, and without anesthetics of any kind, the successful surgery was made. Only her Supreme faith in her heavenly Father, her hopeful dependence on her surgeon and her indomitable courage carried Jane Todd Crawford through the crucial ordeal that blazed the trail of abdominal surgery.

Mrs. Mayo told club members that the Auxiliary to the Kentucky State Medical Association has established the Jane Todd Crawford library in Greensburg, and they have established and begun to plant shrubs, flowers and bulbs on the Jane Todd Crawford Trail, the 60 miles of wilderness path over which the heroine traveled horseback to reach the home of Dr. McDowell where the now famous operation was performed. Plans have also been made to restore the room in the McDowell home in which the operation took place, to its original type of decoration. Mrs. Mayo called upon the clubwomen to keep working on the welfare program outlined for the women of the 7th district—the fight on tuberculosis and intestinal parasites.

During the business of the evening arrangements were made to send two delegates to the state Woman's Club convention in Louisville. The Club voted to sponsor the cancer drive again this year and made a \$20 donation to the cause.

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**GI Bill of Rights Benefits Extended to New Enlistees**

Prominent educators have given their stamp of approval to the extensive educational program now being conducted by the U.S. Army.

Under the Army program, men who enlist are given the opportunity of studying one or more of 200 skills and trades in Army training schools in this country and in overseas theaters throughout the world.

"This privilege, plus the refresher course, means presenting a young man with a total of 48 months of higher education. In other words, a full college course plus one year of post-graduate study."

**TUITION, LIVING ALLOWANCE PAID**

"The Government will pay up to \$500 for each ordinary school year, and also provides a living allowance of \$65 a month to single men, \$75 a month to married men."

"This is a splendid educational boost for the young men of America, and it will undoubtedly mean higher enrollments in colleges and trade and business schools throughout the nation."

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
